Frederick (Fritz) Teltschik

Frederick (Fritz) Teltschik was born in 1893 near Wiemer, Texas. He was the first child of the Joseph Teltschik family to be born in the United States.

He was taught to play the violin by his older brother, Henry. At the age of twelve, Fritz and his brothers organized the Teltschik Dance Orchestra. They played for weddings and other celebrations in the Floresville, Texas area.

From 1921- 26, Fritz served as director of the Floresville City Band. The band became the Floresville Tiger Band in 1932, and played for County Fairs, city functions, and highschool football games.

In 1926 Fritz organized the Floresville Junior Orchestra, composed of his private students.

The Florsville School Band was organized in 1937 under the direction of Fritz Teltschik, assisted by the Rev. ROK Heacock. In that 30 piece band there were nine of Teltschik's nieces and nephews. He became known as "Uncle Fritz" to that band and later to school musicians and directors through the state. His son, Avie, and two daughters, Lorene and Minifred, were also members of that band. In 1941 the Floresville School Band officially became part of the Floresville School System.

"Uncle Fritz" also organized the Teltschik Family Band. The Band still performs at the Wurstfest and for Family Reunions here in Texas and in Germany.

In 1939 "Uncle Fritz" along with five other south Texas directors started inter city band clinics, a forerunner of the District, Region, State Band concept.

In 1942 he helped organize the Vandercook Band Camp in Seguin and served on the camp's faculty for fifteen years. He recieved his Bachelor of Music in Chicago in 1955.

The Floresville School Band recieved personal proclamations from Governor Coke Stephenson in 1943 and 1944 for selling the most War Bonds at their monthly Victory Concerts.

In 1947, Uncle Fritz was honored by being elected a lifetime member of the Gamma Phi Capter of the Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia Fraternity at SWTSC in San Marcos.

The Floresville Band was Chosen to lead the Inaugural Parade for Governor John Conally in Austin in 1963.

During his 27 years as director of the Floresville School Band, his band recieved eleven Sweepstake Ratings, 85 First Division Ratings, and individual members recieved 400 First Division Ratings. His band marched at the very first band contest at Alamo Stadium in San Antonio, Texas.

After graduation from high school many of his students continued their band participation in college and other band organizations. Six became band directors, two were his own childern, Avie Teltschik and Minifred Teltschik Aoueille.


Fritz Teltschik retired in 1964 after 54 years of teaching music. That same year he was honored by Texas Bandmasters Association as Bandmaster of the year.

Fritz Teltschik died November 8, 1983.

He was known for his wit and humor and his jocular showmanship. Using his own words "He never knew a stranger". He was a friend to all. He gave over 3,000 childern a love and appreciation for music. His influence is still being felt bt those who knew him.

The band hall in Floresville, Texas bears his name, Fritz Teltschik Band Hall, the band hall at Tivy High School in Kerrville, Texas bears the name of his son, The Avie Teltschik Band Hall.







Inter City Clinics Proving Popular in Texas

We have all heard of the state band clinics and most of us are familiar with regional band clinics but it was a rather revolutionary idea when Director S. J. Shadegg of Karnes City advocated and finally instituted a local inter-city clinic. The purpose of these clinics, according to Director Shadegg, is three-fold, namely; to bring the bandmasters closer together; to produce an incentive in the student for better work, and to show the taxpayer just how the band-master and the band work to smoothe out those inevitable rough spots which every band encounters. It is agreed that the clinics have been and still are carrying out these functions.

The clinics meet once a month in a different town, on invitation. The various high school bands of the district send a certain number of musicians and their director, to participate in the clinic. Each band master brings one overture and one march of his own choice, which (Continued on Page 6, Col. 4)

In looking over the schedule of the typical clinic as outlined in the previous paragragh, we can clearly see that the clinic is working toward the goal set for it by Director Shadegg. During the rehearsal hours the bandmasters must, evidently, become more closely acquainted with each other. The students, noting what other directors and students are doing, will be, and are, induced to do better work themselves. The concert following the rehearsal, hour usually draws large crowds; people who have a deeper appreciation of their bandmaster and their band after the concert than they had before. So we see that the three purposes are being fulfilled in every letail.

