### MELVIN B. (MEL) MONTGOMERY 1925-

MELVIN MONTGOMERY WAS BORN JANUARY 3, 1925 IN RICHARDS, TEXAS. HE ATTENDED ELEMENTARY SCHOOL IN MONTGOMERY, TEXAS, AND JUNIOR AND SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL IN CONROE, TEXAS. HE RECEIVED HIS BACHELOR'S AND MASTER'S DEGREES FROM SAM HOUSTON STATE UNIVERSITY, AND DID POST GRADUATE WORK AT TEXAS TECH UNIVERSITY AND THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS.

MEL BEGAN HIS MUSICAL TRAINING IN MONTGOMERY, TEXAS. AND PLAYED IN THEIR FIRST BAND UNDER DIRECTOR, VERNON CLEVELAND. SHE TAUGHT MEL PRIVATELY TRUMPET, PIANO, AND MANDOLIN. LATER HE PLAYED BARITONE, HORN, TROMBONE AND PERCUSSION.

MEL GRADUATED FROM CONROE HIGH SCHOOL IN 1942 AND COMPLETED ONE YEAR OF COLLEGE AT SAM HOUSTON BEFORE BEING DRAFTED INTO THE ARMY IN 1943. WHILE IN THE SERVICE HE ATTENDED AND GRADUATED FROM THE ARMY SCHOOL OF MUSIC, PLAYED IN THE U.S. ARMY FIELD BAND AND DANCE BAND, AND SERVED IN THE E.T.O. AS A MUSICIAN IN THE SPECIAL SERVICES ATTACHED TO THE US 7TH ARMY.

FOLLOWING HIS ARMY DUTY MEL RETURNED TO SAM HOUSTON AND COMPLETED HIS MUSIC DEGREE IN 1948. WHILE AT SAM HOUSTON HE SERVED AS DIRECTOR OF THE "HOUSTONIANS" DANCE BAND AND DURING HIS SENIOR YEAR WAS EMPLOYED AS MUSIC DIRECTOR FOR THE TEXAS PRISON SYSTEM.

MEL'S FIRST TEACHING POSITION WAS AT STEPHEN F. AUSTIN HIGH SCHOOL IN PORT ACRES, TEXAS. DURING HIS FOUR YEAR TENURE HIS BANDS RECEIVED THREE SWEEPSTAKES AWARDS. IN 1952 HE BECAME DIRECTOR OF BANDS AT SNYDER HIGH SCHOOL. DURING HIS SIXTEEN YEAR TENURE THE SNYDER BAND AMASSED AN ENVIABLE RECORD OF CONTEST HONORS. THEY WON FIFTEEN CONSECUTIVE SWEEPSTAKES AT U.I.L. AND SEVERAL HONORS AT THE TRI-STATE MUSIC FESTIVAL. AT THE BUCCANEER FESTIVAL THE SNYDER BAND WAS FOUR TIMES SELECTED AS THE OUTSTANDING CONCERT BAND IN ITS CLASS AND SEVEN TIMES WON THE GRAND SWEEPSTAKES AWARD. THEY WERE CONSISTENTLY RANKED AMONG THE TOP FIVE BANDS IN THEIR CLASSIFICATION IN STATE HONOR BAND COMPETITIONS. IN 1966 THE SNYDER BAND WAS CHOSEN AS THE TMEA HONOR BAND IN THEIR CLASSIFICATION.

MEL WAS ALSO A PIONEER IN THE STAGE BAND MOVEMENT IN TEXAS. HIS SNYDER HIGH SCHOOL STAGE BANDS WON NATIONAL ACCLAIM DURING THE 1950'S AND 1960'S AND WAS RANKED THIRD AMONG 225 PARTICIPATING SCHOOLS IN THE NATIONAL STAGE BAND CONTEST OF

1966. HIS SNYDER STAGE BANDS ALSO WON THE HIGHLY COMPETITIVE BROWNWOOD STAGE BAND FESTIVAL TWELVE OF FOURTEEN YEARS FROM 1954-1968.

IN 1968 MEL WAS SELECTED AS DIRECTOR OF BANDS AT STEPHEN F.
AUSTIN STATE UNIVERSITY IN NACOGDOCHES. HE SERVED FOR
EIGHTEEN YEARS AS DIRECTOR OF BANDS AND PROFESSOR OF MUSIC.
UNDER HIS LEADERSHIP THE SFASU BANDS GAINED CONSIDERABLE
RECOGNITION WITH BOTH THE MARCHING AND SYMPHONIC BANDS AND
BECAME HIGHLY REGARDED THROUGHOUT TEXAS AND THE UNITED
STATES. THE SFA SYMPHONIC BAND WAS INVITED TO PERFORM FOUR
CONCERTS FOR THE TEXAS MUSIC EDUCATORS ASSOCIATION AND ONCE
FOR THE COLLEGE BAND DIRECTORS NATIONAL ASSOCIATION UNDER
MEL'S LEADERSHIP.

