



Arsers and the others were selected from 25,000 high school band directors from throughout the nation, with

college band directors acting as judges.

Arsers declared he "just can't understand" why they selected him. However, a look at his record at Alamo Heights as band director is enough to convince anyone. During his 20 years as band director, he has won the sweepstakes in Texas high school band contests for 19 consecutive years and is now trying for the twentieth.

Speaking of the selection, Arsers said he knew of the award several months ago but it was a strict secret. He added:

"It was the first time band directors have ever been recognized on a national TV program."

GOOD TIMING

He explained that the presentation was limited to a minute and a half but that it was rehearsed for almost three hours before the presentation to get the timing. He noted:

"And if you don't think band directors have good timing, we only missed it by three seconds."





At the fifteenth annual convention of the American School Band Directors' Association held at Boulder, Colorado, August 5-8, 1967, the organization's highest award for distinguished service was bestowed upon Earl Pat Arsers of San Antonio, Texas. Past President Philip J. Fuller, representing the committee composed of all past presidents of ASBDA, made the award to Mr. Arsers at the banquet session attended by the general membership.

In order that readers of The SCHOOL MUSICIAN DIRECTOR and TEACHER columns may be fully acquainted with the achievements of the several Goldman Award winners the qualifications of each recipient are respectively set forth.

Earl Pat Arsers was born in Park Rapids, Minnesota and when he was six years of age his parents moved the family to Osage, Iowa. The father being a performer and band director for many years, also having a brother who was a band leader, young Arsers grew up in a genuine musical environment. Earl, better known to his close friends as "Pat" completed his early education in the Osage schools and after graduation attended Coe College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa and the University of Minnesota. Then he transferred to VanderCook College in Chicago and

earned his Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degrees.

As a professional musician he directed his own dance band through out the mid-west, and directed the orchestra at the Strand Theatre, in Madison, Wisconsin and Hotel Witter in Wisconsin Rapids, Wisconsin.

"Pat" Arsers taught in public schools over 29 years. In this field and particularly at the Alamo Heights High School in San Antonio, Texas where he had a long tenure his bands consistently received highly superior ratings in concert, sight reading and marching contests. He played clarinet with the San Antonio Symphony Orchestra and directed the San Antonio Professional Band for a time. He served on the organizing committee that led to the founding of ASBDA and was elected to three years of the Vice Presidency, then succeeding to the high office of President in 1956. He served the Texas Band Masters Association for three years, is among those in "Who's Who in the South and South West," "Who's Who in Music," "Making America Musical," and "Men of Note:"

Many ASBDA members will remember "Pat" Arsers for successfully hosting the annual convention in San Antonio in 1960. Also, for several years he headed an important research committee for ASBDA which was concerned with the intricacies and problems of pitch in playing woodwind instruments. He served with distinction on the exec-

utive board until his retirement from the public school instrumental field. He now holds the position of Executive Secretary of the San Antonio American Federation of Musicians since 1964.

Recently he was awarded an honorary doctorate degree from Southern College of Fine Arts. He has also responded to many invitations from the states of Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas to appear as guest conductor, clinician and adjudicator.

The American School Band Directors' Association proudly honors one of its own stalwart members with the Goldman Citation Award. Best wishes for continued success from the entire membership go to "Pat", his charming wife Bettye, and to their son recently commissioned 2nd. Lt. in the United States Air Force.

University of Texas to Erect Million Dollar No. 2 Music Building

Final plans for a new Music Building No. 2 at The University of Texas at Austin have been approved by the University System Board of Regents.

The new structure, to cost a gross estimated total of \$1.55 million, will provide enlarged rehearsal and teaching facilities for the UT Music Department.

To be housed in the three-level brick building are rehearsal halls, office and library facilities for UT's eight choral organizations, Symphonic Band, University Symphony and Longhorn Band. All rehearsal areas will have special acoustical treatment designed by the firm of Bolt, Baranek and Newman of Boston.

