


"Music For A Nation To Grow By"



#### STATE FAIR TEXAS MUSIC FESTIVAL

(ABrief History)
By Harry Barton

The Texas Music Festival was started as a showcase for Texas high school musical talent and was presented as a free event during the annual State Fair of Texas in Dallas. Held in the Cotton Bowl and on the Fair grounds, it featured individual concerts at various locations on the grounds during the day, and massed pageantry and concerts in the bowl at night.

The Festival was sponsored jointly by the State Fair and the Texas Music Educators Association. The first Texas Music Festival was held on a trial basis in October 1950. At that time the Fair asked George Royster, band director at Woodrow Wilson H.S. in Dallas, to handle the daytime concerts and help with commercial housing. I was asked to plan and produce the night pageantry and concerts in the Cotton Bowl.

The massed groups presented in the evening numbered between 1500-2500 for the bands: 500-1500 for the choruses; and 500-1000 for the orchestras. The latter was placed on a low platform at the 50 yard line press box side. The chorus was located in the opposite stands at the 50 yard line. Accompaniment varied from using a band on the field in front of the chorus, or electric organ. Amplification was used for both chorus and orchestra through huge concert speakers along the sideline press box side. The bands played in formations which usually stretched from goal line to goal line and from side to side of the field

Rehearsal for the chorus was held in the bowl frp, 3:00 to 4:00 p.m. From 4:00 until 6:00 p.m. the bands rehearsed, and the orchestra from 6:30 until 7:30 p.m. Conductors for the groups usually included the president of TMEA and the State Chorus, Orchestra and Band Chairmen, and other guest conductors.

After the first Festival in 1950, Patrick Nelson made a suggestion, at a combined meeting of the TMEA Board and State Fair officials, that greatly simplified the task of selecting groups to participate. As a result of the suggestion a "State Fair: Chairman" was appointed in each region to coordinate the

selection of not morethan two bands, choruses and orchestras from each region. Soon it became customary for these to be selected during the Region meetings at the annual TMEA Convention.

From the few records I have been able to locate, here is a list of the 1956 State Fair Chairmen:

Planning the 1958 Festival, the State Fair decided to present a silver plaque to a nationally known music figure. Fittingly enough, the first presentation was to the "Music Man" himself, Meredith Wilson. Following, not necessarily in order, were Frank Loesser, Mitch Miller, Arthur Fiedler, and Henry Mancini.

In passing, I'd like to mention two sidelights to the above paragraph. The first concerns the Meredith Wilson Festival. On the morning of the event I recieved word that my mother was dying in Iowa. I called my good friend Jack mahan in Arlington, who came and took over the rehearsals and produced the show. For that, I shall be forever grateful.

The second concerns a "conducting lesson" I gave to Arthur Fiedler. While the podiums for the chorus and orchestra were placed as normal, podium for the band was placed halfway up up in the stands. To Fiedler, the distance probably made him

feel as if he could stayed in Boston and conducted from there. After rehearsing the chorus and orchestra, he started up the stadium steps to where I was standing by the podium. As he got to me his eyes were as big as saucers. "From Here?" he said. Trying to set hims at ease, I replied, "yes sir, Mr. Fiedler. We have been directing from here for many years. It will go just fine." Definitely not convinced, he turned toward the bands and gave a "symphonic" downbeat. Not a thing happened. In a panic he turned to me and his expression seemed to say, "Now see what you've done!" I reassured him, "Now don't worry. Just give them a good old-fashioned straight downbeat." Still unconvinced, he turned and did as I had suggested. Without a hitch the bands began the "Star And Stripes Forever". Fiedler turned to me and gave a big wink!

I will always cherish the twelve or more years that I was connected with the Texas Music Festival. It was a great pleasure to work with thefine directors of Texas musical groups and the Executive Board of TMEA.

During that time upwards of 170 bands, 55 orchestras, and 125 choirs from all regions of Texas participated.