Some bandmasters and some chool officials at first doubted the alue and the success of such a enture but they are all agreed low that the clinics are most valuable. Superintendent J. H. Stamper lilar to the one described.

concert audience at the clinic held in Kenedy said, "At first I thought we were overdoing it. 'Too many school activities' was my contention." Then speaking to the clinic band he continued, saying, "But now, my young friends, any time that you desire to have another clinic here, Kenedy will be waiting for you." Director Fritz Teltschick of Floresville, in a letter of thanks written to Mr. Shadegg wrote, "My band has improved over 25% since the inauguration of the clinics which improvement I attribute to the clinics." Superintendent D. E. Moore of Karnes City, when asked what he thought of the clinics replied, "In my observation, the clinics have not only greatly benefitted the student, but have also created an active band interest in the citizens of this community. The clinics instructive, as well as their entertain-ment value, cannot be overesti-

mated. The clinics have done more than was ever expected of them."
All believe that the local clinic is the answer to many of the problems encountered by the average band. At least this is the effect that it has had on those bands that have participated in the clinic, It can be reasonably said that there is no band that wouldn't be benefitted by attendance at a clinic sim-







Floresville's 'Music Man' Wins Honor

Teltschik is the veteran of 30 years as director of music in Floresville school system and has been director of music for the city since 1921.

He began his musical career

in 1905 when he organized the Teltschik Orchestra, a family danca hand

Composed of four brothers and several neices and nephews, the band existed until 1931, when it was disbanded because of individual business conflicts. Dur-ing this time Teltschik was named director of music for Floresville schools and organized the first Floresville school band - composed of fifteen private students.

In 1941, following several awards from the University of Texas Interscholastic League, Teltschik's School band became

an official part of the Floresville school system.

That same year, Teltschik, and his Tiger band received citations from Gov. Coke Steven son for outstanding work in the field of music for raising over half a million dollars from the sale of Victory Bonds and stamps.

Through his teaching, Floresville bands have amassed a total of 10 sweepstakes titles and 85 first division ratings. Individual students under his direction have won over 400 first

place awards.

Tetschik, nicknamed "Uncle Fritz" by the citizens of Floresville, attended Texas Lutheran S College in Seguin and received his bachelor's degree in music from Vandercook School of Music in Chicago.

"Uncle Fritz" was born near Weimar, Colorado county, Texas, February 26, 1893. His parents Mr .and Mrs. Joseph Teltschik were born in the old country. Both are now deceased. He had four brothers and two sisters. All his brothers have been talented musicians and played in Floresville bands and orchestras. Two sons of Dr. Frank Teltschik of Houston are talented pianists of national fame.

1962 - The Band attended the State Fair of Texas in Dallas.

1963 - The Band was invited n to lead the Inaugurai Parade at the Inauguration of Governor John Connally. The Floresville School Band was asked to lead the Fat Stock Show Parade in $\mathbf{R}^{\mathbf{k}}$ San Antonio.



Band Hall Dedication Draws Crowd and Tears





Wilbert Teltschik, nephew of Uncle Fritz, gave the address which highlighted the afternoon's ceremony. Children of Fritz Teltschik, Avie Teltschik and Minifred Teltschik Aoueille, pulled the cords to un-drape the new sign "Fritz Telt-

Against March-like winds in the Texas spring sunshine a representative scrowd of friends, *relatives. Floresville School District officials. teachers, and Floresville High School ex-band members gathered Sunday afternoon, April 15. 1984, to dedicate the Floresville High School Band Hall to "Uncle Fritz" Teltschik, organizer of the Floresyille school band program and Band Director here for thirtytwo years.

The afternoon's ceremony was begun with a musical selection from the Floresville High School Band. FISD Superintendent Maurice Westmoreland welcomed the guests and introduced Rev. Bruce Booher of First Lutheran Church who gave the Invocation. Superintendent Westmoreland then introduced the special guests which included members of the Teltschik family, FISD Board members, schools' principals, teachers, and retired teachers. Westmoreland then introduced Wilbert Teltschik, nephew of Uncle Fritz and outstanding citizen and businessman Floresville.

The sentimental occasion reached its peak during the address given by Wilbert Teltschik. The text of his address -follows:

It is with great pleasure that I have the privilege of saying a few words about "Uncle

Although he was my real "Uncle", he was known as "Uncle Fritz" to all of the students in his many. bands, to the citizens of Floresville, and to all connected with the music circle of Southwest Texas. This name originated because his first band was composed of his nieces and nephews and the name "Uncle Fritz! stuck with him throughout his life.

"'Uncle Fritz' was born near Weimar, Colorado County, Texas, on February 26, 1893. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Teltschik, came to the United States from Austria. He had 4 brothers and 2 sisters. Eleven of his brothers have been talented musicians and played in Floresville bands and or-

chestras. "Uncle Fritz" began his mucial career at the age of 12, in the year 1905. He played in a family dance orchestra, called The Teltschik Orchestra composed of 4 brothers and several nieces and nephews. This orchestra disbanded in 1931.

In 1921, he was elected Director of the Floresville City Band, which consisted of 15 members.