In addition, Music Building No. 2 will incorporate a large percussion studio, 30 office-studios for faculty instruction in wind and string instruments, 17 individual practice rooms, facilities for the University String Project and a student lounge to be furnished by Col. D. Harold Byrd, Dallas businessman who is honorary president of the Longhorn Band.

The basement area will include storage facilities for uniforms of the Longhorn Band and the choral organization.

Music Building No. 2, which will have 50,592 gross square feet of floor space, is to be located on the east side of the UT Austin campus, north of the baseball stadium (Clark Field) and south of the Law School.



The committee set out to promote better understanding among musicians, music educators, and scientists, and possible solutions to the problem involved in better teaching, better musicianship, and better instruments. In the beginning there did not seem to be any clear idea as to how this could be accomplished, but it was hoped that educational work could be done to see that standards already established were followed more closely. It was hoped that better communications could be established between all concerned. This meant a common language that each understood. Consequently, a booklet was prepared by Dr. Earle L. Kent, and Dr. Jody Hall entitled, "The Language of Musical Acoustics." Other literature used included "Dependence of Tuning of Wind Problems in Building Wind Instruments" published by C. C. Conn, Ltd. and "Deficiencies of Wind Instruments in Ensembles" by Donald W. Stauffer. Thorough understanding and useage of the StroboConn was employed. Though the study of acoustics can never make a musician, it is surely not out of place for a musician to have some knowledge of the subject, especially those to whom a band with all its ensemble and intonation problems is entrusted.

Earle Kent, Director of Research, Development and Design for C. G. Conn, Ltd., Elkhart, Indiana, received his B.S. and M.S. degrees from Kansas State University and the Ph.D. degree from the University of Michigan.

He has worked in electronics and acoustics for over 26 years and is the inventor of over 27 patented inventions. He is a Fellow in the Acoustical Society of America and is Chairman of its Technical Committee on Musical Acoustics. Dr. Kent is listed in Who's Who in Music, Who's Who in Engineering, Who's Who in the Midwest, and American Men in Science.

Dr. Jody C. Hall is engaged in the research, development, and quality control of wind instruments for C. G. Conn Ltd.

Dr. Hall, a graduate of Baylor University, the University of Texas, and Indiana University, is a former professional musician with both instrumental and vocal experience in the public schools and colleges of three states. He has lectured on musical acoustics throughout the nation and the results of his research have been published in various musical and technical periodicals.

"We've Got Them Beat"

We've got them beat to death. Our modern high school kids have what it takes. I am referring, of course, to our present day high school bands. And I can prove it.

I have in my record collection several band recordings of the prewar period. Records made by the Columbia Grafonola Co., and by the Little Wonder Record Co. Never hear of them? Undoubtedly, lots of you never have. But here they are, "Our Director March" played by the Columbia Band, Monte Carlo Valse played by the famous Garde Republicaine Band of France. A Coon Band Contest (Cake Walk-Two Step) by an Orchestra, (actually a band) and numerous others. Are they good? Certainly they are. Fine renditions in traditional style by solid organization. But are they better than our present day high school bands of established calibre? Decidedly not, they are inferior and in no small degree.

Considering the methods of recording in those post war days, is it fair to make such a comparison? I believe it is, for when these records are played on a modern phonograph the tone is there. Every essential to good band performance is there. Why then can we say we have them beat? Because of the quality of the instruments with which we work and the instrumentation of our modern bands.

I started playing in my home town band when I was in knee pants. I had a fifteen key Albert system clarinet you wouldn't today wish off on your worst enemy. We had a full section of upright peck-horns—a french horn was something mysterious and used only in symphony orchestras. We played a fourth of July celebration one year and hired a bassoonist from a nearby city to help us out. When he unpacked the bassoon everyone backed off thinking it was loaded and would probably go off. During the war one of our more daring members bought a saxophone. He was the envy and admiration of everyone in the country for several years. Imagine! This barely twenty-one years ago. Very few non-professional bands of that period boasted over four of five clarinets, most of them were hopelessly flat. A flute was a novelty, a xylophone something to be heard in vaudeville acts, tympanis almost unheard of and anyone that played an oboe was sure to go Progress-you can't deny it!

