




Tivy High Band Travels To State To Receive Third



Tivy Band Hall to carry name of retired band director

The metal nameplate which bears the name of Tivy Band Hall will be changed to Teltschik Band

Hall in honor of a band director who spent many hours among its walls teaching 2,300 students to read music, play a note and march in step.

Avie Teltschik, who retired as Tivy High School's band director in May 1992, is terminally ill and currently in the intensive care unit at Sid Peterson Memorial

Hospital. His wife, Judy, had been taking care of him at home.

The re-christening became official after Kerrville Independent School District board president Keith Williams read a resolution announcing the change, and then presenting the document to Teltschik's four adult children: John, Jim and

Laura Teltschik, and Deanna Teltschik Biddle.

Due to his ill health, their father was unable to attend the meeting. His children traveled far and wide to participate in the dedication. Deanna is a resident of Chandler, Arizona; and her sister, Laura, lives in Austin. Jim comes from Houston and John calls Plano his home.

"We are extremely honored to make this presentation," Williams said.

The copper lettering is not yet ready to be attached to a plaque currently located above the band hall's door. Large music companies around the state have contributed toward the purchase of the letters. A date has not been set for the ribbon cutting. It will probably be held in the fall allowing band students to participate in the dedication.

Teltschik taught band at THS for 23 years. For 22 straight years the school band won sweepstake ratings in sight reading and marching during University Interscholastic League competitions. Sweepstake awards are the highest UIL band honor awarded. The trophies are displayed on shelves in the band hall.

"This gentleman was a master at working with our students," said Dr. Mark Jackson, the newly hired superintendent.

The former band director followed in his father's footsteps after graduating from the University of Texas at Austin with a bachelor's degree in music in 1957. His father, Fritz Teltschik, was the band director at Floresville High School for about 40 years.

Teltschik began his career teaching choir in elementary school for a year in Seadrift and Port O'Connor. He taught high school and junior high school bands in Port Lavaca and Mercedes before moving to Kerrville.

The teacher could play "just about anything," but was a master of the trumpet, Judy said. He was a charter member of the Sentimental Journey Orchestra. The musical group, formed in February 1996, played big band music at local dances. He handed down his love of music to his children. His daughters learned to play the French horn, while Jim preferred the tenor saxophone and John played baritone.

None of his children are currently working as teachers, though three did attend his alma mater.

Expecting changes in the future, Williams said that if renovations do occur at the high school and no matter where the band hall is located, it will always carry its new name.

Choking back tears, Teltschik's son John said how grateful his family was for school officials honoring their father as a great band director, an inspirational teacher and a talented musician.

"When we moved here in '69, I didn't really know if this town really knew what they were going to get in my dad. He was about my age. We left behind a lot of friends and family in Rio Grande Valley and we didn't really know what we were going to get," said John, a former punter with the Philadelphia Eagles football team, adding that the relocation was beneficial for both Kerrville and his family. "In the last nine days, we've seen him to where his skills have really gone down hill. This was awfully nice of you to do: That's really all I have to say."

The emotional moment ended with a standing ovation.

A great teacher named Avie

Avie Teltschik, longtime band director of the Tivy High School Band, was honored this past week by the Kerrville school board when the trustees of the Kerrville Independent School District named the band hall at Tivy High School after Mr. Teltschik, an honor fitting for this fine man. Wherever the Tivy Band practices, the spirit of "Mr. T." can't be far away.

I knew Mr. Teltschik because he was director of the band when I was a (rather poor) band member.

In those days, being in Mr. T's band was a great privilege. Staying in his band, however, was hard work. He seemed to know how to motivate his students to try harder, practice better, and give performances that were above expectations. He was a perfectionist, a gifted technical musician.

And he made being in band an adventure.

As a freshman, our band marched in the Cotton Bowl, along with two other bands. For months we practiced our drills on the field behind Hal Peterson Junior High, moving in formation with two imaginary bands. We practiced in the early morning cold, we practiced in drizzle, we practiced after school.

When the big moment finally came, we stood there on the field in our blue wool uniforms, our tall, silly blue woolly hats, our shiny gold overlays, and our white polished shoes. Every uniform had been inspected. Every instrument had been polished. We stood straight, ready. As the announcer mispronounced our name, and the sound of him saying "the Tivy Antler Marching Band" echoed through the crowded, sunny stadium, our eyes were on Mr. T. He stood at the edge of the field, and he gave us a slight smile. We marched and played our hearts out: we represented Kerr County, we represented Tivy High School, and we represented Avie Teltschik. We wanted to make him proud.

Avie Teltschik, during his 20 plus years as Tivy band director, only had one band that was not a sweepstakes band, and we were glad we were not in that band. To win sweepstakes, a band must be judged superior in three separate contests: marching, concert, and sight-reading. Marching is very complicated. You just try to get 180 high school kids to move the same foot at the same moment, in crazy geometric patterns, while carrying awkward instruments which were designed to be played sitting down. For the concert contest, a band performs pieces that they have practiced to perfection. In the sight reading contest, the band must perform a concert piece that they have seen only moments before appearing on stage. Mr. Teltschik would have us look at the sight-reading music, point out the places where other bands would slip up, and let us run through the piece once, maybe twice, before we went upstairs to the contest. The contests are judged by band directors from across the state. band directors that haven't had to put up with this group of 180 kids, their excesses, their loves, their feuds, their problems.