DURING HIS TEACHING CAREER MEL WAS HONORED WITH A CITATION FROM THE TEXAS STATE LEGISLATURE AND SELECTED TO MEMBERSHIP IN THE FIRST CHAIR OF AMERICA, HONORING THE NATIONS 100 BEST HIGH SCHOOL BANDS, HE WAS THE RECIPIENT OF THE A. FRANK MARTIN AWARD FROM KAPPA KAPPA PSI NATIONAL BAND FRATERNITY FOR HIS CONTRIBUTIONS TO MUSIC EDUCATION. IN 1978 MEL WAS SELECTED TO MEMBERSHIP IN THE PRESTIGIOUS AMERICAN BANDMASTERS ASSOCIATION AND IN 1986 WAS GIVEN HONORARY MEMBERSHIP IN THE STEPHEN F. AUSTIN STATE UNIVERSITY BAND DIRECTOR'S HALL OF FAME. IN 1993 MEL WAS SELECTED BY THE TEXAS BANDMASTERS ASSOCIATION AS THE BANDMASTER OF THE YEAR. HE WAS INDUCTED INTO THE PHI BETA MU TEXAS BANDMASTERS HALL, OF FAME IN 1994.

MEL IS ALSO A MEMBER OF THE TEXAS MUSIC EDUCATORS ASSOCIATION, TEXAS BANDMASTERS ASSOCIATION, TEXAS MUSIC ADJUDICATORS ASSOCIATION, PHI BETA MU, KAPPA KAPPA PSI, PHI MU ALPHA, TAU BETA SIGMA AND PHI DELTA KAPPA. HE HOLDS LISTINGS IN WHO'S WHO IN THE SOUTH AND SOUTHWEST, INTERNATIONAL WHO'S WHO IN MUSIC, PERSONALITIES OF AMERICA, MEN OF ACHIEVEMENT, WHO'S WHO IN PERCUSSION:USA, AND THE DIRECTORY OF DISTINGUISHED AMERICANS.

AFTER RETIRING IN 1986, MEL CONTINUED TO TEACH ON A PART-TIME BASIS AT SFA FOR SEVERAL YEARS. HE STILL REMAINS ACTIVE AS A CLINICIAN, ADJUDICATOR, AND GUEST CONDUCTOR. THE STEPHEN F. AUSTIN STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF REGENTS AWARDED HIM THE TITLE OF EMERITUS DIRECTOR OF BANDS AND PROFESSOR OF MUSIC IN 1987.

MEL WAS MARRIED TO VIRGINIA HARRINGTON IN 1948. SHE IS A RETIRED SCHOOL TEACHER. THEY HAVE A SON, DON MONTGOMERY, AND A DAUGHTER, JILL MCCLURE. THEY HAVE FOUR GRANDCHILDREN.

## MELVIN B. (MEL) MONTGOMERY Director of Bands Emeritus Stephen F. Austin State University Nacogdoches, Texas

Born: Richards, Texas (Montgomery County), Jan. 3, 1925

Schooling: Elementary School in Montgomery. Jr. and Sr. High School in Conroe.

Bachelor and Master's degrees from Sam Houston State University.

Doctoral work at Texas Tech University.

Employment: 1948-1952 - Stephen F. Austin High School, Port Arthur, TX.

1952-1968 - Snyder High School, Snyder, TX

1968-1987 - Stephen F. Austin State University, Nacogdoches, TX

Melvin Montgomery began his musical training in Montgomery, Texas. He had a woman band director who also taught him privately trumpet, piano, and mandolin. After a year he discontinued the piano and the mandolin and took a liking to many instruments and later played baritone, horn, trombone and percussion.

In Montgomery, Mel rode his bike daily a couple of miles to school with his instrument hooked over the handlebars and each day had to ride past a bad dog that nipped at his heels. He would get up as much speed as possible and put his feet up on the handlebars until he coasted past the dogs territory. Mel wishes now that he would have taken up the drums earlier so that he would have had sticks to beat off the dog.