I returned last month from our state band clinic with worlds of respect for my fellow teachers. I had the honor of trying out and rating the double reeds and saxophones in one of the two clinic bands. They were all good! At the first rehearsal of the clinic band I wondered if Mr. Sousa, Prince, VanderCook or King (aside from their first chair men-soloist) ever assembled as good a band and one that played as well at their first rehearsal. In due respect to all of the aforementioned, I doubt And I doubt if that clinic band under the direction of any of those named men would ever be as good as their professional bands. difference—the maturity of the players and the experience. Nevertheless, there it was, a ninety piece band that had never played together before, under a strange director, giving out in a musicianly manner in a creditable fashion.

I will be so bold as to say that a second line born today is better than a first line instrument of twenty years ago. Thank our instrument manufacturers for that. I will go further and say that our best high school bands today are as good as our professional bands of thirty years ago. Mechanically as good at least, and probably better. Thank our good teachers as men of wisdom and foresight for that. I say further, kids, get a good horn and get in a good high school band or get a good teacher and go to it. We've got them beat to death.

Solo Playing

By Young Musicians

It has always been my contention that we music educators fail to give our younger band students enough song material or "solo playing" as supplementary material to our accepted texts. MARCH 1942

With this in mind, and recalling from professional legitimate experience that the most difficult of all playing is solo passages, I inaugurated, esvehal years ago, a "solo day." This was Confined to the advanced band in the Grammar School, players in the fifth, sixth, and seventh grades. Usually Friday of each week, after the preliminary "warm-up" exercises, each child is given an opportunity to play their choice of solo. The only requisite is that the solo must not be from one of our instruction books. The remainder of the class is allowed to pass judgment on the individual playing, with constructive comments. At no time did I mention the possibility of the player becoming nervous or frightened, on the contrary, I stressed relaxation and ease of mind to the student. No student was compelled to play a solo, but additional grade points were given to those performing. Now, after no particular effort on my part to "sell" the solo idea to the student, what an event "solo day" is for our band! With what ease and absence of self-consciousness the little tots perform! What interesting study of the child's home musical taste is unfolded.

The following list of solos were performed by students of the advanced grammer shoool band during one Friday afternoon. They are representative of almost any "solo day" we have. They

certainly run the gamut of musical taste, and to watch the listeners pounce upon mistakes in time figures and key signatures is a revelation.

In closing, I should like to pass along this additional thought. Few enough students play at home to insure their folks that they are seriously interested in music. By having them practice for solo day at home, out of a hymnal or song book, they call attention to the fact that they can play. As one parent recently told me, "I had no idea my child could play like that."

The Saxophone in the High School Band? Much Neglected Instrument Says Pat Arsers

The saxophone is the most neglected instruments in the High School Band. Already I can hear the howls of erision emenating from band lea ers over the country. A little stious thought, and a perusal of facts, however, will prove the above statement beyond a shadow of a doubt. Why this condition exists I shall endeavor to discuss.

Not so many years ago the saxophone was considered a novelty. not a legitimate musical instrument. That curse has remained with the saxophone and the saxophonist down to the present time. True, it has been accepted as a standard integral part of every organization, but it has remained throughout the years more on the basis of a necessary evil than a vital unit of the concert band. Why it has remained in this lesser light is beyond my poor powers of comprehension.

To my mind the saxophone section of the band is a connecting link between the reeds and the brass. Why should this remain the weak link? If more band directors and teachers would suddenly awake to the possibilities of a better balanced and better toned saxophone section the ultimate result would LYONS BAND NEWS

Poppycock you say, but don't forget Mr. Leaders-that those selfsame Mothers and Dads are the ones that pay YOU and sooner or later are the ones that have to be satisfied.

