Born 12/29/30 in Brownwood, TX, attended public school there and graduated from Brownwood High School. He joined the band in the second grade. In 1948 he entered Howard Payne University for two years and then joined the U.S. Air Force for three years and served in the 669th A. F. Band. Following military service he resumed his education at Hardin-Simmons University, playing in the Cowboy Band, and received his Bachelor's Degree in Music Education in 1955. He later received his Master's Degree in Music Education from North Texas State University in 1958

He married Maurice Parsley in 1953 and they have two children, Melodianne McGahey, a daughter who is a band director and Morgan, a son who is a nurse and both reside in the Ft. Worth area. Son-in Law, Mark McGahey, is also a band director making a total of three in this family. They have no grand children but one grand dog, Lucy, who loves them all!

His first band directing position was in Santa Anna, TX in 1955 and he describes this as his "real" education. After 5 years there he accepted a position with the Brady I.S.D where he served as director of bands for 26 years until his retirement from full time teaching in 1986. Since that time he has been in private business and taught part time at Rochelle, and Mason, TX.

Honors that he is particularly proud of are: While at Brady his band earned 21 consecutive UIL Sweepstakes awards with ones from all judges, five times "Best in Class" winner at the Six Flags Invitational Band Festival, the first being a marching contest held in a mesquite pasture adjacent to the amusement park in its early years, playing Elsa's Procession to the Cathedral and getting ones from all judges, "Best in Class" at the Canon City, Colorado contest in 1977, teaching 10 years in the Abilene Christian University Band camp, being a member of Phi Beta Mu, TMAA, TMEA, and TBA and serving as a clinician and adjudicator in all areas of Texas. He served as UIL Marching Contest chairman and host for 17 years for Region VII and held various Regional and Area positions.

His Brady High School Band performed twice at Disney World and was 2nd runner up in the Orange County Band Contest in Orlando, Florida.

The Brady Band under his direction placed twice in the top five TMEA Honor Band competition in class AAA.

One special highlight of his career was being elected to the Board of Directors of the Texas Bandmasters Association and serving as President in 1978. This was a wonderful opportunity to grow professionally and to meet the leaders of the band world.

In 1973 he was the recipient of the Brady Chamber of Commerce "Distinguished Service Award" given by the citizens of Brady for his work with the band program. He serves his church as a Deacon, teaches a Sunday School class and is active with church choir.

He has served as a clinician for a number of Region and District bands and twice served as a sight reading clinician for TMEA. For some 17 years he was the director and host for the Heart of Texas Band Festival held annually in Brady until the mid seventies.

He is currently serving as organizer and director of the Brady Community Band and recently toured Germany as a member of the Texas All State German Band. He was a member of the Lions club for 37 years.

As Director of Bands at Brady he supervised some 15 student teachers from Howard Payne University and a number of them are now well known band directors and leaders today. A number of his Brady Band students are now band directors including his daughter.

Another special occasion was placing three members of the Brady Band in the TMEA All State Bands the same year which is pretty unusual for a AAA school. He had three former Brady Band members in the front lines of three Southwestern Conf. schools the same year. A drum major of the Aggie Band and twirlers at Baylor and Texas Tech.

Humorous events remembered is the young lady who lost her trousers at the Heart of Texas Marching contest and never missed a step. (She had on pink leotards under her trousers!) and the beginner percussion player who went to sleep in his chair waiting for his turn to play. As the class watched he gradually slipped from his chair, hit the floor and woke up with the bewildered expression...."Where in the heck am I?"

Advice to young directors just starting out...TAKE PLENTY OF TIME WITH BEGINNERS, DON'T RUSH THE PROCESS, START THEM OUT FUNDAMENTALLY CORRECT AND SET GOOD DISCIPLINE STANDARDS FROM DAY ONE. You won't regret it.







"Those who would be leaders have a wholesome positive attitude. It is the set of the sail that makes the difference.

"You must be enthusiastic. Nothing great was ever accomplished without enthusiasm. You have to recognize your responsibility and take it from there," the speaker concluded.

Timberlake used stories of great people to illustrate parts of his speech. He told of Winston Churchill who was once fired from a high post in the British navy and through perseverance came back to be one of the great statesmen of his country.

George Purcell, retired manager of the Brady Chamber of Commerce was recognized with a resolution by the C of C with a special award of a plaque for his years of service to the Chamber of Commerce.