After finishing high school in Conroe and a year of college at Sam Houston State, Mel was drafted into the Army in 1943. Following basic training he was shipped to Camp Crowder, Missouri to the Signal Corps School to become a teletype operator because he had made an extremely high score on a dit, dot, dash, type test that was similar to a musical rhythm aptitude test. Luckily, the Army School of Music was on the same base and Mel convinced them to give him an audition. He auditioned on baritone and trap drums, was accepted and was assigned a position in the Army Field Band and the Army Jazz Band.

Later he was assigned to the Special Services section of the 103rd Infantry Division and served in Europe for eighteen months. His biggest thrill was playing in the backup band for entertainers Marlene Dietrich, Bob Hope, and others.

Returning to college after the war, Mel convinced director Clint Hackney to let him play trombone when a beautiful brunette named Jenny Harrington attracted his attention to the trombone section. He succeeded in getting the chair next to her and in 1948 following graduation she became Mrs. Montgomery.

The first band Mel conducted was the Texas Prison System Band while he was a senior at Sam Houston. Despite his love for band, classical, and jazz music, his first duty was to rehearse the prison country and western band for their weekly radio show called "Behind

Prison Walls." He also directed the rodeo band for the famous Prison Rodeo and was a little scared when the guards locked him inside a steel cage in the rodeo arena with 32 convict musicians. Kids would point at him and ask "moma, why doesn't he have on a stripped suit."

Mel's first public school band job was at Stephen F. Austin High School in Pt. Arthur, Texas in 1948. He took over a band that had made a fifth division the year before and in his second year had moved them to a sweepstakes band. Most of the kids were of Acadian French background and would sing songs in French while on bus trips. He and Jenny often wondered if they were singing about them, but never knew.

In 1949 while on a belated honeymoon trip to Arizona, Mel and Jenny passed through the booming oil town of Snyder in West Texas and upon seeing all of the black gold flowing from the ground made a remark "this would be a great place to teach someday", not knowing that in 1952 he would be called by the superintendent of the Snyder Public Schools offering him the job. Again it was a building job from a fifth division band, and again he managed to achieve sweepstakes the second year. Mel spent 16 wonderful and successful years in Snyder and achieved many honors with the Snyder High School Band including the TMEA Honor Band in 1966.

In 1968, while at Texas Tech preparing to do his doctoral dissertation and residency, Mel was called by Stephen F. Austin State University about the Director of Bands position. His acceptance resulted in a move to Nacogdoches. Again this was another musical overhaul job for Mel that was rapidly completed. Mel vividly remembers his first rehearsal hall at SFA which had a low asbestos ceiling that he kept sticking his baton in when he got excited. It had three large pillars in the hall and some students had to peek around them to see the podium. Many exciting things happened at SFA under Mel's 18 years of leadership. Included among them were four successful TMEA performances and performances for the CBDNA and an increase in band members from 72 to 235.

The oddest though was at a big parent's day football game in the 1970's. Mel and the band had a big show prepared for the parents. In the middle of the show the band turned to the opposite stands for a segment and suddenly the crowd began to laugh and became very noisy. The band thought that something terrible had happened in their performance and didn't know that behind them a "streaker" had come from the tunnel at one end of the stadium and ran along the track and out the other end. Needless to say a big part of the halftime show was "upstaged" and not seen by any of the crowd.

Another memorable incident happened at SFA when the band was performing at halftime of a game with a competing Louisiana University. The mascot of the competing school dressed as a "Demon" ran on the field during the SFA band's performance and began pulling on the Drum Major's trousers, running around in the formations, grabbing trombone slides, etc. The home audience was booing the activity loudly. Mel's temper flared and he and two former students that were sitting with him ran from high in the stadium to the field and extracted the "Demon" from the field to the cheers of the crowd. Mel made lots of

verbal threatening remarks including some "expletive deletives' to that demon and never knew whether it was male or female.

Mel retired from SFA in 1987 after 39 years of teaching. His musical honors have been many and the Montgomery home is adorned with plaques, trophies and pictures but he is also proud of a non-musical award he won last year while at TBA to receive the award for Bandmaster of the Year. He entered the TBA Washer Chunkin' contest and with partner Charles Traylor came in second place, displaying a skill he learned from his East Texas band director friends. Knowing Mel's strong competitive spirit, friends and students kept telling him it was about time he came in "second" at something.

Mel counts his greatest honors as being selected the TMEA Honor Band director, his TMEA performances with the SFA Band; his election to the American Bandmasters Association in 1978; his award from the National Kappa Kappa Psi Fraternity for outstanding contribution to the field of music; his selection to the SFA Band Alumni's Hall of Fame; being name Director Emeritus at SFA; his selection as the TBA Bandmaster of the Year in 1993, and his election to the Phi Beta Mu Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame in 1994.



