## Colt Band Organized In 1947


The people of Arlington, Texas, are proud of the Arlington High School Colt Band. In many towns there is a long tradition of many years backing for the high school band but Arlington has a reasonably young band organization. In 1947 the band was organized under the direction of James L. Tarver, and during that first year there were about 60 members dressed in white coveralls which lacked the glamor that every band desires, to say the least.

It was during the second year of Mr. Tarver's directorship that Superintendent W. R. Wimbish and Principal James W. Martin along with Mr. Tarver began to dream about some business man or men who would find pleasure in sponsoring this new organization. They presented their plans to Hooker Vandergriff and his son, Tommy Vandergriff, the local Buick-Chevrolet Dealers, and received the promise that they would think it over. A few days later a telephone call came from Hooker Vandergriff from Oklahoma City, saying that he had decided to sponsor the high school

The first expense came in the purchase of uniforms, the very finest they were, too, green wool gaberdine. Following in quick succession have come various purchases of instruments.

The present director of the Arlington Colt Band, Dean P. Corey, who is a graduate of Transylvania College, Lexington, Kentucky, has just completed three successful years with the band. He has proved to be the answer to any superintendent's dream, because he has certainly brought the Arlington Band to the forefront in many ways. His clever half-time performances at every football game are the pride of Arlington. Whatever the opponents' band may do, Arlington rests assured that Dean Corey's Band will equal and usually excel.

For the past two years the Arlington Band has rated a first division in precision marching in the annual Interscholastic League competition. They have also rated well in concert playing and sight reading and

it has become the accepted fact that many soloists and ensembles rate first division in contest playing.

The band director devotes each morning in instructing the students of junior high age in each of the four elementary schools in Arlington. This forms a nucleus for the band as these students enter high school.

It is not in uniforms and instruments alone that the Vandergriffs have proved invaluable sponsors of the band, for every out of town performance sees the Arlington Colt Band riding on chartered buses financed by the Vandergriffs.

The past three years have seen Arlington fielding a football team that has gone into the state playoffs, winning state championship this year. This has necessitated many extra trips, at a great distance from home, but never has the football team played during the past three years without the faithful band. This has meant thirty-nine football games in the past three years, with an average of about half

of the games away from home. Every time the 70 piece band rode in two chartered buses. During the four years of sponsoring the band, the Vandergriffs have spent over \$25,000,00.

The Arlington Band has received much recognition besides contest winning. They have made various appearances, a year ago they played for the state Future Homemakers Meeting in Fort Worth, and on July 18th of this year they played in Dallas for the state meeting of the Future Farmers of America, at the Dallas Fair, and at the ground breaking for the local General Motors plant in Arlington.

The appearance of the Arlington Colt Band is the pride of the town. Some times at band meets, one may see band members carrying their hats, their coats off, shirts open, but not Arlington. After a hard day of playing in a contest or marching, every member looks as trim and neat in his uniform as he did when he rode away from home that morning.








#### Vandergriffs to Furnish Buses For January Trip to California

Arlington High School's Colt Band has been chosen as one of five groups of its type in the nation to march in the Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena, California, next January 2, Director Dean Corey revealed here Wednesday.

And, already, the Vandergriff Buick and Chevrolet Companies of Arlington have agreed to finance the bus transportation for the trip, making it possible to notify the Rose Bowl Tournament Committee immediately of acceptance of the invitation, Director Corey stated.

The trip is being planned as an eight-day jaunt, leaving on Wednesday, December 28, 1966, and returning on Wednesday, January 4, of 1967. Because New Year's Day falls on Sunday in 1967, the parade and Rose Bowl Game will not be held until January 2. Included in the eight days are three days for sightseeing in and around the Los Angeles area.

## Marching out in style

#### Dean Corey retiring as music coordinator

ARLINGTON — Looking back on 31 years with the Arlington Independent School District, retiring music coordinator Dean P. Corey said that the day he moved here was the luckiest day of his life. A transplanted Ohioan, he had come to Arlington to be

band director at Arlington High School.

"For a band director, there is no better state in the union," he said. "Every little podunk town in Texas has a good high school band."

And in 1949, Arlington pretty well qualified as a "little rodunk town."

podunk town.

"When I came here in 1949, Arlington was just a sleepy little village with only one high school and a couple of elementary schools," Corey said.

He estimated the population to be about 6,500 — a far cry from the more than 150,000 who live in Arlington

today.

IN THOSE DAYS, there wasn't much school district money being pumped into the band program, but the band director's job at Arlington High School was a mu-

sic educator's dream.