The highlight of the evening came when Brady High School band director James Mallow was named as the winner of the Distinguished Service Award. In his introduction of the winner Korky Steffens, a past recipient of the award, remarked that there was nothing he could say that would keep the crowd in suspense. 

(Editor's Note: The following | has won eight of 10 University Interscholastic League first division marching ratings, seven division I ratings in concert playing and sight reading, five consecutive UIL sweepstakes trophies and more than 35 other first-place awards in various events.

For Mallow, becoming a band director fulfilled a childhood ambition to satisfy his love of music and to accept a challenge to work with youth,

"I always felt there was a place for me in the musical field; I love music and I never had a desire to go into any other field professionallythere seemed to be a challenge to work with youth to combine them into an organization that could perform and produce good mustic," he said.

The band director said he believes he is building character and citizenship along with music and that this will be carried into adult life.

"STUDENTS HAVE a common goal-they want to do their best in music as well as in other things: bands build morale and team effort and they learn to get along with other people.



What Goes Into A Winning Band? Brady Leader Gives His Advice

DRADY - What is the mafor key of success to an approximately 95 member band unit that has taken the University Interscholastic League's top honor in Class Double AA band competition for seven straight years? Brady band director, James Mallow says, "Excellent Mallow says, "Excellent cooperation from the parents and town and willingness of students who want to really do something and many hours of hard work."

In order for a band to receive the UIL sweepstakes trophy, a band must make a first place rating in marching competition, concert playing and sight reading.

The Brady Band won the Six Flags Festival for three years in Class Double AA competi-

This Central Texas town has had many years of an ex-cellent band program and is considered a band community. Mallow has been here for 12 years and he said, "Before I came there had been many fine leaders in the band program such as Douglas Fry in the 1940s who later was a well-known band director with the Abilene Christian College band, Boyd Hunt in the end of the 1950s who is now a prin-

1 of South Ward Elemen-School in Brady, and the sent school counselor, Joe McDoungh was a director, also."

Long Hours

One secret behind the success of the Brady Band is the many hard hours of work the students and director practice. "We hardly ever shut down operation during any one time of the year," Mallow remark-ed. "During the month of June we have a program based on a volunteer basis for the students. July is the most in-active month of all."

The month of August begins the rugged long hours of hard work and practice. "We begin having practice in the morning hours, then morning and evening. It is quite similar to an athletic program," he said.

Band students must prepare for concert playing and marching, Mallow gave a schedule of events his band generally goes through each year by giving a summary of last year's band program.

"There are 10 football halftime performances each season. We have won 10 consecutive firsts in UIL Region competition and placed 26 out of 30 entries in individual contests in the district band competition. Then in region band competition, 32 entered and 22 placed. Thirteen out of 22 band members made All-State area tryouts and three were selected for membership in the All-State Band.

"It is really unusual for a band to have three members for this honor," Mallow added, Daryl Huffman, Nona Neal and Donna Neal: were the students receiving the All-State honor. They were selected in Austin, then spent three days in Fort Worth with All-State Band performing at the Texas Music Educators Convention.

The Brady band sponsors the Brady Band Festival each year, although it does not compete in it. Reminiscing about some of the lighter sides of the band and things happening that were not so funny at the time, but later brought a few laughs, Mallow recalled the time bands were performing for the Brady festival and one girl from a visiting band lost her trousers. She had a pair of pink leotards on underneath, luckily, but the girl stepped out of her trousers and never lost a step during the band's routine.

Asked how he ever manages to gather a group of 95 or so teen-agers for a band trip and get to places on time with equipment, he remarked, "We have to have a schedule with times to be places, every one has a certain seat on the same bus all year long and students know what is expected of them and they just accept this responsibility.

Interested Students

"One of our biggest problems with meeting schedules so far, he commented with a smile, has been mechanical difficulty." Once we started to leave the school ground, one bus refused to start, another did not have any brakes and it just seemed we would never find three good buses to load our band students on." Another time, we were going to the ACC Band Day when one bus broke down and we had to combine students from three buses into two buses.'

Another problem encountered with is weather.
"We try to take advantage of most pretty days to practice marching because a week of rain before a football game or

"Senior leadership," Mallow said, "is one of our other masor yet keys to success. The older students help the younger. They use their own time in helping the younger students with their instruments and problems they may be having. This allows older students to leave something of themselves in the band when they graduate." Mallow cited an organization that he believes is very much a part of the band program and that is the Brady Band Boosters, composed of band parents and interested citizens. "The Band Boosters are always willing to help in anyway they are asked. The organization has money raising projects to help the band, such as running one of the concession stands at football games, a radio bake auction and various other projects,"

Famed Bulldog Band, One Of Best 2A Bands In State

whistle trills, the drums roll and the Famed Brady Bulldog Band takes the field as the local rooters applaud wildly.