In 1925 he organized and taught Floresville Schol Orchestra composed of 15 private students.

In 1932 he organized the Floresville Tiger Band. This band consisted of his private students and business men and was financed jointly by the 21 members and Uncle

Fritz. During this period the Tiger band played for all football games and other school and city functions as the school did not have a band.

In 1937 HE ORGANIZED THE FLORESVILLE SCHOOL BAND.

in 1939 his band received First Division Rating at a Marching Contest held at the Yorktown Little World's Fair.

in 1940 his band atlended the first in-terscholastic League Marching Contest and received a First Division School Band was the Rating.

In 1941 his band received the first Sweepstakes Rating. During this year the Floresville Band became a part of the school system. The same year Uncle Fritz, Mr. H.B. Nutt of Chicago's Vandercook School of Music and Mr. Tampke of Texas Lutheran College organized the Vandercook School of Music Camp at Texas Lutheran College in Seguin. Uncle Fritz worked with this Music Camp for 18 consecutive years.

During the years 1942-1944 Uncle Fritz and his band won the State Victory Band Concert Contest for both years for outstanding work in the field of music for raising over half a million dollars from the sale of Victory Bonds and Stamps in a total of 13 concerts. The Band received a personal proclamation from then Governor Stevenson

each of the 2 years for this outstanding accomplishment.

In 1946 the Band was invited to play two special concerts for the wounded service men at General Brooke * Hospital.

In 1946 Uncle Fritz was chosen one of 4 outstanding High School Band Directors in the State of Texas to help improve teacher training curricula for High School Instrumental Music Teachers by the University of Indiana.

In 1947 the Floresville Guest Band at the International Friendship Festival in Eagle Pass. Texas.

In 1949 Uncle Fritz was elected honorary life member of Gamma Phi Chapter of the Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia Fraternity at Southwest Texas State College in San Marcos.

In 1955 Uncle Fritz attended Texas. Lutheran College in Seguin and received his Bachelor's Degree in Music from the Vandercook School of Music in Chicago, Illinois.

In 1962 the Band attended the State Fair of Texas in Dallas.

In 1963 the Band was invited to lead the Inaugural Parade at the Inauguration of Gov. John Connally. During the same year the School Band was asked to lead the Fat Stock Show Parade in San Antonio.

In 1963 the City of Floresville presented an engraved plaque to Uncle Fritz "In Recognition

For Distinguished Service as Bandmaster in Floresville Community and Schools for 54 Years And For Loyal And Devoted Activities With The Youth." He was also presented a "Citizen Of The Year" Award in 1964 from the Floresville Chamber of Commerce.

During his many years as Floresville High School Band Director, his Bands won all Sweenstakes Rating from the University Interscholastic League, the highest award given a band in Texas. Besides this, his Bands won some 85 First Division Ratings in separate contests sponsored by UIL. His students won 400 First Division Ratings in solo and ensemble contests some of which were won at the State Solo Contest in Austin. Several of his band members have placed in the All-State Band.

Having been called the "MUSIC MAN" of Floresville for 54 years. at the age of 70, he was named BANDMASTER OF THE YEAR in 1963-1964, by the Texas Bandmaster's Association.

On May 15, 1964, over 800 persons paid tribute to Uncle Fritz in his final concert as Director of the Floresville School Band, after having devoted over 50 years of his life to the promotion of orchestras and bands in his home community of Floresville. Over 100 ex-members of the Floresville School Band of former years were in attendance.

students had this to say at his final concert:

"Uncle Fritz" is a name that has never been forgotten by any ex-band member. There were times when every ex wondered what this man was trying to do to us. We would practice a piece of music until we knew it by heart. We would march for hours and many times there were blisters. But with assurance our reward came one way or another....With Uncle Fritz you laughed and you cried, you prayed and you thanked, and you worked and you were rewarded."

Uncle Fritz has been called "Dean of Band Directors in Southwest Texas". He was very devoted to the Youth of the Community. He loved each and everyone of his band students and each one was important to him. Music was his life. He once said "Music runs in my family because the parents are always encouraging the children to practice. I helieve anyone can be a musician if they work at it. It's not just talent, it's determination."

Mrs. Jewel Woolsey, who through the years accompanied a great many of his students, credits Uncle Fritz with the following quote: "A boy that blows a horn will never blow a safe."

His influence with our youth in teaching and promoting appreciation of music has been of the greatest importance in the development of character and moral culture.

in closing, "Uncle Fritz" was truly MR. MUSIC OF SOUTHWEST TEXAS.

As "Uncle Fritz" was fondly remembered, the eyes of those present filled with tears.