Although school funds weren't available for out-of-town trips and costly large instruments, he soon learned that those expenditures were being taken care of by the

Vandergriff family.

"The Vandergriff family sponsored the band for about 18 years. They provided all our transportation, bought the uniforms and paid for all the big instruments," Corey said. "They did just about everything but pay the band director's salary."

Although the "little" Arlington school district could afford no frills they had hude sted the hand director's

afford no frills, they had budgeted the band director's

salary.
The money wasn't really attractive, but the sponsorship of the Vandergriff family was.
"As a matter of fact, it's one of the things that attracted me to the position," Corey said.
He came to Arlington after teaching for a year in Kentucky and three years in Ohio. There were several reasons for moving to the Southwest.
First, he had married a Texan while serving in the Army at Fort Wolters in Wichita Falls. His wife, Becky, was from Fort Worth.

was from Fort Worth.

When he left Texas and returned to Ohio to teach, Corey said that, despite the fact that his wife was from the state, he vowed he would never return. It was a vow

easily broken.
"It was just the fact that I was here in the service. I finally decided it was the service I bated and not Tex-

THE TEACHING POSITION he accepted here lasted

23 years, until he was promoted to his present job in 1972.

Those 23 years were rich with proud moments. There was the time the Arlington High School hand accompa-

Knowing that only about five bands from outside Califomia would be chosen, the Arlington group decided to

apply.
"We made application in January of 1966, hoping to receive a bid to come in a couple of years. In three months we had an invitation to go," he said.

The eight-day trip was estimated to cost about \$20,000, and again the Vandergriff family came to the rescue.

"Tom Vandergriff said it was something we had to do so he furnished four chartered buses." Corey said.

THE BAND STAGED several fund-raising events to collect money for lodging and food during the trip.
"We had a unique experience. We stayed at the UCLA

(University of California at Los Angeles) residence hall, and the Purdue University band was also staying there. They had a 300-piece show band. It was very exciting."

Corey said.
That year Purdue was playing the University of Southern California. Vandergriff, who was a USC fan, flew in for the game. He cheered for California, but the Arlington band members had become pretty friendly with the Purdue group.

It was the highlight of 23 years in which there were many times of distinction.

"We won a lot of awards and trophies. We had a crack band in those years," Corey said.

In more than two decades, Corey said, he has found some of the elements that make "crack" bands.

"First of all, you've got to have good personnel feed-

"First of all, you've got to have good personnel feeding you from the junior high schools. If the kids can play when they get to you, it's a plus.

"The members themselves have got to have a high

morale, a spirit and a sense of pride in what they are doing. You've got to instill in them to try and be as perfect as they can, Corey said.

Then, just like a football team, it takes a lot of drill

Being a high school band director wasn't Corey's first aspiration, but it was close.
"My high school band director was my inspiration."

he said.

Still, he always dreamed of taking his flute and taking a chair in a symphony orchestra. When he learned after graduating from college that there were only about 51 such jobs in the country, he chose teaching.

"I've never regretted it," Corey said.

SINCE HIS ENTRANCE to the district, the music program has grown from that first band at Arlington High School to band, orchestra, choral and elementary music programs. After he became coordinator of music,

Corey said, the music faculty increased from 38 to 86.

Music has always been a way of life in the Corey home. His son, Dean P. Corey III is a musician with the Fort Worth Sympnony Orchestra and teaches at the University of Texas at Arlington. His daughter, Carolyn McNellie, is married to a minister of music McNellie is married to a minister of music

Over the years he incited a love of music in his own children, as well as those in his classroom.

Corev and his wife of 54 years, Becky, have reared a family of musicians. Their two children and five grandchildren perform or teach.

Their son Dean, who produces concerts, said much of the inspiration for his work can be traced back to his childhood and his father's love of music.

"He never forced music on anybody," he said. "But he created an atmosphere for it to flourish."