### MEL MONTGOMERY CHOSEN TBA BANDMASTER OF THE YEAR



Mel Montgomery

Mel Montgomery is a native of Texas and graduated from high school in Conroe, Texas. He received his Bachelor's and Master's Degrees from Sam Houston State University and did postgraduate work at the University of Texas and Texas Tech University.

Mel Montgomery's career in music spans over forty years. For twenty years he taught in the public schools of Texas at Port Arthur and Snyder Independent School Districts. During his twenty years of high school teaching his bands received Sweepstakes honors eighteen times in U.I.L. competition. His Snyder bands amassed an enviable record of contest honors at both the Tri-State and Buccaneer Music Festivals. At Buccaneer the Snyder Band was four times selected as the Outstanding Concert Band in their class and seven times won the Grand Sweepstakes Award. They were consistently

ranked among the top five bands in their classification in state honor band competitions. In 1966 they were selected as the TMEA Honor Band of Texas in their classification.

## SFA Became Highly Regarded Throughout Texas and the U.S.

Mr. Montgomery was also a pioneer in the stage band movement in Texas. His Snyder High School Stage Bands won national acclaim during the 1950's and 1960's and was ranked third among 225 participating schools in the National Stage Band Contest of 1966. His stage bands won the highly competitive Brownwood Stage Band Festival twelve of the fourteen years from 1954-1968.

For nineteen years Montgomery served as a professor of music at Stephen F. Austin State University. For eighteen years he held the position of Director of Bands, and under his leadership the SFA band program gained considerable recognition with both its marching and concert bands and became highly regarded throughout Texas and the United States. His SFA Symphonic Band performed several highly acclaimed concerts for (continued on page 3)

## TBA MOURNS PASSING OF MALCOLM HELM

Malcolm L. Helm, a past president of TBA, died at his Mesquite home Saturday, March 27, 1993 after a long illness. Services were held Monday, March 29, 1993, at Highland Park Presbyterian Church in Dallas.

Mr. Helm, 45, a native of Pilot Point, graduated from West Texas State University with a bachelor's degree in music education in 1968. He later earned a master of arts degree from the university in 1976.

His first job as a band director came in 1969 for the Spring Branch Independent School District at Spring Forest Junior High School. In 1972, he joined the Richardson Independent School District as band director of Lake Highlands Junior High School. He led the school's band until 1977 and was recognized as Young Bandmaster of the Year in 1976 by the Phi Beta Mu honorary band fraternity.

During his teaching career Mr. Montgomery was honored with a citation from the Texas State Legislature, and membership in the First Chair of America, honoring the nation's 100 best high school bands. He has also been a recipient of the A. Frank Martin Award presented by Kappa Kappa Psi, National Honorary Band Fraternity for outstanding contribution to the field of music, and has been presented an Honorary membership in the Stephen F. Austin State University Band Director's Hall of Fame.

Mr. Montgomery was elected to membership in the prestigious American Bandmasters Association in 1978. He is also a member of Texas Music Educators Association, Texas Bandmasters Association, Texas Music Adjudicators Association, Phi Beta Mu, Kappa Kappa Psi, Phi Mu Alpha, Tau Beta Sigma and Phi Delta Kappa. He holds listings in Who's Who in the South and Southwest, International Who's Who in Music, Personalities of America, Men of Achievement, Who's Who in Percussion: USA and the Directory of Distinguished Americans.

Mr. Montgomery is very proud of his former students from both high school and SFA. They have directed honor bands in several classes, and he believes that they have had, and will have, a major impact on music education in Texas. A number of his former students are also playing professionally. He is proud of the fact that SFA has become one of the leading producers of quality music educators in the state of Texas.

After retiring in 1986, Mr.
Montgomery continued to teach on a part-time basis at SFA for several years. He still remains very active as an adjudicator, clinician, and guest conductor. The Stephen F. Austin State University Board of Regents voted him the title of Emeritus Director of Bands and Professor of Music in 1987.

Mel was married to his wife Virginia in 1948. She is a retired public school teacher. They have two children, a son, Don Montgomery of Arlington, Texas and a daughter Jill Ann McClure of Pompano Beach, Florida.

Until 1948 the city of Snyder was a small farming and ranching community of 3,000 people located on the South Plains. In that year one of the largest oil fields in the West Texas area was discovered, and overnight the small community became a flourishing "boom" town. By 1952 the boom had subsided and the population became somewhat stable. An alert administration, school board, and community had constructed numerous new buildings to accommodate the influx of students.

