Kirbyville Band Gets Al Rating In Marching Contest

Saturday, November 20, the Kirbyville High School Band entered the Regional Marching Contest at Warren. The band did very well and was given A-1 Division Rating.

There were ten required maneuvers which the band did, plus special formation of their own choosing. There were four judges who gave the band points for everything they did correct. Each maneuver was worth a certain number of grade points. Any incorrect maneuver can knock a band down one rating. Any band making a total of 95 points or above gets A-1 rating. The Kirbyville Band made a total of 96.5 points and was the only band in Class AA that was placed in I Division.

The ratings of the bands and what they mean are: Division I-Superior - The best conceivable performance for the event and the class of participants being judged. Division II - Excellent - An unusual performance in many respects, but not worthy of the highest rating due to minor defects in performance or ineffective interpretation. Division III - Good - A good performance, but not outstanding. Division IV - Fair - An average performance, but not worthy of a higher rating. Division V -Below Average - Much room for improvement.

Many people seem to misunderstand just what making A1 Division means. Some seem to think they won the contest. Even though Kirbyville was the only band in their class to make a I Division, they were not the only band in the contest to make One.