#### DEAN P. COREY

DEAN P. COREY WAS BORN IN CINCINNATI, OHIO. HE SHOWED AN EARLY INTEREST IN MUSIC. HE WAS TAKEN TO A CONCERT BY JOHN PHILLIP SOUSA AND HIS BAND IN 1925, AT THE AGE OF 7. HE BEGAN TO PLAY THE FLUTE AT AGE 12 IN JR. HIGH SCHOOL. AT WITHROW HIGH SCHOOL HE PLAYED THE FLUTE AND PICCOLO IN THE BAND UNDER THE LEGENDARY GEORGE SMITH. HE ALSO PLAYED IN THE HIGH SCHOOL ORCHESTRA UNDER JOSEPH SURDO, A BOYHOOD FRIEND OF ARTURO TOSCANINI IN ITALY. HE STUDIED FLUTE AT THE CINCINNATI CONSERVATORY OF MUSIC WITH ROBERT CAVALLY AND PLAYED IN THE ORCHESTRA UNDER ALEXANDER VON KRIESLER, WHO LATER BECAME LONG TIME DIRECTOR OF ORCHESTRA AT U.T. AUSTIN. MR. COREY EARNED A BACHELOR OF ARTS DEGREE FROM TRANSYLVANIA UNIVERSITY IN LEXINGTON, KY. IN 1940. HE RECEIVED A MASTER OF MUSIC EDUCATION DEGREE FROM T.C.U. IN FORT WORTH IN 1961. IN 1943 HE MARRIED REBECCA ANN WESTMORELAND. THEY HAVE 2 CHILDREN AND 5 GRANDCHILDREN, ALL MUSICIANS. DURING WW II HE PLAYED IN THE 93RD ARMY GROUND FORCES BAND IN 1941--45. HE CAME TO ARLINGTON, TEXAS IN 1949 WHERE HE WAS HIGH SCHOOL BAND DIRECTOR AND COORDINATOR OF MUSIC ACTIVITIES, RETIRING IN 1980. HE STILL PLAYS FOR WEDDINGS, MEMORIAL SERVICES, RECITALS, CHURCH SERVICES AND THE ARLINGTON COMMUNITY BAND. HE ALSO SERVES AS AN ADJUDICATOR AT SOLO AND ENSEMBLE CONTESTS IN THE ARLINGTON AREA.

#### CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

THE ARLINGTON BAND GAVE MANY CONCERTS AND ENTERED UIL AND MANY INDEPENDENT FESTIVALS OVER THE YEARS. RATINGS VARIED --MOSTLY I'S AND II'S AND AN OCCASIONAL III. AT ONE POINT THE BAND HAD 17 STRAIGHT YEARS OF I'S IN UIL MARCHING CONTESTS. MANY BAND STUDENTS WERE SELECTED TO REGION,

BAND TOURED MEXICO AND PERFORMED FOR THE AMERICAN COLONY IN MEXICO CITY. IN 1967 THE BAND PERFORMED IN THE TOURNAMENT OF ROSES PARADE IN PASADENA, CALIF, ON NEW YEAR'S DAY. UPON MR., COREY'S RETIREMENT IN 1980 A BANQUET AND PROGRAM WAS GIVEN BY OVER 400 COLLEAGUES AND FRIENDS. ENDING WITH THE PRESENTATION OF A GIFT OF A 16 DAY TRIP TO EUROPE. COREY WAS A CHARTER INDUCTEE INTO THE REGION V BAND DIVISION OF THE T.M.E.A. BAND DIRECTOR'S HALL OF FAME. IN 1995 A REUNION OF EX-BAND STUDENTS WAS HELD WITH OVER 500 IN ATTENDANCE. A BAND SCHOLARSHIP WAS SET UP TO BE AWARDED TO THE OUTSTANDING BAND STUDENT EACH YEAR AT A.H.S. MR. COREY HAS STATED THAT IT WAS A GREAT DAY WHEN THE LORD LED HIM TO ARLINGTON, TEXAS AND GAVE TO HIM THE OPPORTUNITY TO WORK WITH HIS WONDERFUL BAND KIDS. HE ALWAYS TRIED TO BE AN EDUCATOR, NOT JUST A WINNER. THROUGHOUT HIS CAREER HE BEGAN TO REALIZE WHAT A TREMENDOUS AND LASTING IMPACT TEACHING MUST HAVE ON STUDENTS. HE IS GRATEFUL THAT HE WAS PRIVILEDGED TO BE A SMALL PART OF THE GREATEST PROFESSION IN THE WORLD--TEACHING.





# Corey honored by friends, admirers upon retirement

An overflow crowd filled the auditorium at the Arlington Community Center Friday night in eloquent tribute to Dean P. Corey, retiring public school music coordinator.

An official proclamation by Mayor S.J. Stovall had designated May 30 as Dean Corey Day, and a paraphrase of the statement

that appeared on the program stated, "The City of Arlington, Texas, salutes Dean P. Corey for 31 years of outstanding and dedicated service to our young people, for his selfless work in our city, for his devotion to his church and for his insistence upon the advancement of the art of music in our community."

The sentiments were echoed and amplified by a distinguished assemblage that included city officials, ex-students, nearly every public school music teacher, university personnel and hundreds of members of Arlington's diverse community whose lives have been touched by the work and inspiration of the honree.