Today the city of Snyder is a progressive community of 13,850 persons. It has a thriving economy based primarily on oil, farming and ranching. The city provides its residents with outstanding religious, cultural, educational, and recreational facilities.

Snyder schools are considered among the best in the state and offer its students excellent facilities and a broad curriculum with equal emphasis on all subjects, and are dedicated in encouraging each child to achieve his maximum. The present school system consists of seven elementary schools, two junior high schools, one senior high school, and a special school for handicapped children.

The school system is under the leadership of Dr. Robert Clinton, Superintendent of Schools. # The Music Department of the Snyder Independent School District

The Music Department of the Snyder Public Schools offers its students instruction in public school music, choir, band, stage band, and theory, under fourteen qualified instructors.

Seven public school music teachers offer elementary students a strong background in vocal music, rhythm band, and tonette. An advantageous schedule allows a large percentage of the students to participate in some area of music when they reach the junior high level.

Excellent choirs are maintained in the junior highs under the direction of J. D. Smith and Gwen McLaughlin. The high school offers numerous areas of choral participation under the able leadership of Jim Casey.

Band instruction begins in the seventh grade under the direction of junior high directors Don Eiring and Jerry Pickens. Team teaching affords each beginning student more individual attention. Charles Shaw, high school assistant and woodwind instructor, spends one hour a day in each junior high school working with beginning woodwind players. Scheduling in the three secondary schools allows all four instrumental directors to assist each other with full rehearsals and special sectional drills. No private instruction is available in the city, therefore an effort is made to keep the four member instrumental staff well diversified according to their major instruments so that woodwind, brass, and percussion players have expert instruction.

Snyder was one of the first schools in the state to inaugurate a stage band program in its curriculum. For the past thirteen years it has been a regular course offering in the high school and has enabled the staff to develop outstanding groups in this field.

Melvin Montgomery became Director of Bands for the Snyder Schools in 1952. During his tenure the high school band has received twelve consecutive Sweepstakes awards in U. I. L. competition. The school has won the Grand Sweepstakes Award at the Buccaneer Music Festival five times and the band has three times been selected as the Outstanding Concert Band in its class at the same festival. Prior to its Honor Band selection this year, the Snyder Band has on two occasions been the runner-up in the Class AAA classification. The Snyder Stage Band has won first place in Class AAA ten of the eleven years that it has participated in the Brownwood Stage Band Festival. It has also won the Outstanding Stage Band award at the Tri-State Festival and this past year was selected as the Third Place winner in the National Stage Band contest competing with 212 stage bands of all classifications from 42 states.

An active Band Booster's Club supplies the band with several summer band camp scholarships and awards two college scholarships to deserving senior band students each year.





By 1952 the boom had subsided and the population became somewhat stable. Several new schools had been built to accommodate the influx of students.

It was in 1952 that Melvin Montgomery was employed as director of instrumental music for the Snyder Public Schools. With the help of a sympathetic administration the music program began to expand in quality as well as quantity. The next year (1953) the band received its first U.I.L. Sweepstakes award and, since that time, it has never received a lower rating. In addition to twelve consecutive Sweepstakes awards, Snyder High has five times won the Grand Sweepstakes Award at the Buccaneer Festival and, on three occasions, it has been selected as the Outstanding Class AAA Concert Band at the festival. They have also won several Superior ratings at the Tri-State Festival and have performed at the Cotton Bowl Game in Dallas. Prior to its Honor Band selection, the Snyder Band had on two occasions been the runner-up for the honor in the Class AAA classification. The band is consistently among the leaders in its Region in the number of students placed in the All-Region and All-State Bands. An outstanding Stage Band is selected from the Concert Band membership each year. The Snyder Stage Band has won first place in Class AAA ten of the eleven years that it has participated in the Brownwood Stage Band Festival. It has also won the Outstanding Stage Band award at the Tri-State Festival and this past year was selected as the Third Place winner in the National Stage Band contest competing with 212 stage bands of all classifications from 42 states.

A staff of three directors assist Mr. Montgomery in keeping the program at its excellent level. Mr. Charles Shaw teaches woodwinds throughout the system and is assistant in the high school. Mr. Don Eiring and Mr. Jerry Pickens direct the outstanding Junior High Bands in the system. Band instruction begins in the seventh grade, and students begin performing with the Junior High Bands after one year of class instruction.

