

#### In Memoriam

Marion Busby, 51, coordinator of music for the Corpus Christi Independent School District, died December 19, 1971, after a short illness. He resided with his family at 930 Meadowbrook. He was a native of Spur and attended high school in Weslaco. He received his Bachelor's degree in music from Baylor University and his Master's degree from Texas A&I University at Kingsville.

Busby served as band director at Weslaco, Lockhart, Taft, and San Benito High Schools. He moved to Corpus Christi in 1963 when he became director of the Del Mar School of Music Band. He served in the position until 1966 when he was named Coordinator of Music in Corpus Christi.

Horace Britt, an internationally distinguished cellist and professor emeritus of the University of Texas, died Wednesday morning, February 3, 1971, at an Austin convalescent center.

Professor Britt, born June 18, 1881, in Antwerp, Belgium, was a naturalized citizen of the U.S., who taught at UT Austin from 1947 until his retirement in 1963. Trained at the National Conservatory of Music in Parks, where he received the Premier Prix in violincello, he appeared throughout the world as a cello soloist with leading symphonies and achieved a renown approaching that of a cellist, Pablo Casals (with whose orchestra he appeared in Barcelona).

At UT Austin in the early 1950's he founded the University String Quartet, which was composed of faculty artists and which achieved a national reputation as a chamber music ensemble. The group included violinists Angel Reyes and Alfio Pignotti, violist Albert Gillis and Mr. Britt.

#### MARION BUSBY

MARION BUSBY WAS BORN IN SPUR, TEXAS IN 1919. HE RECEIVED HIS BACHELOR OF MUSIC DEGREE FROM BAYLOR UNIVERSITY, AND HIS MASTER OF MUSIC DEGREE FROM TEXAS A & I UNIVERSITY.

HIS TEACHING CAREER STARTED AT LOCKHART, TEXAS IN 1940. HE THEN MOVED TO SAN BENITO WHERE HE DIRECTED THE HIGH SCHOOL BAND FOR THREE YEARS. WHILE THERE HE FOUNDED AND ORGANIZED THE PIGSKIN JUBILEE MARCHING CONTEST FOR THE VALLEY BANDS.

HE SERVED IN THE UNITED STATES NAVY FROM 1944-1945.

HE SPENT ONE YEAR WITH SOUTHERN MUSIC CO. OF SAN ANTONIO, AND THEN RETURNED TO TEACHING.

IN 1946 HE BECAME DIRECTOR OF BANDS AT TAFT HIGH SCHOOL IN TAFT, TEXAS, AND REMAINED THERE FOR \$100 YEARS. DURING HIS TENURE, HIS BANDS RECEIVED CONSISTENT FIRST DIVISIONS IN EVERY CATEGORY. IT HAS BEEN SAID THAT WHEN THE TAFT HIGH SCHOOL BAND TRAVELED, SCHOOLS HAD TO BE CLOSED, BECAUSE VIRTUALLY EVERY PERSON IN SCHOOL WAS IN THE BAND.

IN 1956 HE MOVED TO WESLACO, TEXAS. HIS WESLACO HIGH SCHOOL BANDS WERE TWICE NAMED HONOR BANDS BY TMEA, AND ON FOUR DIFFERENT OCCASIONS AT THE BUCCANEER DAYS MUSIC FESTIVAL THEY WERE NAMED OUTSTANDING 3A BAND.

MARION BUSBY WAS DIRECTOR OF BANDS AT DEL MAR COLLEGE FROM 1963 TO 1967.

IN 1967 HE BECAME THE SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC FOR THE CORPUS CHRISTI SCHOOLS UNTIL HIS DEATH IN 1970.

MARION BUSBY WAS PRESIDENT OF TBA IN 1953-54. HE WAS POSTHUMOUSLY AWARDED BANDMASTER OF THE YEAR IN 1977. HIS PICTURE WITH HIS BARITONE APPEARED IN THE ORIGINAL VICTOR BAND METHOD BOOK AS AN EXAMPLE FOR CORRECT POSTURE.


We hope that this dedication will bring some harpiness to your life, as he was always a sparkle in our lives.

# Weslaco's High School Band Is Praised Highly in Austin

Weslaco High School Band mu-by Grainger; "Pastorale" by Clifbands, and the honor orchestra sicans and their leaders received ton Williams, "The Blue-Tail Fly" (which was from Austin High at the Texas Music Educators Convention in Austin last weekend.

Some 128 band members, Director Marion Busby, his assistant, Manuel Garza, and a group of chaperones left Weslaco Friday at 5:15, and returned, Sunday at 5 p.m. led back into town by an honor escort provided by the Weslaco Police Department. They made the trip in four chartered busses.

Weslaco's appearance at the convention was Friday evening, following the presentation of the Class A honor band from Three Rivers.

The Weslaco group played "Marcho Scherzo" by D. I. Moore, with assistant director Manuel Garza, Jr., conducting, and "Antiphony For Winds" by Gerald Kechley, 'Irish Tune from County Derry"

Texas Class AAA Division Busby conducted the last five Busby conducted the last five numbers.

The audience, made up of some 4,000 music educators from all over the state, were still applauding the Weslaco group, as they left the stage to make room for the All-State Chorus which followed them on the program.

In the wings, Von Kreisler, director of the University of Texas symphony orchestra, was the first to commend the group very

Charles Sawhill, conductor of the All State Band for the TMA Convention, and director of bands at the University of California at Los Angeles said the Weslaco group was the finest high school band he had ever heard. He is a veteran musician.

The next day at the TMA period when directors of the honor

(which was from Austin High School in El Paso) were criticised and queried by other music educations, the Weslaco band came in for more praise, from the standpoint of their performance, instrumentation, and their demeanor.