IN SPITE of the forward thrust of the programs initiated during Corey's rich career, the overwhelming sentiment at the gathering was nostalgia. There was a time in the recent past when Arlington High was the only high school in town, and Corey's AHS band formed the focal point for cultural and civic activity. The band won high honors in competitions, and, with the generous backing of the Vandergriff family, travelled as Arlington's goodwill ambassador to many points in the United States and Mexico.

Following his appointment as coordinator of music in 1972, an orchestra program was initiated in the Arlington public school system that has attracted statewide attention by the excellence of the product. Corey developed a program of private lessons in the secondary instrumental department and initiated string night, band night and elementary night at the University of Texas at Arlington, as well as an all-city choir and clinics.

A program for fourth, fifth and sixth grade students has brought the Fort Worth Opera, Ballet and Symphony to Arlington on a regular basis. Another first was supervising the writing of a curriculum guide for the entire music department of the Arlington public schools.

In addition to his official duties, Corey has been an enthusiastic member of the Arlington Civic Chorus for several years and a member of the Grand Prairie Community Band. He is a long-time member of the First United Methodist Church and an active lene Watson and Mike Copeland.

It was appropriate for the program to begin with the AHS band directed by Barbara Ecabert and Tom Hall, and it was fitting too that the flute soloist was Judy Pierce. Ms. Pierce was the first AHS student to gain admission to the All-State Band for four consecutive years, and she was a private flute student of Corey. Her selection, "Syrinx" by Claude Debussy, was the first work she studied with her teacher.

Most of the illustrious speakers also have been closely associated with Corey over the years. The Rev. Jack Payne, who delivered the invocation, was Corey's minister at First United Methodist.

Former superintendent of schools James W. Martin did an incomparable job as eulogist and humorist in his role as master of ceremonies. And former mayor Tom Vandergriff demonstrated once again his talent as announcer in a witty and entertaining slide presentation on Corey's life, compiled by Mrs. Corey, Char-

Speakers Jane Robin Ellis, J. Woodrow Counts, Stovall, James, A. Jacobsen, Randy Garmon and Dean and Carolyn Corey all contributed tender or humorous anecdotes.

In spite of the good-natured ribbing concerning the two- to four-minute limit on speeches, most exceeded the specifications in an apparent desire to include as much as possible.

VANDERGRIFF recalled his job as a halftime announcer for the Colt band as "one of my happiest times. There was that about Dean Corev." special moment before the band began to play, when a hush swept over the stands ... and it was a special moment when Dean Corey led our band."

A prolonged ovation for Corey's long-time colleague Ms. Ellis. whose choral organization rivaled the AHS band for awards and influence, prompted one of the funniest and most outspoken speeches of the evening. Ending seriously, she reminisced, "In a place where many people fuss and fight, we never did. They were happy years, Dean. And why not? Arlington High was a great place to work. The kids, the music which was created of and for us made a magnificent collage to treasure and remember."

Jacobsen, director of bands at Texas Christian University, described Corey as "a winner in all phases of our occupation."

Superintendent of schools Counts said, "Dean is a person who lives by the Golden Rule. One of the nicest compliments a man can say about another man is, 'He is a good man,' and I've heard a lot of men say that about Dean Corey."

Stovall thanked Corey for "the many hours you have spent with the young people of the community, challenging them to do their

HUTCHESON Junior High band director Garmon spoke for former AHS students. He recalled their band director was nicknamed "Papa" Corey. "That's how we felt about him. We all love him."

Dean (Pat) Corey wound up an affectionate talk with "Corey's first law of music education is: 'If you teach a kid to blow a horn. he'll never blow a safe." And Carolyn Corey McNellie said, "To know him is to love him, and Dad, I love you."

Martin summed it all up with, "We are saying, Dean and Beckie, how much we appreciate you. Thank you."

Then it was the honoree's turn. He said he was "overwhelmed. You sure make it hard to be humble." He extended his gratitude to the dinner committee members and to the community, and said the order of music at football games was the order of important aspects of his life: "God, country and ourselves." He cited the contributions made to his happiness by his wife and family and thanked the students, teachers and friends who had influenced his life.

Robert Rober, band director at Sam Houston High School, presented Corey with a book containing names of donors to a fund for a trip to the Passion Play at Oberammergau, near Munich, Ger-

The program ended as it began, with the AHS band. But this time it was Corey on the conductor's stand, leading the band in a stirring arrangement of "America the Beautiful." The whole crowd sang the final, exultant chorus, followed by a benediction by the Rev. E. Warren Neal, former minister of the First Presbyterian Church.
