

To whom it may concern:

It was a great stroke of good fortune to me, as it was to all of the people in our town, when Mr. Fred Smith came here some eight or nine years ago. The moment he arrived, this became his community and he was willing to do something for it. One often notices that many school teachers are reluctant to help on civic projects or charitable work; some of them have the opinion "If put up with your children five days a week, I have done enough"; in fairness we must admit that they are right. It is noted that when Fred Smith is asked to do a job, he accepts cheerfully and proceeds at once to do the work

intellegently and efficiently.

My greatest good fortune was that both of my daughters were taught by Fred Smith. He gives to his profession more than duty demands. Secondarily, he teaches music (or Band as the kids are want to say) and it is doubtful if there is a teacher anywhere with a better knowledge of music or with any more ability to impart knowledge to their students. Primarily he teaches ethics and morals and responsibility. He maintains friendly discipline among his charges and it is doubtful if any child has ever questioned or tested his authority. For some reason no one even wants to antagonize Mr. Smith. During holidays, one will notice that many of his ex students, who are on vacation from college, call at Fred's home to visit. I suspect that his advice is sought more by young people than is that of all the ministers in our town. For Fred Smith, every child will produce his best. Perhaps the qualities that make him a great teacher come from his ability to be entirely fair and just to every person. I have seen children shed tears because they didn't give a good performance; they never cried because of their own failure but because they had let Mr. Smith down. Mr Fred Smith's bands have not always won sweepstakes at the annual band contests even when other less proficient bands have won by playing easier masic or by marching easier routines or by not letting it's less proficient members perform. I don't recall that any band of his has ever failed to place no. 1 in sight reading. On the many occasions when his bands have won, the pride in their accomplishment was completely justified because they knew that they did so by doing the most difficult performances on the list. One could go on and on extolling the virtues of Fred Smith, his constant good humor, his willingness to work, his abilities in his profession, his example of morality. his love of children, the esteem accorded him by his colleagues, but this could be boring to those not acquainted with him.

Fred Smith has three children, two boys and a girl, they are talented, intelligent and exceptionally well mannered. Fred Smith has a beautiful and charming wife whose face, when in his presence, continually mirrors her admiration for this great and good man.





Known as the "papa of Texas high school bands" is D. O. Wiley, head of the music department at Texas Technological College at Lubbock. 

As I sat on the bus returning from Corpus Christi in April, tired and a little numb from 1,200 miles in the same seat, I reflected on this trip and all past band trips.


