Hall of Fame honors ex-band director

More than 55 years ago, G.W. Collum struck up the band in Stephenville. Although he departed in 1942, he left behind memories and music for many of his former students.

And now, his teaching legacy lives on even after his death in 1969. Collum was inducted in the Phi Beta Mu Texas Bandmaster's Hall of Fame July 25.

"It was very nice," said Evelyn Daniel, Collum's daughter. "There were 10 inducted this year, and 13 last year."

She said both living and dead bandmasters were eligible.

"Four of the ones inducted this year were deceased," she said. "The families were invited to attend and a good many come. It's a real family affair."

The induction ceremonies into the Hall of Fame were a part of the annual Texas Bandmasters Convention in San Antonio.

Some of the many band activities Collum directed while in Stephenville included participation in 1939's state gubernatorial inauguration in Austin, when W. Lee O'Daniels was sworn in as Governor of Texas, football games, and civic functions.

"In my history I sent in (to the hall of fame), I called his time there 'his gratifying years in Stephenville,'" Daniel said. "They used that, and they truly were.

"All three of us (Daniel and siblings Glenn Collum and Kathleen Watkins) went to Tarleton. We found some of the nicest people in the world there in Stephenville."

Collum's career spanned a total of 32 years. In the early 1920s, he organized city-sponsored bands throughout Texas, creating them in Spur, Matador, Stamford and Apserment.

He was a charter member and officer in the Texas Music Educators Association, organized in 1920.

His first affiliation with public schools was in February of 1925. He was hired by the Cisco Independent School District, qualifying for the position through taking equivalency tests in Austin.

The Cisco band won contests in West Texas during 1929, 1930 and 1931, earning the total of West Texas Champions. Collum spent 12 years in Cisco, moving to Eastland and then Stephenville.

One of the highlights of his time was when the entire 1939 yearbook was dedicated to the band.

According to the yearbook's introduction, the special distinction was "in appreciation of the enthusiastic spirit of its (the band's) members and the colorful contribution it has made to all extra-curricular activities, and in gratitude for the recognition it has brought to Stephenville High School through its outstanding achievements."

According to the yearbook, the band that year "rated second in marching, excellent in sight reading, 100 percent in general appearance and excellent in playing" at a festival at what was then John Tarleton college. The scores placed the band in the "High Honor Group."

At San Angelo on April 29-30, 1939, the band made its initial appearance at a regional-level contest. The band was awarded a First Division in its class and brought back trophies in both playing and marching.

"He was a very energetic person," Daniel said. "He loved a job well done and wanted his students to be the best musicians they could. He always said he learned as much from them as they did from him."





"O God, who art the director of Heaven's Great Symphony, when thou playest thy masterpiece, whether thou givest me first chair or last, I pray Thee, give me a part."


"He would have been very proud, I think," Daniel said. "He made life-long friends wherever he went, and he loved his work. This reflects that."

First Eastland Band Director Selected For State Hall Of Fame Telegra Times.

The family of the late G.W. Collum, pioneer Band Director, has been notified that he has been selected for entry into the Phi Beta Mu Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame.

G.W. Collum was the first Bandmaster for Cisco High School, hired there in 1925. In 1935 he took the band at Eastland, and directed it for several years. Later he served as Bandmaster at Stephenville, Paris, Texas, Gatesville, Mt. Pleasant and Gainsville.

Induction ceremonies for the Hall of Fame will be held during the Texas Bandmasters annual convention in San Antonio on Monday, July 25, 1994, 2 p.m. in the Mezzanine Salons of the Marriott Riverwalk Hotel.

The Hall of Fame is housed in the office headquarters of Texas Music Educators Association in Austin. A framed photograph of Mr. Collum and an engraved name inscription will have permanent display there.

There will also be a lot of personal memorabilia placed on file: programs, newspaper clippings, awards, honors, photographs, original compositions and a biographical

sketch.

The family will be awarded a medallion at the induction ceremony, and part of Collum's biography will be read.

The story of G.W. Collum's lifelong devotion to music is an amazing one - and his Hall of Fame Honor is well deserved. $He \, was \, first \, introduced \, to \,$ music as a teenager learning and playing in a family orchestra and brass band. He and some of his brothers and cousins were taught by a relative.