This is the scene each Friday night at halftime of the Brady High School football games. Not only are Bradyites avid football fans, but they are just as avid Bulldog Band fans as the standing ovation at the intermission of the Brady-Ozona football game last Friday night proved.

Winners of nine consecutive Sweepstakes awards, the highest honor given high school bands in Texas, the aggregation brings thrills to hundreds of locals and opposing team fans alike.

The 94 marching band members are part of the 106-piece organization that represents Brady High School and the Heart of Texas and are known as "The Pride of the Heart of Texas."

A band cannot make a name in its circles without a band director and the citizens of Brady consider James Mallow one of the best.

A native of Brownwood, Mallow came to Brady in 1960 from Santa Anna where he was a teacher. He is well-known in music circles in Texas and has been contacted by colleges and institutions of higher learning who were interested in obtaining his services as a band director. Fortunately, he has chosen to remain in Brady.

His success with the band program in the Brady schools is almost phenomenal. Year after year Mallow trains band students from the sixth grade in junior high to those in high school. There are 234 students in the band program. Forty-seven of those are sixth grade beginners. He has 81 in the junior band program at junior high and 106 in high school.

"We march 94 members, partly because of the uniform situation and partly because some of the band students are football players. We have three varsity players and several junior varsity and freshmen team members.

"We have approximately nine alternates suited up and ready to go. Three of these will march on alternate nights. The others can fill in if someone is sick or absent," Mallow explained.

The band director works almost every night lining things up for the next Friday night football game. The band students spend the band period on the practice field polishing up the routine for the Friday night halftime appearance.

Mallow said that his halftime routines are usually taken from those of other bands. "Some are original ideas; others we pick up from bands on TV and other places. The trend in marching, especially on TV, is forming pictures. With the low high school stadium this is not so good. The higher the stands the better the 'picture' looks."

"We try to do special musical figures and precision marching. For years the popular thing has been diamonds. Now it is circles. We try to improve on the concert season with special features. It promotes good musicianship that carries over to concert playing," Mallow said.

He noted last Friday's rendition of the theme from the motion picture, "The Sting," as an example. Contemporary music is a favorite of the band members and Mallow seeks arrangements of popular music for their use.

Flags are a recent addition to the band, new last year. They give the organization a big look. The trend is a return from past years. "We use them sparingly because we like to use all our personnel in playing instruments when they can, he said.

ments when they can, he said.

Mallow said that the next
big event on the calendar
for the band will be a District
Band competition Nov. 9 in
Ballinger.

"This is an individual event. Each student is on his own and enters on his own. We have been fortunate in placing members in the district aggregation as well as regional and area. Our biggest success was in 1972-73 when we placed three band members in the All-State Band. The next thing will be the University Interscholastic League Marching Contest Nov. 23 in Coleman. That will be the first' step toward another Sweepstakes Award," the band director said.

"Rain is always a big problem with us. Of course if it is raining during the band period we can't practice on the field and the more practice we get the better we are. Under normal circumstances we only use the band period for marching practice. The kids' big work comes during the late summer and a lot in August. Our biggest job is getting the freshmen qualified to play in the band," Mallow said.

One thing he left out is the band schools he hold each summer. All band members, junior high and high school are eligible to attend and the fact (Continued on Page 3, Col. 5)

(Continued From Page One) that so many do take part in the summer band program, is one reason the band is so successful.

The pre-school practice period is one in which the older band members get the newer ones worked up enough to fit together. They help to instill the pride of accomplishment that Mallow is strong on. Throughout the year the veteran band members work with the novices to try to help them perfect their instrument playing.

Mallow believes in pride of organization, pride of self and

pride of school. He insists on and gets dedication. The respect the band members have for Mallow is evident in their actions both at home and out-of-town. They are known wherever they go as the "good will ambassadors" for Brady High School and the City of Brady.

The band director was quick to say that without the Brady Band Boosters the band program would not be nearly so successful. "We could not do without them. They are our backers, our staunchest supporters and our money makers. They go with the band, buy instruments for us and in general are behind us in everything we do," he said.

