GEORGE WALTERS ...distinguished career at LMHS

LA MARQUE — George W. Walters, former band director of La Marque High School, will be inducted into the Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame on July 25 at the Texas Bandmasters annual convention in San Antonio.

This honor is based on his outstanding achievements during his years at La Marque High School.

in music in 1953 from the University of North Texas in Denton. He was band director in Lawton, Okla., from 1953-1957.

In 1957 he moved to La Marque and was the La Marque High School band director from 1957-1972. He retired from the La Marque school district in 1980 and continues to reside in La Marque.


During his tenure at La Marque his band was the first in Texas to be the state honor band in two different classes. In 1964 the band was state champion in class 3-A and in 1967 the band won state champion in class 4-A.

In UIL competition his bands won more outstanding band trophies than any other school, three times in class 3-A and four times in class 4-A.

In solo UIL competition most of his students received class I ratings at these contest.

The band also won various other trophies for band contests and parades.

Former students include renown musicians from Broadway, the Houston Symphony and the Washington, D.C., Opera Company.

LA MARQUE SCHOOLS

La Marque, originally called "Buttermilk Junction" by Civil War soldiers who stopped for a drink of fresh, cold buttermilk, has steadily expanded since World War II. Over 16,000 persons now live in La Marque, the "city of fine homes and churches."

The majority of these residents are employed by the numerous industries which are located in the La Marque-Texas City area and include Union Carbide Chemicals, Monsanto Chemical Company, American Oil Company, and the Wah Chang Corporation.

Because of its central location between Houston and Galveston, La Marque residents have excellent cultural and recreational facilities available within less than an hour's drive. The NASA complex has enlightening and entertaining open house every Sunday.

The magnificent Astro Dome offers every type of activity from bull fights to Billy Graham with the Astros' baseball team and University of Houston football team annual events. The excellent Houston Symphony as well as the new Theatre in the Round and the beautiful Jones Hall afford cultural activities throughout the year.

Traveling southward over the Twin Causeways to Galveston opens up the wonderful world of water sports. Boating, skiing, surfing, fishing, and swimming are at their best in the deep blue waters of the Gulf of Mexico.

La Marque city and school officials are much concerned with the young people of the community. For this reason, an extensive summer program is offered to all its youth. School facilities are made available after school and in the summer. Baseball teams are organized for boys and girls from 8 - 18. A Teen Club Center at the City Park affords the teen-agers recreational facilities of their own.

Before 1948, all of the school children in the La Marque School District were housed in two buildings. Now the District has seven elementary schools, two junior high schools, and one high school. The high school now has an enrollment of 977 students, approximately the number in the entire district in 1948.

Plans are in progress to build a new comprehensive high school complex with all the modern innovations available. All of the La Marque Schools are members of the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges.

Soon Galveston County will have two junior colleges, one on the island and one in the La Marque-Texas City area.

La Marque schools are considered among the best in the state in their academic achievements as well as sports and music.

Music has been an intregal part of the district for many years, receiving the full cooperation and support of the school administration under the able leadership of Dr. T. P. White, Superintendent of Schools.

PROGRAM NOTES

The score to von Reznicek's comic opera, "Donna Diana", was completed in 1894 and was received with immediate success. The overture to "Donna Diana", unique in its freshness and sunny cheerfulness, figures among the most performed items on concert programs the world over.

The transcription being used this evening was done especially for this concert by Carl D. Meyers. Mr. Meyers is presently Director of Bands at Columbia High School, West Columbia, Texas. Mr. Meyers was formerly band director of the La Marque Junior High School where he developed one of the outstanding junior organizations in the state.

The three young ladies performing the von Weber "Concerto for Bassoon" are Pat Summerville, a senior; Susan Baker, a junior; and Leah Willis, a sophomore.

The soloist for the evening is Mr. Jay Andrus, an alumus of the La Marque High School and the La Marque High School Band. While in high school Mr. Andrus achieved national recognition on the baritone horn. Wishing to pursue a career as a professional musician, Mr. Andrus changed to the French Horn. His first teacher on this instrument was Mr. James T. Matthews, Director of Bands at the University of Houston. Later, Mr. Andrus entered the University of Houston where he became the private pupil of Mr. Caesar LaMonica.

In his sophomore year at the university, Mr. Andrus auditioned and was accepted for a position in the Houston Symphony Orchestra. He has been a member of that organization since. The Gliere "Concerto for French Horn" which he will perform was bandstrated by Mr. Roy J. Weger, Director of The Symphonic Band, Southen Methodist University.

It is the secret ambition of every composer to write a set of variations. But a man needs to be angel or fool to tread here; for this is the most difficult of all forms of music to handle, except by a thorough master of technique, and a scholar and a creative artist. It is of course easy enough to take a tune and weave tonal decorations round it, stand the poor thing on its head, stretch it out or make it smaller, with all the rest of the tricks of the trade. The more the tune or theme is changed the more it remains the same thing. Fortunately, music had Johannes Brahms to do one of the ultimates in the "Variations on a Theme by Haydn." Bringing maturity of years and wisdom to this task resulted in a set of breath-taking beauty and overpowering majesty.

The setting of our "Alma Mater" was done by the band's solo clarinetist and president, Tom Arvidson. Tom is self-taught in the field of composition. Tom has composed several numbers for the concert band and one of these has been entered in the American Bandmasters Association original composition contest.