They entertained at church gatherings, family parties and dances in and around Greenville,

Texas. At the age of eighteen Collum started teaching piano and began learning to play all the band instruments.

Two years later, in 1913, G.W. Collum married Myrtle L. Looney, a girl he had met while she was visiting in Greenville.

About 1918 the Collums went to West Texas, where Mr. Collum organized city-sponsored bands in many small towns such as Matador, Rotan, Haskell, Stamford and Aspermont.

G.W. Collum then moved to Cisco and gave private lessons on piano and band instruments. Also at this time he organized city bands in Cisco, Moran and Ranger. In Cisco the Band was called the Chamber of Commerce Lobo Band.

In 1925 the Cisco school board hired Mr. Collum to teach band in the school system. He qualified by taking equivalency tests in Austin, and started on Feb. 8, 1925.

The band had a very heavy schedule the first few years, as the group followed the Cisco Lobo football team as they repeatedly went to quarter and semi-final state playoffs. In the very first year the band went to Amarillo, Abilene, Cleburne and Dallas.

In 1929, 1930 and 1931 the Cisco band won the West Texas Championship contests, competing in Class "A" with Abilene, Wink, Monahans, Odessa and others. About 1930 or '31 the Cisco Bandentered the national band contest held in Tulsa, Oklahoma, where the mass band concert was at the Tulsa University football field. The guest conductor was John Phillip Sousa.

At the big dam and swimming pool at Lake Cisco the local band played concerts weekly in the summer months, as part of the Water Carni-

val. This was held for many years.

On the Fourth of July each year the band played for city-sponsored Bathing Beauty Contests. The music they played was mostly popular songs of the day arranged by Mr. Collum.

G.W. Collum was a Charter member and office holder in the Texas Music Educators Association. His brother, G.C. Collum, was President in 1926-27.

In 1935 G. W. Collum became Bandmaster at Eastland High School, and held this position for several years. Robert Maddox succeeded him at Cisco High School.

The Eastland band played for many holiday parades, political rallies, school activities - and won honors in contests in Abilene and Big Spring.

In 1939 at the big Texas Centennial Celebration in Fort Worth the band represented the City of Eastland on "Eastland Day." Concerts and parades were scheduled throughout that day.

Also, the Eastland High School Band participated in the opening parade at the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show for several years.

Mr. Collum started teaching the Stephenville Yellowjacket Band in the late 1930's. He was there for nine years and his Band received a number of honors. Later he went on to other towns, always making life-long friends.

In 1957, after 32 years of teaching band, G. W. Collum laid down his baton. But he stayed in another part of the music business - he started tuning and repairing pianos full time. Eventually he moved to Abilene where he soon had many churches and schools under contract to maintain their pianos.

In 1966 Dr. M.L. Daniels, A.C.C. music department head, made and arrangement of "Key City March," which Mr.

Collum had written a few years before. Douglas Fry, A.C.C. Band Director, included the march in his summer concert and asked Collum to direct it. The march was also played May 21, 1967 by the Abilene Eagle Band, directed by Jim Pollard.

These were only some of the honors which came to G.W. Collum during his lifetime. But an even more important part to him was his happy home and children. He and his wife celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in 1963. They had three children, all whom played in bands as they were growing up. A son and one daughter made professional musicians. Mr. Collum died in July of 1969.

Of the Collum children, son Glen died in 1990. The daughters are Kathleen Watkins of Austin and Evelyn Daniel (Mrs. Varge Daniel) of Eastland and Abilene. There are also four grandchildren and eleven great-grand-

In honoring G.W. Collum with inclusion in the Hall of Fame, Barbara Lovett, Chairman, gives some of the reasons for his recognition and purposes of the Phi Beta Mu organization.

She says this is to encourage the building of better bands and the development of better musicians in schools throughout the world.

"The organization also wishes to foster a deeper appreciation of good music and more widespread interest in it on the part of the public," Mrs. Lovett states.

They couldn't have picked a better person than G. W. Collum to symbolize that!
