

1986 HALL OF FAME

RAY GABBARD



James Raymond Gabbard began studying the trumpet privately at ten years of age. He played in the Stigler High School Orchestra until his graduation and then attended Oklahoma A&M. On the adivce of Boh Makovsky, he switched instruments and became the first french horn major at that school. He participated as a soloist in the first annual Oklahoma and Interstate Band Clinic.

After graduation in 1935, Ray spent his first year teaching in Konowa where his band made a superior rating at the state contest. Following that year, he taught in Oklahoma City at Webster Junior High and then at Northeast High School. In addition to his teaching duties, he performed with the Oklahoma City Symphony. In November of 1942, he was hired at Ardmore High School where he served as band director for twelve years.

In 1954, Ray opened his own music store but his love of teachig never died. Encouraged by the county superintendent he began four band programs in small country schools and taught them for a period of four or five years. The superintendent of the Ardmore Public Schools then asked him to return and teach the elementary band, which he did until his retirement in 1967.


Raymond Gabbard died in 1986 but his influence, especially in the music community of the Ardmore area, will be felt for year in the future.

W.A. "Tony" ANDERSON

Tony Anderson started on the cornet under George Kyme at Picher, Oklahoma. While in high school there, he was able to participate in the 1931 National Band Contest held in Tulsa, Oklahoma and performed there under the baton of John Philip Sousa. The Picher High School Band earned fifth place in Class C at that national contest.

Although he taught for four years at Maud, Tony is best known in Oklahoma for his 17 years at Henryetta. Beginning with only about 20 students, he increased the band size to approximately 90 members. The honors this band received included being chosen as the first Oklahoma high school band to march in the Rose Parade; being chosen as the honor band at the 26th Annual Oklahoma Band Clinic in 1957; representing Oklahoma at John F. Kennedy's presidential inauguration, and winning the Oklahoma University Band Day Parade 13 out of 17 years in the top band class, which would be 5A today. Because of his many accomplishments Tony was one of the first high school band directors to receive a free car from his grateful community. Tony left Oklahoma in the early 60's to continue his successful teaching career in Texas.

Tony has a bachelor's degree from Northeastern Oklahoma State University and a Master's Degree from the University of Oklahoma. He and his wife now live in Mesquite, Texas, where he just recently retired as the director of the North Mesquite High School Band.

OAKLEY PITTMAN

Oakley Pittman's musical career has spanned many decades with a variety of experiences that would make most musicians envious. He performed on the vaudeville circuit. He auditioned and was accepted into the Sousa Band, but unfortunately Sousa's health prevented the band from being formed that year. He taught at Maud High School and Eastern Oklahoma College in Wilburton before being hired as Assistant Director of Bands at Oklahoma State University. For ten years he directed the band and orchestra at Classen High School in Oklahoma City. While there his groups consistently won top honors and along with the vocal department earned the Oklahoma "Grand Champion Music Contests" trophy from 1938 until state contests were discontinued in 1942. While in Oklahoma City, he also played solo clarinet with the Oklahoma City Symphony and taught private clarinet at Oklahoma City University. He left the state in 1947 to become Assistant Director of Bands at Kansas University and ultimately became Director of Bands and Orchestra and Assistant Dean of the School of Fine Arts at Southern Methodist University.

Mr. Pittman received his musical training from Oklahoma State University, Kansas University and the University of Michigan. He is a member of the Oklahoma Music Educators Association Hall of Fame and was honored as the 1986 Distinguished Music Alumni from Oklahoma State University. He and his wife, Maggie, now live in Rogers, Arkansas, where he remains active as a music adjudicator in the Oklahoma area.