The present school administration, under the leadership of Dr. Robert Clinton, continues to support the music program with a favorable schedule and an adequate budget. An outstanding choral program adds to a well-balanced school music program.

An active Band Parent's Club rounds out the support necessary to keep the Snyder High Band near the top in excellence and the town of Snyder a "Music-Minded" community.

Melvin Montgomery has been director of bands in the Snyder school system since August, 1952. Prior to that time he directed the Stephen F. Austin High School Band of Port Arthur for four years.

He was born in Conroe, Texas and graduated from high school there. After graduation in 1942 he began his training at Sam Houston State College in Huntsville, Texas.

He served from 1943-46 in the United States Army as a member of the Army Ground Force Bands and Special Service Bands. While in the service he attended the Army School of Music. In 1946 Mr. Montgomery returned to Sam Houston and he received his B.S. degree in 1948. While at Sam Houston he directed the Houstonians Dance Band and served as Director of Music for the Texas Prison System. It was in the fall of 1948 that he became director of the Stephen F. Austin Band of Port Arthur.

In 1954 Montgomery received his M.A. degree from Sam Houston and has since done work at Texas Tech in adminstrative education. Mr. Montgomery is in much demand as a band

He is a member of the Texas Music Educators Association, Texas Bandmasters' Association, American School Band Directors' Association, Phi Beta Mu, The First Chair of America, and the National Association of Rudimental Drummers.



After marching season the band is divided into two concert organizations. A seventy piece Symphonic Band is selected by audition. The remaining students make up a well instrumentated concert band that competes one class below the Symphonic Band. The Symphonic Band has been a consistent first division winner at contests and festivals throughout the state for the past eleven years.

In addition to a strong marching and concert band program there exists one of the outstanding stage band programs in the state. The stage band rehearses daily and is a regular course in the high school curriculum. Emphasis is on the playing of all phases of jazz and popular music from commercial to progressive jazz. This group is quite popular with the student body and local civic clubs. The group is not permitted to play for dances. The stage band has won championships in its class at outstanding contests for ten of the past eleven years.

An effort is made throughout the school toward a well-balanced music program with equal emphasis on vocal music as well as instrumental music. Next year plans are to inaugurate an advanced theory course to be offered to seniors who are planning on music as a career.

Thanks to an efficient staff and an interested administration music is a vital part of the Snyder Public Schools.

# Stage Band Interest Shifts ... Into Swift!

Ever see a stage band program in action? Well, if you'd been present during the February Stage Band Festival held in Brownwood, Texas, you'd have seen band directors from all corners of the USA on hand to get the "low down" on an exciting new trend in music — the Stage Band Program.

What they saw were 33 stage bands entered in three classes. Many of the entries came from 400 miles away. One even came from Arkansas! It was the Fifth Annual Stage Band Festival in Brownwood's history.

The first high school stage band festival was held in Brownwood in 1952. Leonard King, partner in the King Music Co., Brownwood, Texas, approached several band directors in the area with an idea for creating smaller, condensed units to be made up of regular band members. These units would offer opportunities for more advanced band members to increase their interests in music and in the band program per se. This type of musical unit would always have a well rehearsed program ready to perform for any civic function, luncheon club, assembly program, etc. The relatively small units of proficient members would be highly mobile as well as more practical in most instances than the complete marching or concert band.

Due to the fact that units would be playing modern and popular music, King Snyder High School Stage Band, Snyder, Texas, and its director, Melvin Montgomery. They won 1st place in Class AAA in 1954, '55, and '56 Brownwood Stage Band Festival.

figured it would reach a lot of people, sepecially students who were not particularly fond of marches or "long hair" compositions. Furthermore, it would add another important branch to the musical tree and help sell the entire music program.

By 1953 Alton Roan's Breckenridge High School Band and Claude Knieff's Stephenville High School Band, along with others, were already working this type of unit into their regular band programs. Leonard King contacted several bands throughout central Texas, explaining the proposed program idea and laying the foundation for a contest-type festival to give the various stage bands a basis for comparison and competition with similar units.

The first year, eight stage bands competed. A mythical all-star group was selected as the outstanding musicians of the festival; best male vocalist, best girl vocalist, and best vocal groups were also selected.

