He is also a vocal instructor, Mr. Obuch added, and it is hoped he will be able to arrange a program of glee club, chorus and quartet for the Antiers school.

The new director succeeds Robert T. Stoddard who resigned from the Antlers faculty to accept a similar post with Tishomingo High School.

Owens will take the Durant JHS band to Chickasha on Saturday for the state junior high instrumental contest, also sponsored by the Oklahoma Music Educators association. This one will be held on the campus of Oklahoma College for Liberal Arts.

Owens said he heard the usual "ohs" and "ahs" when he told the youngsters they'd have to put in a little overtime. But it was similar "overtime" that copped the band the class 'A' sweepstakes award at the Tri-State Band Festival held last May in Enid.

"I know all the kids won't be able to meet the sessions," Owens said today, "But I want to get as much practice in together as we possibly can."

One band apiece will be represented by Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas at the four-state convention. Owens said Durant was selected after recommendation from a pair of represenatives who had heard the band play at district and state contests.

Durant was the first of three cities selected to play at the OMEA convention. Also chosen were Weatherford and Ardmore High schools.

Three Durant band students, Brenda DeVore, and Bill and David Wakefield, also will play in the All-State Band at the Oklahoma City convention. Some 80 boys and girls across the state were named to the All-State group.

which held the honor of competing in the Oklahoma University Band Day parade this weekend in Norman, came charging home with a first place trophy.

Trophies were awarded to the top two bands in each class, A through D, according to Durant band director Don Owens. Durant took its first place trophy in class B, based upon school enrollment, beating out 18-year band winner Henryetta.

The 73-member Durant band was the eighth largest and the ninth smallest in class B, "Which goes to prove that quality comes before quantity," said Owens.

The winning trophies were presented at Owens stadium, before 58,100 football fans plus a 1.000 member band participating on the playing field.

The trophy, almost a yard tall, will be placed among the mony others won by Durant's band.

During the parade that morning, Owens selected two numbers, one arranged by

The Durant high school band, himself for judging. Owens' arrangement, "Sinfonins" was first on the agenda, then led into "Alhambra Grotto," - both spicy marches.

> The band also made "history" at Norman. Owens said the Durant band was one of the first few to march on Norman's synthetic football playing surface called Tartan Turf, during the halftime entertainment between the OU-Wisconsin game.

> "It was a patriotic show," said the band director. The 1,000 member band played march and performed numbers precision marching for the packed football audience. Owens added that no rehearsal was done when the bands finally met for the first time.

No One Key To Winning. . .

Durant Stage Band Selected As One Of Top Fifteen In The Nation

By SCOTT HANCOCK

The Durant High school stage band buzzed through last year winning top honors and was graced last month with the highest compliment of all — being named one of the top 15 bands in the nation.

Band director Don Ownes received a letter from the secretary of National Association of Jazz educators in mid-December telling him of the achievement. The bands are selected by Matt Betton a former band leader, composer and instructor who travels to all jazz festivals. The program is sponsored by the Air Force.

Owens said recordings and tapes of the stage band will be sent to the association and distributed to 500 radio stations over the nation, with Durant band members receiving recognition for the performance.

Their selection as one of the top in the nation, said Owens, was contributed mostly by the win at the Drury College Jazz festival in Springfield, Mo., last April

The director said Betton watched them receive the band's lowest rating which was a one-plus. Their highest rating was a number one with three pluses attached to it, said the proud director. While there, senior Kit Harfield was selected as the outstanding performer of the entire festival. He's the stage band's percussionsist.

"I can't think of one key to having a winning stage band," said Owens. While talking, he agreed there must be a combination of several features that bring a band into the spotlight. "I've got a bunch of 'gung-ho' kids — they really love band," said Owens.

He referred to 19 students dedicated to playing musical instruments, a combination of fine musical charts and also the responsibilites of being an outstanding band director.

Owens said the youngsters have other things to do both inside and outside the school. He said he has activities getting the concert band on its feet, besides the stage band responsibilities. But when the stage band gets together for a session once a week, Owens says everything else ceases except musical concentration.