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
Harry Barton was born and raised in Winfield, Iowa. He started his career by playing trumpet in the high school orchestra. Upon graduation and for the next several summers, he directed the Winfield Municipal Band, an organization which had a 50 year history. He attended Parsons College at Fairfield, Iowa. Beginning with his sophomore year he conducted the college band for four years. He also managed several college musical groups, including the 97 voice Philharmonic Choir, of which he was Assistant Conductor. After graduating with B.A. and B.M. degrees he taught band at Thompson, Iowa where his band achieved statewide honors. Harry moved to Dallas, Texas in 1938 and taught band and orchestra in several schools. In 1942 he obtained a Master of Arts degree from the University of Northern Colorado at Greeley, Colorado. He served three years in the service during World War II, much of that time as director of the 443rd Air Force Band at Frederick and Enid, Oklahoma. After his service duty he moved to the Highland Park Independent School District in Texas as Supervisor of Insrumental Music. While at Highland Park he helped organize and direct the Highlander Festival. This was an invitational competition for bands, choruses and orchestra from Texas and surrounding states. Nationally known educators served as judges. For many years he produced and directed the Texas Music Festival for the State Fair of Texas. This festival was sponsored jointly by the Texas Music Educators Association and the State Fair of Texas. Performing in the Cotton Bowl were outstanding Texas bands, choruses and orchestras selected by regional committees of the TMEA. These festival groups performed under such musical luminaries as Meredith Wilson, Richard Rodgers, Arthur Fiedler, Frank Loessor, Mitch Miller, and Henry Mancini. From 1961-1967 he was Musical Director of Six Flags Over Texas, during which time he organized the Six Flags Over Texas Music Festival. This was a competition festival for those groups having won top honors in their respective states.

From 1958-1983 he served as Director of Pageantry for the Cotton Bowl Athletic Association. In that capacity he produced and directed all activities during Pre-Game and Half-Time of the New Years Day Cotton Bowl Classic, using Texas high school bands as star performers in massed formations.

Harry has been an active member of the Texas Music Educators Association, Texas Bandmasters Association and Phi Beta Mu. He is a recipient of the Broadcast Music Inc. "Music In Sports Award".



# Cotton Bowl Pageantry

A small, cluttered room in a deserted school building is the birthplace of enough noise to deafen all East and South Dallas.

Pageantry has its cradle there, too. And the diligent fathers are Harry Barton and George Springer, masterminds of the fabulous musical and marching productions always associated with the annual Cotton Bowl football game.

The spot is a second floor room at Highland Park High School. Mr. Barton (often called "Colonel") and Mr. Springer started their drudgery a month ago, working at nights when the only sounds up and down the dark halls were their echoing footsteps.

And when this year's pre-game and half-time Cotton Bowl festivities are finished—a complex and spirited "History of the Cotton Bowl" is the theme—their work will be done for another 11 months.

For the past four years, Col. Barton has scheduled and planned all of these Cotton Bowl activities—the pre-game show, team warm-up times, the Cotton Bowl Queen's parade, the sportsmanship award, high school band pageantry, and performance of the service units.

Everything must be timed, almost to the half-minute. This includes introduction of both Cotton Bowl teams, playing of the alma maters of the two competing schools, and the Star Spangled Banner—all before the game.

Then, at half-time, each of the university bands parades for five minutes. The high-stepping Kilgore Rangerettes get another five minutes, and in a grand finale all marching units and bands are on the field for another five minutes to offer a massive number.


Before this ever happens, Col. Barton and Mr. Springer know exactly why that sandy-haired tuba player has to make three right flank movements...how far high school band No. 4 can stretch... and if the fourth clarinet player from Lufkin is tall enough to keep step with everybody else.

The Cotton Bowl show this year brings together five of the finest high school bands in Texas — from Lufkin, Dimmitt, Odessa, Garland and W. W. Samuell of Dallas. And before they ever come to Dallas, they have been practicing on the Cotton Bowl music and pageantry, mainly from charts produced by Col. Barton and Mr. Springer.