He also paid tribute to the school and the school officials. "They are behind us in every way and still willing to help when needed. They support our band program in everything we do," he said.

Mallow said he could not set a value on the band. "We have over \$10,000 in uniforms and a conservative estimate of \$30,000 in school instruments. That doesn't take into consideration the thousands of dollars worth of instruments belonging to the students. Some of our brass horns were here when Doug Fry came in 1947. Many more horns are 10 to 15 years old. Not so good to look at but they play okay.

"Football games are hardest

on instruments, uniforms and students. There are the crowded bleachers and loading and unloading. Playing in the stands is more difficult than in concert," he said.

He described concert playing as being essentially the same people but a concert sound versus a marching sound. "We try to be more particular. We use more finesse inside by calming down the sound and being more precise," he said.

In addition to the nine Sweepstakes awards, the Brady Band has won four Six Flags trophies, the latest being last year when they were judged best in Class AA in concert playing.

Mallow hopes for another Sweepstakes year and the band members will try to fulfill that hope. For the present the members continue to practice on District Band music, halftime routines and musicianship with an eye toward the big award.

At the next football game a whistle will trill, the drums roll, and the Famed Brady Bulldog Marching Band will take the field.

Discipline, Work Band's Secret

BRADY — "Band teaches self discipline. You've got to have self discipline if you're going to accomplish anything ... and I feel it carries over in to life, no matter what the undertaking."

The words come from James Mallow. 15-year veteran director of the "Famed Brady Bulldog Band" which has racked up numerous honors

during his tenure at Brady High School

This year the band copped first division honors in marching, concert and in sight reading, garnering a UIL sweepstakes, highest award the state of Texas gives in regional.

In addition, for the second straight year the band was named best AA band at the Six Flags contest this spring. The Six Flags event is open

only to first division winners.

"I would say that at least half of (our success) is organizational work and the other part, of course, is musicianship," said Mallow.

Mallow had kind words for the citizens of Brady, noted that the people "take an extreme pride in the band... and like to associate with it accomplishments and victories to me Brady is an unusual small community in that anything they want to do they seem to do it extremely well. And that's why I decided to come here years ago. I feel people have a tremendous pride in the city and Chamber of Commerce and school programs."

Brady has an active band booster club which contributes \$3.000 a year to the program through radio bake auctions, benefit drive-in movies and ball game concessions.

"Or course, the heart of any program like this is the students themselves," noted Mallow, who is only the third director in the band program since it was initiated in 1948. "To be a band winner it takes not only dedication and good attitude, but 100 per cent concentration in what you're doing. And that, to me is what makes a truly fine band."

He added that often high school band members will give junior high students group or private lessons, as well as aid them in passing their barrier tests — performance tests to make the high school band.

"This helps promote a sense of belonging and pride," said Mallow.

In addition the band practices as a whole one hour daily during the school term and often holds a section practice after school hours as well. "The individual effort put forth makes our band a little stronger." said the directer.

The band has 104 members, which amounts to approximately one-fourth of the student body — a largerthan-average precentage, since most AA bands have only 60-70 members.

Mallow also serves as junior high director, and often teaches a single student for as long as seven years. "I feel I can really get to know the person and what he's capable of," he said. "I think this, in the long run, helps the student."

Nominations may be made from the floor.




THE BRADY BUNCH

They have performed throughout the state of Texas and have scored major successes at competition events at Six Flags Over Texas.



I am answering your letter of December 13th, wanting to know more about Mr. James Mallow, Band Director, for your Winningest Marching Bands & Corps search. I hope this will give you an idea of what an outstanding band director he is.

James Mallow has been teaching band in Brady, Texas for 23 years. Before here he was in Santa Anna, Texas for 5 years. While here in Brady, he has taught both beginner band and junior band in junior high and the high school band with no assistant band director. The high school band, known as The Famed Brady Bulldog Band, has won numerous honors and awards. In Texas, high school bands participate in the University Interscholastic League contests which consist of marching, concert playing, and sight reading. They are judged each time by three judges and this determines what kind of a band you have. Brady has made 19 consecutive ones in marching and is working on the 18th consecutive Sweepstakes, which is all ones in marching, concert and sight reading. This alone tells you he must be a fine director.