"The band kids come in and listen to recordings and they study them. They don't listen to trash; they put on those earphones, study the best musicians and try to copy their style," said Owens. "Every member has the responsibility of carrying his load, else everyone in the band suffers. It's something that's not punched into the kids, they must have the dedication."

Owens said sometimes when a bandster doesn't carry his share, a lot of the students will tell him about it. That makes him work harder for fear he will not be befriended by fellow musicians, according to the director.

Owens, in his seventh year here, spends every spare minute at the band room, and then some. "It's not uncommon for me to come home at 10 p.m. anymore, especially before a performance." He added that his stage band may rehearse 7-11 p.m., maybe two nights a week.

"See those kids in the band room—it's after school hours on a Friday and they're sitting there studying music. They'd be there 24 hours every day if I'd let them."

When Owens has problems, who does he turn to? He said he doesn't waste time writing letters. He calls someone he trusts with a host of questions to ask. He said he won't call just anyone, it must be someone who knows the business, then he may not let that conductor hear his band until it's time.

"It's a political thing," Owens

He's recently added a French horn and an electric organ to the stage band and has begun a middle school stage band.

Proud that the middle school band has come so far in only a few months, Owens said that program is preparing the youngsters for high school band. "I lose so many good players each year during graduation, I've started the middle school

program, and those kids love it."

Senior Larry Edgmon is Owen's co-worker and middle school stage band conductor. He really likes the responsibility and has asked to come back during college to conduct, said the director.

"Edgmon is my drum major and probably one of the best saxophone players in the state," said Owens.

"I've got about 30 bandsters in the middle school program. But when they're performing, I pick the best ones and that makes them study like tigers." The band has performed publicly twice since being formed last November.

"Five years ago, the Durant stage band began playing charts like the middle school plays now. At present, we're playing charts like Channel One Suite, probably one of the hardest numbers a band can perform. Professional bands have hands full with that chart."

Music is Owen's life and he's making the best of it. Ask his students.






Car Washes Help Band





This year, for the first time ever, the Dickinson High School marching band is going to the state University Interscholastic League (U.I.L.) competition at the University of Texas, in Austin, Nov. 24. Although the band qualified to go to the contest last year, they did not go because it was the first year of competition.

"Last year, it (the state competition) was a new thing, and we had too many other things to work on," said John Gossett, assistant band director. "Also, last year all you had to do to qualify was make a first division rating (top rating), so lots of bands qualified. This year, only the two top bands at the U.I.L. marching contest can go.'

The band came in second place behind Pearland at the

marching contest

U.I.L. contest in Alvin recently, with two I's and a I+, possibly the highest rating the band has ever made at a marching contest, according to Band Director Don Owens. The band was competing against eight other bands at the 14-band contest.

Earlier in the year, the band won Outstanding Band at the La Marque marching contest. At that contest, on Oct. 25, the drum corps also won top horiors.

The judges praised the band's show extensively, remarking on the "great percussion section," the "good rythmic pulse," the "great solos" and the "effective dynamics (volumes)." They said the show was excit ing and well-thought-out.

The show begins with "Russian Easter," continuing with "Calypso," "La Suerta," "March of the Dwarfs," and ends with "Even Now." Soloists are Steve Owens, trombone; Carlos Pina, trumpet: Chris Howard, trumpet, and Dansey Med. Persey.

Who deserves credit for the band's great achievements this year? "Everybody," said Gossett. "Everybody. Wade McDonald (band director, McAdams Junior High) takes care of the brass and the microphones, Greg Dick (assistant band director, McAdams) does the drums, Mrs. Barbara Keiffer does the flags, rifles and twirlers It takes everybody to put this show together. One person couldn't do everything - no way.

"The kids have been good, too. The percussion section has had many, many extra rehersals. The flags and twirlers practice everyday after school for two hours. In fact, the kids even called early rehersals at 6:30, instead of 6:45, every morning the week before the La Marque contest.

"I think that's why we've done better this year — everybody has helped," Gossett said.







The band will not get a chance to return to Austin this month, since the University Interscholastic League moved state 4A marching contests to odd-numbered years only.