Tom is a private student on the clarinet of Mrs. Willo Dale Craig. Mrs. Craig is a former member of the La Marque High School Band and is presently employed as a band director in the Texas City Schools.



RECIPE FOR AN HONOR BAND

By JUNE ANGERSTEIN LaMarque, Texas

INGREDIENTS:

1 Band Director

Add: 72 Talented Band Members

- 4 Weeks of rehearsal in August
- 5 Section rehearsals per week
- 5 Full band rehearsals per week Blend together. After mixing well, combine with:

Section leaders

Variety of music A pinch of discipline

Blend until smooth.
Allow time for perfecting, then test

with:

District, regional, and state contests

UIL concert contests

When tests are conclusive, present the

HONOR BAND

O MAKE an honor band requires just the right ingredients. Then the ingredients must be combined in the proper order and amounts. When all the ingredients have been well Blended, the actual making process is begun. Finally, the finishing touches are applied and - an honor band has been created.

George Walters, like any successful creator, was not satisfied with a single success; he took the necessary ingredients and once again proceeded with the blending and finishing touches and created his second honor band.

The first ingredient of an honor band is the band director. He must be well educated, versatile, firm but fair, inspiring, and willing to devote extensive time to his creation. George Walters is such a band director. He has had a varied and comprehensive education. Although his higher education began in his home state at Oklahoma State University, his horizons were extended by attending the Conservatory of Music at the University of Vienna. Austria, while with an Army Band. Walters then returned to Durant to receive his B.A. from Southeastern State College. Feeling that a band director ought to be exceptionally well-trained, he earned his M. M. degree from North Texas State. But a band director who creates honor bands does not allow himself to become stagnant; so he continued his education by attending Western State College at Gunnison, Colorado, and the University of Houston.

Versatility must be a vital part of a director who would create success. And this versatility is evident every year in George Walters' schedule. First, he must prepare his band to lead the school spirit. To do this, he must inspire strong school spirit in his band members. Secondly, he must drill his band to give the full first-class performance on the football field as it would in the concert hall because an

honor band's performance must always be of first quality. In addition, during October each year, Walters and his band play host to the Rotarian Band Festival which consist of eleven or more bands. Finally, the football season is over, and the concert season begins. George encourages and aids his students to enter in district, regional, and state contests.


The final phase of this all important ingredient is the firm but fair and inspiring influence which Walters exerts upon his students. Discipline, which is a must for any creation, is emphatically felt in an honor band. The band members understand that music is a discipline itself, and with excellence to inspire them, the sting of discipline is lost.

Next, combine the talented band members with the August rehearsals, five weekly section rehearsals, and five weekly full band rehearsals and mix

slowly and carefully with the talents of the band director. From the band director, the band members realize what their objectives are for the season. A potential honor band must begin with a positive attitude that every single member will do his best at all times. To obtain this attitude, the band director radiates a determined and ambitious attitude. The blending of the band members with the band director through rehearsals creates a relationship of respect and understanding.

After the first five ingredients have been well blended, the next step is to mix in the best in each section as section leaders. These section leaders should be so well blended with the other band members that the job which they perform will be nothing less than excellent. In an honor band, the section leader is able to take over

When a baker has finished blending, he puts the mixture into the oven to cook. The same is true of a potential honor band. The ingredients are well blended; now comes the time of continuous work which constitutes the baking. At last, it seems that the band is ready. The testing begins in the district contests, followed by the regional and state. An honor band must first consist of honor band members. For Walters' band members, the honors have been many for each year. This past year, George Walters had more band members in the All-State Band than any other school. In previous years, his Honor Band has had members in the All-State Band and All-State Orchestra at the same time. The testing, however, does not stop with the individuals in the band. The band as a group must now be tested through participation

in UIL concert contests. When a band performs as Walters' band has, indications are strong that an honor band is in the making. Walters' band has won straight I division ratings in the UIL contests.

Now every ingredient has been used in its proper amount and at the right time. The blending has been precise; the band made and tested throughly; and the moment is now at hand. Take the band out and give it a nice thick layer of icing. Rehearse and rehearse and then - rehearse some more! Don't just play the same old stand-bys. Try something new - this is the icing. Walters has his band play everything from Hindemith to Bach. Finally, the band is ready for the final performance. For Walters' band these final performances have netted two sweepstake awards plus three outstanding band awards at the Buccaneer Music Festivals in Corpus Christi. The 1963 outstanding award was in the 3A class, and the 1965 and 1966 outstanding awards were in the 4A class, making the La Marque High School Band the only band to

An honor band must stand one last test - after all the awards have been won and the honors bestowed. A real honor band will serve parts of itself generously to the music world. This last test has been superbly passed by this honor band. To perpetuate the excellent blending of ingredients the following former band members are continuing with honor in their goals to teach or perform in the professional music world: Willo Brotherton Craig, Woodwind teacher in Texas City; James Lemmond, Band Director of Weiss Junior High in Galveston; Patty Rogers, playing Piccolo with the Austin Symphony; Jay Andrus, French Horn, playing with the Houston Symphony; Virgil Blackwell, studying the Clarinet at Juilliard School of Music in New York, a senior, preparing for professional performance; Fred Angerstein, studying the Tuba at Juilliard School of Music, a sophomore, preparing for professional performance.

How is an honor band made? Blend the proper ingredients in the correct amounts and at the right time, continue work until done, then test, cover with brilliance and excellence, and serve. George Walters followed this recipe and created LA MARQUE AAAA Honor Band for 1967.