I am not going to advocate any system for teaching the saxophone. All of you intelligent band directors are capable of developing tone and technique. And by tone I do not mean the thin colorless tone so prevalent among our young players. Neither do I advocate the "whiney" fast vibrato common to popular dance orchestras. But I do advocate a full resonant tone with a minimum of vibrato and a lot of "diaphram push." There are plenty of such tones as standards, the clever instructor will accept them as his criterion.

My idea of an ideal saxophone section for a Class A band would be: soprano, first and second alto, C-melody, first and second tenor, baritone and bass. Yes, I specified C-melody. Unthinkable you say. No more so than a beginning oboist or E-flat clarinetist for tone production. Another C part in your band would be an asset. One good C-melody tone would be the equivalent of eight flutes. Yet you struggle and strive with the young flutist for tone and volume, and eighty percent of the time even the well trained ear cannot discern the flute in a large combination. I am not going on record as saying a C-melnav dividends for everyone of them. ody saxophone could replace the

MUSIC AND A SENSE OF HUMOR

Bergen Evans, in his book "It's Tough To Be Young," states "Of genuine humor (among the young) there is very little. In seventeen years of teaching I do not believe that I have heard five witticisms from students and out of several thousand themes I cannot recollect ten that brought an intended smile. Nothing said by any lecturer could hope to provoke the delight that would be caused by his falling off the platform or dropping his notes."

A* Band Director with a keen sense of humor himself sent me this paragraph with a statement: "Unless I am generally blessed with a group of comedians, which is unlikely, I believe we have more good wholesome wit dispensed in a week than all the comedians and their writers can think up in a month. I appreciate that in my classes the humor must be concerned mostly with music and that a knowledge of that must be acquired before sharing in it but the fact remains that it is there. It may be a task to be humorous about history or mathematics, but it surely isn't about music."

We do not know what classes Bergen Evans taught in the schools; but it is very difficult to think of any teacher spending seventeen years in the teaching profession and not have collected a group of clever witticisms that would far excel the commercial joke books now on the market.

Mr. Pat Arsers, San Antonio, Texas, told us about one of the band members who was delegated to pull the curtain during the concert of an a capella choir which was appearing at the school. After the first few numbers he was to close the curtain. Doing a beautiful job of bungling the draw, i.e. several slow plus quick starts in the wrong direction he came up with this quickie "I'll bet I'm the only kid in school who can play a solo on that curtain." I have never yet been with a group of music teachers at music conferences or state meetings but what good wholesome humor and keen witticisms and much laughter was prevalent everywhere. The anecdotes of these teachers telling about the witticisms of their students were the foundation of most of the cheerfulness so prevalent. I have never heard of any research being made regarding the relationship of music and humor development in a child; but I do think it would be worth some research.

"This happened to me at the tail end of somewhat chekered career as a professional musician. During the war years I was asked to fill in with the

San Antonio Symphony when an extra clarinetist or a saxophone section was used. A prominent conductor was to be the guest, and of course the orchestra was "loaded." Under such circumstances it was usual for the librarian to send to me the parts of the pieces to be played, inasmuch as my teaching load prevented me from attending rehearsals. When I went down for a warm up prior to the concert I sensed something wrong, and so inquired what was "up" from one of the orchestra members. He advised me that guest conductor so and so was a first rate dictator and that he had gone over and shook one of the violinists that morning at rehearsal. At my age and that stage of the game I was not particularily concerned with what any conductor thought of my playing, having been insulted by some of the very best men in the business. The concert went along well enough until we came to an encore, and instead of the usual tacit sheet I was confronted (written in the Spanish idiom) with a third clarinet part that looked like it had been collaborated on by Lazurus and Klose and they had both been sore at all third clarinetists. In other words it had stems without notes, D. 'Sos, D. C's, etc. and all words were in Brazilian (to me.) Naturally I started with the down beat and immediately became lost. I thought perhaps I could pick up the part at a letter, but after being thoroughly confused and lost I quit trying to "fake." I was sitting on the end chair in the reed section and we were next to the heel chair

fiddles, so after one or two more nasty looks from the maestro I leaned over to a fiddler who was furiously playing and inquired, "Where in the blue blank Hades are we?" Without, apparently, missing a note the answer came, "Darned if I know." As an afterthought, that particular conductor has never appeared with the San Antonio orchestra again—I'm several up on him—I have!"