Also on Friday evening, The Austin High School orchestra played, and the All State Chorus gave an outstanding performance "The Testament of Freedom" by Randall Thomas. The "Testament of Freedom" includes selected texts from the writings of Thomas Jefferson. The group was accom-panied by the Texas University Symphony Orchestra and was directed by Lara Hoggard.

Saturday's program for the Weslaco group included a tour of the University of Texas, including a trip to the top of the University's tower for a panoramic view of the city; a tour of the state capitol; a picnic lunch at

"We believe your money was well invested and your efforts well spent. The ladies and gentle-

## Marion Busby Resigns As Band Teacher

Marion Busby submitted his letter of resignation to the Taft School board of trustees in person last Thursday night during the board's regular meeting.

Mr. Busby has been band director in Taft for the past eight years, coming to Taft in 1948 from a job with the Southern Music Company. Previous to this he served two and one half years in the Navy as a gunner.

Educated at Baylor University, Mr. Busby had directed bands at Lockhart and San Benito before the war.

The Taft band, under Mr. Busby, has achieved a manber of recognitions in the high school musical world, earning division I ratings in marching, sight reading and concert in the interscholastic contests. In 1951 the band was invited to take part in the Tri-State Band Festival in Enid,Okla., and was the only band entered to take a first division rating in all three contests. This past year they also earned top billing in each contest in the Brownsbille contest.

Mr. Busby has accepted a job as band director in the Weslaco school system. This is the way of a promotion for the Taft band leader and he will also have two

assistants in his new job.

Mr. and Mrs. Busby are both natives of Weslaco and both attended high school there. Mrs. Busby's mother still lives there. The Busbys plan to leave about Auguest 1 to make their home in Weslaco. They have two children, Sue, 14, and Jan, seven.

# HIGH HONORS AWARDED TAFT SCHOOL BAND

TAFT—The Taft School Band, directed by Marion Busby, took three top honors at a tri-state band festival in Enid, Okla., last week.

Competing in a field of 100 bands, the Taft band was the only organization in all classifications to win first division rating in three contests marching, sightreading, and concert

Busby said that 110 musicians and 30 parents made the trip to Enid, occupying three chartered Greyhound busses. The Taft band competed Wednesday and Thursday.

By taking the three first divisions at Enid, the Taft band won the highest honors in its history. The victories at the three-state festival in which bands from 12 states competed climaxed the Taft band's most successful season. During the past several months, the musicians here have won many honors in Class AA competition.

Busby has been director of the Taft School Band since 1948. For many years music has been empha-

st ed in the Taft school system.

## Taft High School Band Again Wins Laurels in Music Contests With Keen Competition; Gets First Division Rating

The Taft High Band has again returned triumphant from recent music contests. Its latest victory was at the Region 7 marching contest held Saturday, December 3 at Robstown.

The Taft Band was the only band in class A to receive a first division rating in marching at the "Competition-Festival" in competition with such bands as Robstown, Beeville, Falfurrias, Alice, and Sinton.

Bands are graded by Division Ratings, rather than places. The organizations participate against a standard rather than each other. These ratings range from First Division, highest reting possible These ratings range from First Division, highest rating possible and indicative of a perfect performance, to Fifth Division. Therefore it it is possible for all participating bands to rate First Division or for none of the bands to rate First Division. Very rarely is only one band in any class given the honor of a First Division rating, but the Taft Band has accomplished this task twice in the past year. Last spring at in the past year. Last spring at the contest this band was rated First Division in Concert Playing and was the only band in class A to receive this rating.

Some of the Judges comments were as follows:

were as follows:

"This is really a concert band on the field. The marching is perfect. The band maintains musical balance at all times and yet drills with precision. The band is consistant in its marching and playing. This band is a credit to its school and community. The band shows a lot of hard work and attention to small details which distinguishes itself in performances. This band plays with a concert tone in anybody's league. Almost the impossible accomplished in such a chort accomplished in such a short time. The meticuluous balance of the playing of this band is worthy of much praise. Musical selections well-chosen for the group. This is the nearest thing to a walking symphony."

The late Marion Busby of Corpus Christi was installed posthumously in the Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame during ceremonies last weekend in San Antonio.

The service highlighted a meeting of the Texas Bandmasters Association attended by band directors from across the state. Busby served as president of the state organization in 1953-54.

Attending the installation service were Busby's widow, Maydeene Busby of Corpus Christi and their daughter, Sue Busby Wells, now of Houston.

Busby's teaching career began in Lockhart and included band directorships in San Benito, Taft, Weslaco and Del Mar College. He became supervisor of music for Corpus Christi Public Schools in 1967 and served until his death in 1970.

Busby was posthumously named Bandmaster of the Year in 1977, and a picture of him with his baritone appeared in the original Victor Band Method book as an example of correct posture.

The Bandmasters Hall of Fame was established in 1975 by Alpha chapter, Phi Beta Mu, an international bandmasters fraternity. The Hall of Fame is located in the state headquarters of the Texas Music Educators Association in Austin.

Marion Busby, director of the Weslaco High School band, has been noted for his fine work in the band field for many years. Under his direction, the Weslaco band has compiled an enviable record both in Interscholastic League competition and at the Buccaneer Music Festival.

Bryce Taylor, director of the Three Rivers band, has consistently developed outstanding bands. The Three Rivers band, though only in class A, time after time has given superior performances of the more difficult numbers in the concert band repertoire. They have received many awards and high praise from nationally known adjudicators in Interscholastic League competition and at the Buccaneer Music Festival.