The band and marching directors from all schools involved met in Dallas Nov. 27 to coordinate signals and go over the 10 pages of instructions and music. There's even an estimate as to how many steps each marcher will have to take, and before the final production is reeled off before the Cotton Bowl audience it is all timed with a stop-watch.



Col. Barton, right, and George Springer plan during night session.




Massed band pageantry like this 1960 Cotton Bowl scene, traditional

# It takes hours of hard work to coordinate colorful pre-game and half-time activities



with the New Year's Day game, takes weeks of planning and preparation.

Under ideal conditions, the visiting bands come to Dallas two days before the game and have three outdoor rehearsals.

But on the very first rehearsal morning in 1959, Dallas weather turned drizzly and and cold and Col. Barton had to get busy. Braniff International Airways granted him permission to use an old hangar to rehearse, and a football field was hurriedly marked off inside.

Then, while the youngsters went through their paces on the concrete, four inches of snow fell outside.

"And on top of it all, we just couldn't hear anything in the hangar," Col. Barton said. "The reverberation was so bad we could hear a piece of music three minutes after we had stopped playing."

Headaches come by the dozen. If, after hours of searching, Col. Barton and Mr. Springer come up with a list of song titles that fit the chosen Cotton Bowl theme, they very often cannot find any published arrangement of the song. Then, they have to go through the long and detailed process to get permission to arrange and use the music.

Gimmicks — such as crepe paper, balloons, etc. — can always be tough to handle. Once, when white balloons were used by the marchers, Col. Barton had to hunt down a helium supplier and get the balloons filled on New Year's morning.

Col. Barton designates one man to do nothing but get all the Queens from the various Southwest Conference schools on their floats, and see that their big bouquets get to them.

Another complication is that the Cotton Bowl game is televised nationally. That, of course, makes the time schedule imperative. Getting the teams on held at 1:58 p.m. and off at 2:20 p.m. is one of the big problems.

Col. Barton, band director at Highland Park High School since 1947 and also director of instrumental music for the Highland Park school system, does the announcing job from the press box high over the Cotton Bowl. Down on the field, coordinating, is Mr. Springer.

A native of Winfield, Iowa, Col. Barton is a graduate of Parsons College and also holds his masters degree from Colorado State at Greeley, Colo.

From this tough, intricate job, he has gained the satisfaction of a virtually thankless task well done. And he has learned, too, about the energy and loyalty of his students.


"I am constantly amazed at the way these high school youngsters can rise to the occasion under pressure and do far beyond what you might think they can do," he said. "They're just smart, and they get a big kick out of performing."





## **Cotton Bowl "Music** Man" Retires



ike Broadway's "Music Man," the Cotton Bowl's "Music Man" is a native Iowan. Harry Barton, who retires with today's performance after 27 years of producing Cotton Bowl Clas- years. sic pre-game and halftime pageantry, began making people happy through music by playing trumpet in the Winfield, round of applause than his bands and pretty girls will receive Iowa High School Band . . .

That was some 50 years ago and since that time Barton's career has been literally one beautiful musical note after another. He directed the Winfield, Iowa Municipal Band, the Parsons College (Iowa) Band and the Thompson (Iowa) Band before moving to Texas in 1938 where he eventually became supervisor of instrumental music in the prestigious Highland Park system.

During his tenure at Highland Park, Barton was one of the organizers and producer and director of the Texas Music Festival at the huge State Fair of Texas as well as musical director for six years of the famed Six Flags amusement park.

But it is his work with the Cotton Bowl for the past 27 years that has earned handsome, silver-haired Barton the most renown. A fixture on CBS televison for all but one of those years, Barton's pageantry has been not only musically appealing, but certainly among the most colorful and attractive of all bowl shows.

Today, Harry will be aided in his final Cotton Bowl Classic effort by wife, Eloise, and son Harry Jr., both of whom have been a part of the Cotton Bowl activities for most of his 27