State Winner for Three Years Enters Festival

The Sinton High School Band, which made an appearance in Corpus Christi during the Buccaneer Days celebration, will play a return engagement during the Region 7 music festival March 15 and 16, when it will compete in the band contest to be conducted by the Texas Music Educators Association.


The band, which has 60 members, has won the first division of Class C in the state music festival for the past three years. In 1938, under the direction of Donald Hatch, they also received first place at the Seguin and Kingsville, A&I College, band contests.

For the past two years the Sinton musical aggregation has attended the national regional contest in Abilene and placed in the second division both in concert and marching each year. The band has also appeared at the an-nual rodeo held in Beeville, the Robstown cotton festival, the Goliad band fete and the band festival at Victoria for three years.

In 1934 the band went to Greenwood Miss, where it won first place in Class C in the all-South band contest. The aggregation of the contest of tion was organized in 1933 through the combined efforts of the Sinton Board of Education Superintendent of Schools Wiley Seale, now of Harlandale High School in San Antonio, and Dan and Walt Martin.


Three Members of Organization Selected to Appear in All State Band at Masters Meet.



This isn't as fantastic as it sounds when you learn that the band is rehearsing "Hey, Pedro," a novelty number, for their coming concert. The number begins when Mr. Pat "Pedro" Arsers enters a darkened stage (after intermission) dressed in a scrape and sombrero to find the band all taking a siesta. He shouts "Hey, Pedro!" and the gourd player awakens with a start and begins the samba rhythm pattern. He in turn shouts to the "Pedro" who plays the claves, and he begins tapping out his part.

The Pedros who play the maracas and snare drum are next summoned, and they call to the "Pedro" who plays the bass to start his part. Earl O. "Pat" Arsers, TBA Bandmaster of the Year, is well known in music circles. EARL O. "PAT" ARSERS

Earl O. "Pat" Arsers, former Vice President, Executive Secretary and Executive Board Member of Local 23, San Antonio. Texas, died August 10 at the age of seventy-three. He attended ten Conventions of the Federation as a delegate, serving on several committees, the last being the International Musician Committee.

Mr. Arsers had also been a member of Locals 230, Mason City, Iowa; 10-208, Chicago, Illinois; and 73, Minneapolis, Minnesota.

As a performing musician, Mr. Arsers played in a number of fine orchestras and had his own orchestra that performed through the Midwest area in the late 1920s and

'30s. He directed the pit orchestra at the Strand Theatre in Madison, Wisconsin, as well as played in the Mayo Park Band in Rochester, Minnesota, under the direction of Harold Cook, the Fort Dodge Municipal Band under the direction of Karl King, and the San Antonio Symphony Orchestra during his early years in that city. Mr. Arsers was also an important member of possibly the last big band, the Rex Preis Orchestra, in the San Antonio

Past President and a founder of the Texas Bandmasters Association, Mr. Arsers was named Texas Bandmaster of the Year in 1961. He was on the organizing committee and served as President of the American School Band Directors Association, and was a member of the American Bandmasters Association.

In 1943 Mr. Arsers became director of the Alamo Heights High School Band where he stayed until his retirement in 1963. His record was outstanding — receiving only First Divisions in concert, marching and sight reading during his

teaching career there.



Mr. Arsers was also presented a plaque by "The First Chair of America," in 1957 "for outstanding achievement in the field of school music and for setting the highest national standards in performance."

Besides receiving an honorary Doctor of Music degree from the Southern College of Fine Arts in 1959, Mr. Arsers was selected "Texas Bandmaster of the Year" in 1961 and made an honorary life member of the Texas Bandmaster's Association.
