Hayes said the following boys would enter the student directing contest: Harold Johnson, Morris Repass and Buford Latimer.







Hayes, a retired Edison Junior High School Band and Orchestra director, recently was installed in the

Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame. The ceremony was held in connection with the annual convention of the Texas Bandmasters Association in San Antonio.

Hayes retired from active teaching in 1977. Since that time he has worked part-time as band and orchestra consultant with a local music store and as a private teacher of woodwind instruments. He also has remained active as band clinician and adjudicator throughout the state.

His 39-year career included positions at Belton, Sherman, Austin High School, Littlefield and San Angelo.

Hayes has numerous former students who are now active band directors in Texas schools. These include native San Angeloans Boyd Rowden, Mike Rowden, Evelio Villarreal, Fred Velez, Mark Wessels, Steve Wessels and Cindy Bullock.

Hayes' bands always maintained high standards of performance both in concert and in marching, receiving many superior ratings at UIL contests and other band festivals.

He also has served on the teaching staff at the Angelo State University Band Camp.

Hayes received a bachelor's degree in music education from Texas Christian University and a master's degree in music education from Texas Tech University.

The Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame is sponsored by Alpha Chapter of Phi Beta Mu, an international bandmasters fraternity. To be eligible for consideration, a band director must have produced and maintained an outstandingly consistent band program in the Texas public schools as well as having enjoyed a long and successful career.

Hall of Fame members must be over the age of 65 and retired from active teaching. This recognition also is granted posthumously to

deceased directors.

The Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame is housed in the state headquarters of the Texas Music Educators Association in Austin. Pictures of all elected members are displayed and portfolios outlining the accomplishments of each director are maintained in files which are

Hall of Fame in 1975, a total of 73 band directors have been honored. A standing committee of the fraternity accepts nominations once a year and pursues an evaluation process of each candidate prior to election by the active Alpha Chapter membership.