The band left the Bands of America Southwest Regional contest at Rice Stadium in October with its best finish ever in that prestigious

DHS band win streak continues

Although they didn't get a shot at defending their state championship, the members of the Dickinson High School Gator Marching Band racked up an impressive array of honors in individual and group competition this fall. The University Interscholastic League (UIL) changed the format for state marching contests, moving class 4A finals to odd-numbered years only, thus denying the DHS band the opportunity to repeat as champs.

The Gator Band nonetheless received straight First Divisions from the judges in the UIL District Marching Contest in November. In lieu of going to state, the band competed in two marching contests it usually does not attend.

The band achieved a Division I rating, Oustanding Class AA Band, and three high achievement citations at the Bands of America contest in Rice Stadium. The Gator band was the only Class AA band to advance to the finals against larger divisions, finishing sixth out of 24.

At the Sam Houston State University Marching Festival, the Dickinson marchers finished second out of 31 bands. DHS competed in the largest division against schools twice its size, remarked Director of Music Don Owens.

Band members apply that attitude to their academic work, said Ron Alhorn, Dickinson High School principal.

"The class the kids have on the marching field carries right on into the classroom," he said. "The kids in the band generally make extremely good grades."

Although Dickinson is, as Owens said, a small bedroom community without the property or personal wealth of Clear Creek or Plano, the band can handle the best.

"It's an expectation of the program," he said. "There is a desire. We want to be on top. If you don't have the desire to be number one, you're not going to get there. If you do have the desire, you still might not get there. It's our responsibility as a staff to sell the kids on the idea that it's worth it."

The desire is by no means excessive, Funk said.

"Nobody gets too stressed out," she said. "We all enjoy being in the band and want to do real well, but I don't think people go overboard about it."

Tens of thousands of people vatched the Dickinson High School Marching Gators dominate the cometition Monday night to win its burth straight state 4A band title at Memorial Stadium in Austin.

The band progressed through several levels of competition to win the state prize, beginning with regional competition, in which every band in the state competes. The Gators then won the area competition and advanced with 14 other bands to the state competition.

Owens said the parents and students are the heart and soul of the Dickinson band, and they deserve the real credit.

Mr. Gossett is a member of Phi Mu Alpha, Texas Bandmasters Association, and Texas Music Education Association.


Community Background




you for all of the outstanding work that is obviously going on at Turner Middle School."

It's a special honor for a special man. Owens' journey began in 1960, when he received his bachelor's degree in music education from Southeastern Oklahoma State University, where he also served as band presi-

dent and student conductor. He earned his master's in music education from North Texas State University in 1967 while playing trombone in the summer lab bands as well as concert bands and orchestras. School districts benefiting from his experience and knowledge include Antlers, Okla.; Junction City, Kan.; Durant, Okla.; and Texas schools located in Dickinson, Arlington, Pearland, Fort Bend, Texas City and, most recently, Waxahachie.

During Owens' tenure at Junction City, the high school band was invited to perform for the 1966 Kansas Music Educators' Convention and, under his direction, the Durant High School Band received an invitation to perform for the Oklahoma Music Educator's Convention while featuring alto saxophonist, Don Sinta. The Durant band also performed for the 1972 Midwest National Band and Orchestra Clinic.

Visitors to the Dickinson High School Band Hall are greeted by awards, plaques and trophies earned by the band with Owens as director. His efforts during a 20-year span produced included the Dickinson band earning TMEA Honor Band and the UIL State Marching Contest five times. The concert bands were also recognized with more than 40 outstanding of contest awards.

The past six years have found Owens serving as a catalyst for the Waxahachie ISD band program by forming the foundation of the youngest

The Texas Bandmasters Convention will take place in July and Donnie Owens of Waxahachie is one of four Texas band directors being inducted into the Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame.

The honor was voted upon by Phi Beta Mu, the International Band Masters Fraternity.

Additionally, in January of this year, Owens was notified that he had been elected as a Bandworld Legion of Honor Laureate, sponsored by the John Philip Sousa Foundation. Owens was selected by a committee representing all areas of North America.

His past achievements include being awarded the "Meritorious Achievement Award" by the Texas Band Masters Association in the summer of 2008, which


reads: "In recognition of your exemplary professionalism and invaluable contributions to the education of young people through the band medium.


Owens gives much credit to his wife Margie Owens, principal Ruth Sutton and all of the Clift Middle School employees for the honors being received.