Minifred Teltschik Aoueille thanked everyone for the gracious honor being given to her father. Minifred and her brother Avie then pulled the cords to un-drape the new sign "Fritz Teltschik Band Hall".

The ceremony concluded with a musical number by a combination of the Floresville High School Band and ex-band members.



WHO ARE THE TELTSCHIKS?



In 1888 the Teltschiks immigrated to the United States. Josef Teltschik and Anna Tannenberger, his wife, left Tauchel, Austria, and arrived in Hoboken, New Jersey; changed ships and landed in Galveston, Texas. The family lived in several communities in Colorado County including Subline, Content, New Bielau and Oakland. In 1908 the family finally bought and settled on a farm in Wilson County near Floresville. The family consisted of the parents, two daughters and five sons.

By this time the sons had already studied music and had organized a dance band called the Teltschik Brothers Band which played 2 or 3 times a week for over 30 years at various dances in the South & Central Texas area.

In the 1930's there was no school band in Floresville so one brother, Fritz organized a band for the young people of that community. Many of the young bandsmen were nephews and neices of the director that when someone wanted the director's attention, "Uncle Fritz" was the term usually heard. The name soon was used by all the musicians. In 1941, the Floresville School District made this a part of the school curriculum with "Incle Fritz"

as the director.

During the 1940's the Floresville School Band was selected as the top band in the state in its class. Uncle Fritz was named "Bandmaster of the Year" for the state of Texas in 1964.

Henry, the oldest brother, deceased, chose the Dry Goods profession and his children have followed this profession.

Brother Frank, deceased, a Chriopractor had moved to Houston and his sons were trained as outstanding pianists, with Music Studios throughout Houston.

The Mother and the two daughters, all deceased were not musicians. However most of the children of Elizabeth Nitschmann (Mrs. Joe) and Ernestine Lange (Mrs. Hugo) play instruments.


As this generation of Teltschiks grew up and married, many picked musicians as their mates, and most of their children also became band members in bands through out the state. This continues even today with later generations.

Today there are 127 Telt-schiks who gather the last Sunday of each June for the Family Reunion. As with most families, food is an important item for this annual occasion, but more important to this family are

such items -- as who is bringing the bass drum, do we have enough music stands, and who has the music? Instrumentation is no problem as there are enough musicians who can double on any number of horns. "Uncle Fritz" who retired as a band director over 15 years ago is still expected to direct. He is now 84 years old. Two other brothers are still living and are also still participants in the band--Willie, 82, semi-retired and Alfred, 75, retired and now a resident of New Braunfels, Texas.

It was decided at this year's reunion that Wurstfest would be a good place to get together and perform and show thousands what one German family has enjoyed doing for years. We think the Teltschiks are kinda special with their Teltschik Family Band.

As a footnote, of the 127 living members, 68 can play a musical instrument and 12 are presently singing in various choirs. Eleven have majored in music in college and five have been outstanding band directors throughout the state. Twentyfive have at one time either taught music or performed professionally. Most of all they have enjoyed their musical background!

TELTSCHIK FAMILY BAND

The Teltschik Family Band members are the children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren (and their spouses) of Anna Tannenberger and Joseph Teltschik. In 1889, the Joseph Teltschiks immigrated into the United States from Austria. They left Zauchtel, Austria and landed in Galveston, Texas. The family lived in several communities in Colorado County. In 1908, the family settled in Floresville, Wilson County, Texas.

Joseph and Anna had ll children, four of which died in infancy. The remaining children consisted of five sons - Henry, Frank, Fritz, Willie, and Alfred, and two daughters - Elizabeth and Ernestine.

At an early age, the older sons became interested in learning to play musical instruments, and they in turn taught the others. Music was, and is today, an important part of the Teltschik family.

In 1909, the Teltschik Orchestra began playing for dances. They played for dances for over 30 years in the south and central part of Texas. The Floresville Band was organized in 1921 and ten of its members were Teltschiks. In 1930, Fritz Teltschik organized a band for the young people of the community. Many of the band members were his nephews and nieces. Therefore, when they wanted the Director's attention, "Uncle Fritz" was the term usually heard. The name soon was used by all the young musicians. In 1941 the band became part of the Floresville school curriculum, with "Uncle Fritz" as the Director.

As this generation of Teltschiks grew up and married, many selected musicians as their mates, and most of their children became members of bands throughout the state. This practice continues even today with later generations.

In the Teltschik family, there are 74 who have played a musical instrument, 11 have majored in music in college, and six have directed choirs. Our band membership is proud of having nine directors, 12 private piano teachers, five concert pianists, and 12 drum majors. Twenty-three have at one time either taught music or played professionally.