# PT. ACRES MEMORIES OF MELVIN B. MONTGOMERY (by Jeanette S. Kay)

Mr. Montgomery entered my life in the 6th grade. Pt. Acres was dominated by two refineries. There was little or no pollution control, so the area emitted a huge smell which can be recalled 50 years later. It is hot, drinking water came from wells, and raw sewage was piped into the ditches running in front of the houses. Everyone had a boardwalk across this flowing entrance into our houses. Pt. Acres is surrounded by bayous and swamps, and the mosquitoes were out there in hordes. The big nightly occurrence was the spraying of the house with DDT - and the mosquito control program which sent trucks out to spray the entire area with the children running behind inhaling those vapors. There was no air conditioning, no fans. Television was not around. It was hot, sticky, mosquito infested, and the local pool was the bayou where several of the kids contracted polio. I had one friend who was an outstanding drummer who lived in a house with a dirt floor and the family used a chamber pot. There were many families who spoke only Cajun French in their homes, and those children had a terrible time in the school But, Mr. Montgomery found a common denominator. There were outstanding Boudreauxs and Theriots and Fontenots and Thibodeauxs and Moutons in the Pt. Acres band who went on to make names for themselves. Mr. Montgomery recalls those students singing in French on the school bus and wondering if they were singing about him. I'm certain he would have been happy to know that, indeed, they were!! There were no diversions in that era, and here was a teacher who realized the potential of his children. Mr. Montgomery's first band hall was a 20' x 30' temporary building - there was nothing there - a stark room. He remembers it as something out of a John Steinbeck novel which says it all. Those were our surroundings! Mr. Montgomery had to have been the most dedicated man with a mission I have encountered. He made an impact on so many lives. I know that continued for all the years he taught, and continues to this day. He has taught gifted musicians who have become band directors, play in symphonies, have made music a part of their life - folks who are impacting other young people just as he did. What Mr. Montgomery did in Pt. Acres was unique. The background is there. In the early days, Pt. Acres was known for its football team. That was it. There was no color, there were no seasons. But there was a football team. There was also a lot of grit and determination. Life was not easy for those people. There just wasn't a lot of anything to hold onto and be proud of.

I only have my version of this. Mr. Montgomery initiated testing for every child in the school. This was a big happening. I think if there was a shred, one tiny particle of musical talent or understanding, he discovered it. He met with the parents. Remember there were no dance lessons, gymnastics or piano lessons. Mr. Montgomery went to the parents and strongly encouraged them to invest in a musical instrument for their child. 6th grade - and my mother says we WILL afford a clarinet. \$125 - I think of those payments to this day. That sounds like a paltry sum, but these people couldn't afford those payments. But, Mr. Montgomery was pushing for a dream for a bunch of kids, and he made it happen. And he recognized what they could - AND WOULD do if given that opportunity!!! Some were gifted. But all were dedicated. I can't think how many kids were in that Pt. Acres band. We were inspired by a great teacher. He gave us hope and a glimpse of something other than the squalor which surrounded us. (It did, no matter what fond memories we have!!) We weren't allowed to see ourselves as anything other than the best band in Texas. When you are that gifted band director,

you are an artist. How could anyone play all those instruments and be so laid back (as my children would say). He would sit and play the cornet for his own pleasure. Don't think that wasn't an inspiration for us all. This man could make anything look easy. For some it was. For some of us it was dedication. I think our first loves are always a teacher. Mr. Montgomery was mine. Multiply that times however many students he has had - and he is certainly an extremely loved man. I think of Martin Luther King and his dream. If you are working with children, you must have a dream. And it's a big one. It's giving kids that something to hold onto and telling them, yes, here is something you can and WILL do, because I have faith that you can and will do it. I think we forget just how much children are capable of accomplishing. Mr. Montgomery never lost sight of that. His expectations were always high - and the children didn't fail him.

I am so proud of that Pt. Acres band. How many lives has Melvin Montgomery touched and inspired? All those children remembering when Mr. Montgomery sat there counting time with that drumstick - individually - or from the podium. It isn't just fond memories - it is a lesson in life on determination and results - a tribute to that person we keep reading about in our current issues regarding troubled and unfocused youth - a dedicated teacher!! Mr. Montgomery is being honored in the Hall of Fame. There is no hall of fame that could contain the spirit he instilled in his pupils. It is that "dream" thing which encompasses issues of race, circumstances, and hope for something other than poverty. We were there! We caught an inspired glimpse of what could be accomplished in a team effort led by an inspired young man. (I don't wish to mention here that at this point, we were all certain you were middle-aged!! - at 23!!)