The band has participated in the Six Flag's Band Festival numerous times, and won best in class AA two times. During the Texas Band Master's Association Convention each summer, they judge a best in class band, and Brady has placed in the top five several times of class AA. The band marches at ten half time performances during football season and present two concerts a year. Each spring, they take a long trip, usually to Six Flag's Over Texas to their band festival. They have traveled to Colorado where they performed in the Music and Blossom Festival and won top honors in Class C bands winning first in both parade and field show. They have gone to Florida to participate in the Great American Band Contest and won second runner up. While there, they also led a parade through Disney World. Again this year, they will travel to Florida where they will perform and lead another parade through Disney World.

Mr. Mallow is a member of the Texas Music Educators Association, the Texas Bandmasters Association and past president, Phi Beta Mu, a national honorary band directors fraternity, has had several student teachers under his guidance, and judges at numerous band contests throughout Texas.

His community envolvements enclude member of the Lions Club and past president and Lion of the Year, Distinguist Service Award (presented to an outstanding citizen by the Brady Chamber of Commerce,) and a member and deacon of the First Baptist Church.

As you can tell, Mr. Mallow is an outstanding man, director and citizen, and the Famed Brady Bulldog Band is a very outstanding band. I know from personal experience, because he was my band director and I was very proud to have him as my director. 

"Dear Mr. Smith:





Colorful uniforms. beautiful music, effervescent youth, discipline, hard work and an all-around good time were the ingredients for the regional band concert Saturday in the Alma Thomas Theatre on the Southwestern University campus.

"The work has been hard. but the region band was fun," said Tim Todd, a trumpet player from Leander High School, That was the general feeling of the students who were fortunate enough to make this exclusive band.

The regional band clinic is an annual bash during which the best high school musicians in the region come together after countless hours of practice and stiff competition against their peers at the district and regional levels. Here, they get the chance to meet people as dedicated to music as they, perform under some of the country's greatest bandmasters, and receive recognition of their talent.

The Texas Music Educators Association developed the regional band as part of a complex system

four levels: district, clinic bands. How did these regional, area, and finally, state. "These are the better musicians in the schools and we try to give them something to shoot at." explained James Mallow, band director of Brady High School and a TMEA member.

Because of the huge size of the region, the regional band is actually four separate bands. There are two AAAA bands, a AAA band, and a B. A, and AA band. The AAAA bands played their concert at a different location.

Mallow conducted the regional band from the smaller schools. Dr. William D. Revelli, retired band director of the University of Michigan, conducted the AAA band. "William Revelli is the best band director since John Phillip Sousa, To my knowledge there's not another one like him alive," said Westlake High School band director Lee Boyd Montgomery, echoing many other band directors.

Georgetown placed 35 students in the AAA band more than any other school. Westlake followed with 29 and Leander had six. In all. musical prodigies like their regional band experience?

Tracy McKay. Georgetown, bass clarinet: "This is my third and last region band (I'm a senior) and I've really enjoyed them. It's a great challenge to put a concert together in two days. The music isn't really difficult, but it's hard to get together. The region clinic teaches you a lot about music, especially with Dr. Revelli, and the opportunity to meet kids from other schools is a pleasant experience '

Steve Hobbs, Pflugerville. trumpet: "It's challenging, coming from a AA band to play in the region band. It's fun and it gives you a feeling of pride to be the best in the region.'

Jennifer Placke, Giddings, flute: "This is a good experience for high school musicians, whether or not they go on as musicians later in life."

Sheila LeDoux, Leander, clarinet: "Being in a region band is a fantastic experience. Meeting new people, learning new music, and working with well-known

of judging which involves 240 students formed the two teachers adds to the achievement."

Julee Martinets, Hays High School, piccolo: "I think region is a very rewarding experience. You get the benefit of making region after all your hard work, and it is a lot of fun. You get to play with good players, and when you get it all together. it really sounds great."

Jon McEachron. Georgetown, trombone: "Being in the region band is fun up to a certain point. then it gets to be work. Revelli is very strict about things like tone, pitch, and rhythm, and sometimes he seems overly so. But all in all, the region band is the only place to be if you're good.

Richard Gonzales. Leander, trombone: "It's real fun being in the region band. You meet a lot of nice people. The music isn't that hard, but sometimes it gets real hard!"

Robert Anderson, Giddings, French horn: "The clinician this year is hard for me to follow. He made some good choices with the pieces we're playing. I would have liked to play one avant-garde piece. The people are great and everyone gets along fine.