Mr. Montgomery has shared his memories of his Pt. Acres days in some correspondence all these years later. I treasure his words: "I got back a lot more than I gave to the kids in my Pt. Acres bands. First of all they gave me an opportunity to test my mettle and find out whether I could be successful in the teaching field. Secondly, I learned that there is an essential paradox in teaching: all students are exactly the same in that each one is unique and needs to be treated accordingly. Thirdly, I developed a career long philosophy that kids can do anything as long as you as their teacher don't convince them they can't." I wonder what teachers will be perusing these records. Or perhaps there will be aspiring teachers who wonder if there is a clue for them as to what inspiration they can gain from that successful teacher. There is a clue and there is inspiration. It is that dedication and talent that gives each child a hope that they can grab on and listen and - practice - and emulate - and who knows where they will wind up and what they can accomplish. A dedicated teacher can be the inspiration of hundreds of children - they will never forget that person - he is the inspiration of their life in whatever path it takes them. It may not be music - in many cases it isn't - but it is that dedication to practice, to teamwork, and a genuine feeling of belonging which is so important in the lives of our children. That is what Mr. Montgomery gave us. That went on in our lives. We never forgot him and I know we will love him forever. There is that excitement that goes with band - that adrenalin kicks in - there is accomplishment - the spirit of working as a team which is so important in life - and even the special smell of cleaned instruments - and shoes which have been polished to perfection. We might not have received the most accolades, but I would be certain we were the group who loved him first - perhaps best. There are so many of Mr. Montgomery's students who would express their feelings on his behalf. I suppose the summation is - wonderful man - ULTIMATE TEACHER.





The various musical organizations of the Huntsville State Prison are under the capable civilian direction of Boyce Montgomery, Sam Houston music student.

When Boyce took over the job a month ago, he undertook a mansized job. In addition to directing the 25-piece military band, he also has responsibility for the popular ten-piece string band that had been disorganized for several months when he took over.

The brass band, which will play fanfare for rodeo performers and furnish music for the rodeo acts, does a good job of playing the most difficult military marches such as "Washington Post," "National Emblem" and "Our Director."

The string band to be featured at the month-long series of rodeos, has a large variety of talent, some of it "big name." A singer of cowboy songs called "Texas Slim," has offers from some "big time" cowboy and hill-billy programs when he gets his freedom a few months from now.

"Pop," a 73-year-old hoedown fiddler who plays left-handed on a right-handed instrument, is popular with the band and with all the inmates. Released from the prison several months ago, he did not like civilian life, so he persuaded the prison officials to take him back within the walls.

Even though Montgomery is very thorough during his nightly rehearsals, he says the boys are always very cooperative and that he has never had any trouble with them.

Formerly a member of the Bearkat band, Montgomery, popular senior from Conroe and member of Alpha Phi Sigma and Kappa Delta Pi plays the drums for the Houstonian orchestra.

Montgomery served as SFA's Director of Bands and was a professor of music from 1968-1987, and was a high school band director in Port Arthur and Snyder for 20 years before his SFA stint.

During his tenure, the SFA Lumberjack Marching Band grew from 72 to 235 members and was recognized for outstanding halftime per-formances. His SFA Symphonic Band performed at four Texas Music Educators Conventions and at one College Band Directors National As-

sociation convention.

While at Snyder High School, his bands were selected to the First Chair of America from 1956-1966, signifying one of the top 100 high school bands in the nation.

In 1966 Montgomery was selected as the Texas Music Educators Asso-ciation Honor Band director and was made a member of the American Bandmasters Association in 1978. He received the Kappa Kappa Psi National Band Fraternity Award for "outstanding contributions in the field of music" in 1986, and he was Texas Bandmaster of the Year in 1993. He is also a member of the Phi Beta Mu International Honorary

Band Fraternity.

The Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame is sponsored by the Alpha Chapter of Phi Beta Mu and is located at the Texas Music Educators Association's headquarters in Austin. It was started in 1975 and includes 86 members. Nine, including Montgomery, will be added this year.

# Montgomery to be honored July 24

Melvin B. Montgomery, Director of Bands Emeritus of Stephen F. Austin State University, will be installed in the Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame in ceremonies to be held in connection with the annual convention of the Texas Bandmasters Association meeting in San Antonio July 24-27.

Montgomery was Director of Bands and Professor of Music at Stephen F. Austin State University for 1968-1986. Prior to coming to SFA, he served for 20 years as a band director in high schools at Port Arthur and Snyder.

His high school bands established an enviable record of accomplishments and honors, including the selection of the Snyder High School Band as the Texas Music Educators Association Honor Band for the state in 1966.

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Montgomery was elected to the Phi Beta Mu international Honorary Band Fraternity in 1956. In 1966 he was selected as the Texas Music Eductors Association Honor Band director and in 1978 he was inducted into the prestigious American Bandmasters Association.

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