Trudy Snell, Leander, bass clarinet: "Being in an honor band with Dr. Revelli is a terrific experience. It's hard work combined with learning and fun. The benefits of such a program are tremendous. I will miss such opportunities in the future, and I hope the program continues in the Revelli tradition."

Marcos Minshew, Georgetown, trombone (third year at region): "Making region in itself is an honor, but it is also the beginning of greater honors. If you place high enough, then you can go on to more competition at area and state, but they are more work. The whole thing is a learning experience. As you progress through the competitions, you gain new ideas on how to improve your playing.

Maxine Gilford, Havs High School, flute: "I feel that making the region band is an honor. It gives you a sense of pride and it shows you just how much you can do. It helps a person learn

out the results, you feel relief and happiness if you made it. I have enjoyed playing in the region band (fourth year), especially under the direction of Dr. Revelli. He is a remarkable man, very interesting and difficult."

"The only country on the face of the earth that has school bands is America," said Revelli during the Saturday AAA concert. "I told this band yesterday that if they lived in any other country, they could not have the privilege of playing in a high school band."

Revelli sees music as a discipline of the mind that is an important part of a young person's upbringing. The band program can teach a child discipline, humanity, good citizenship, and the beauty of life.

"What America will be in the year 2000 is sitting right here," he told the audience. 'Support your local band.'

Hermann Hesse proposed a theory in Magister Ludi that might sum it all up. "We recall that in the legendary China of the Old Kings. music was accorded a dominant place in state and court. It was held that if music throve, all was well with culture and morality and with the kingdom itself. The music masters were required to be the strictest guardians of the original purity of the venerable keys. If music decayed, that was taken as a sure sign of the downfall of the regime and the state."

Many in the region band will try out for the state band. Five of Georgetown's best will try out: Tom McIntire, oboe; Sylvia Sydow, clarinet; Vincent Puskarich, alto clarinet; Roger Galpin. contra bass clarinet; and Roger Smith, alto saxophone. Mary McIntire has already made the state symphony orchestra on French horn.

On February 14-16, the state groups - the best of the best - will play a series of concerts before a convention of Texas music educators at the convention center in San Antonio. The Georgetown High School Band, under the direction of Rodney Klett and Rey Meza, all also perform at this con-

vention at 7:30 nm on the

Mallow Leaving Band in Good Shape

How do you replace a band director who has 21 consecutive Sweepstakes Awards? As one citizen said, "You don't."

James Mallow's retirement as director of the Famed Brady Bulldog Band caused consternation among band fans as well as the man on the street.

Mallow has been selling insurance for Franklin Life Insurance Co. on a parttime basis and now will be working at it full time. He will leave his band duties when school is out.

"Things are in pretty good shape for a new director. The beginners are signed up and practicing, the Florida trip for next Easter is all planned and

the money is in hand," Mallow said Wednesday.

Mallow came to Brady in 1960 after teaching five years at Santa Anna. A native of Brownwood, he attended Hardin-Simmons University and Howard Payne University and received his master's degree from North Texas State. He served three years in the U.S. Air Force where he

was a member of the 669th Air Force Band.

It took him five years to lead his band to its first of 21 Sweepstakes in 1965. Since that time each year in the spring everyone holds his breath until the results are in.

On recalling "mountain top" experiences, Mallow said probably the most exciting was the band's rendition of Wagner's "Elsa's Procession to the Cathedral" during a concert in the Brady High auditorium a few years ago.

"I still get goosebumps when I think of it. The audience was on their feet the minute the last note died away. It was an astounding experience," he said.

Other "mountain top" experiences included the first time the band marched at Disney World in

"The tremendous response we received from the people there was overwhelming," he said. They also won second runnerup in the Great American Band Concert Contest.

"Our first trip to Colorado in 1977 was impressive and we won the Field and Marching Contest.

"One of my personal highlights was the winning of the Distinguished Service Award in 1973. The whole band was there and played for the crowd," he recalled.

"I often think of the phenomenal feat of having three Bulldog Band students make the All State Band at one time. They were Darryl Huffman, Nona Neal and Donna Neal. Then at different times we had Gwen Ashba and Thomas Allen win the same honor," he related.

Mallow served on the board of directors of the Texas Bandmasters Association for 10 years and was president in 1978. He has judged contests and held clinics and plans to continue this practice.

"I am not going to lose touch with music," he vowed.

Mallow pointed out five trophies awarded by Six Flags Over Texas for "Best in Class" at contests held at the amusement park.