Mr. Teltschik led us to superior ratings every year I was in his band.

The lessons I learned in Mr. Teltschik's band were lessons for life, lessons that have

Tivy band hall named after Avie Teltschik

Just as Tivy High School's fight never dies, neither will the sounds of brass, percussion and wind instruments that filled the school's band hall for 23 years under the direction of Avie Teltschik.

In a moving presentation Tuesday evening, Kerrville Independent School District trustees renamed Tivy's band hall after Teltschik, who has cancer.

Too weak to appear, Teltschik's children, Lara, Deanna, Jim and John accepted a resolution on their father's behalf.

"When we moved here in 1969, I don't really know if this town knew what they were getting when they got my dad," John Teltschik said.

What the town got was a winner. For 22 of his 23 years, Avie Teltschik led his students to sweepstakes awards, the highest possible in competition.

John Teltschik continued, "It's been tough the last two months ... In the last nine days we've seen to where his skills have just really gone downhill."

"This was awfully nice of you to do," he said.

Many present were moved

Avie, I know you are looking down on us now; you did a helluva job. You will be missed here. I hope we can carry on your tradition.

Avie Teltschik, former Tivy band director, dies

THS band hall recently renamed for teacher

Former Tivy High School band director Avie Teltschik, who taught band from 1957 to 1992, died of cancer Thursday morning at his home.

"He was almost like a secondary parent to a lot of people," said his son John Teltschik. "To me his biggest contribution to the community was just doing his job."

Teltschik served as a band director in Port Lavaca, Texas, for three years, Mercedes, Texas, for nine years, and taught at Tivy High School for 23 years.

Members of the community

remember Teltschik, who directed band at Tivy from 1969 to 1992, as dedicated to his career and to his students. Known to his students as "Mr. T" long before Mohawk haircuts and feather earrings, friends said Teltschik shared a mutual respect with his students.

"Things that were important to us were important to him," former band student Ce-Ce Klein said. "He just lived for us—he probably worked harder than anyone in that band."

As a band director, he led his bands to 29 consecutive University Interscholastic League sweepstakes awards, 22 of those with Tivy High.

Kerrville Independent School District trustees renamed Tivy's band hall after Teltschik on June 18.

"He's done so much for this community and all the kids," said Rick Burgess, who worked with Teltschik at Tivy High for 12 years.

"Back in those days he kind of helped put Kerrville on the map. Everybody in the state knew where Kerrville was and that they had a great band."

John Teltschik said his father and family have received much support from the community during the past months.

"I was here one Saturday and dad had visitors for 11 hours straight. It's unbelievable the time people take out of their days," John Teltschik said. "It really makes you stop and think and puts things in perspective."

He said the family has received countless letters and calls from friends, acquaintances and former students of his father.

"Everybody has been really wonderful for the last two and a half months. We're so thankful for the support we've had," John

Late band director gets spot in hall of fame

A former Tivy High School band director will be inducted into the Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame Monday in San Antonio.

The late Avie Teltschik, Tivy's band director for 23 years, will be inducted with his father Fritz, who died Nov. 8, 1983. Both men were lifetime musicians.

Fritz was taught to play the violin by his older brother Henry. At the age of 12, Fritz and his brothers organized the Teltschik Dance Orchestra, which played for weddings and other celebrations in the Floresville, Texas, area.

From 1921 to 1926 Fritz served as director of the Floresville City Band, which then became the Floresville Tiger Band in 1932, playing for county fairs, city functions and high school football games. In 1926 Fritz organized the Floresville Junior Orchestra which was composed of his

private students.

Fritz organized the Floresville School Band in 1937, assisted by the Rev. R.K. Heacock. He earned the nickname "Uncle Fritz," as nine members of the 30-piece band were his nieces and nephews. His son, Avie, and two daughters, Lorene and Minifred, were also in the band.

While Fritz organized a host of other bands, the Floresville School Band received personal proclamations from Governor Coke Stevenson in 1943 and 1944 for selling the most war bonds at their monthly "Victory Concerts." The band was chosen to lead the Inaugural Parade for Governor John Connally in Austin in 1963.

Avie followed his father's lead. Fritz taught his son to play the tonette at the age of three, and Avie grew up to become an accomplished trumpet player.

Avie's first teaching assignment was in public school music at Port O'Connor as well as the Junior High Band in Seadrift. Being an instrumentalist and having to sing in class all day led to months of hoarseness, but he managed to survive by using some sign language.

From 1958 to 1960, Avie taught the Travis Junior High Band in Port Lavaca, Texas, and from there were to Mercedes High School in Mercedes, Texas, from 1960 to 1969. Avie helped mold them into a Sweepstakes band for nine years. They also placed in the top five in the Honor Band Competition.

Avie and his family moved to Kerrville in 1969 where he was band director at Tivy High School until retirement in 1992, molding them into a Sweepstakes band as

During his 35-year career of public school teaching, Avie's bands received 30 Sweepstakes awards. He was a long-time member of Phi Beta Mu and the Texas Music Educators

Association, and active in several dance bands, including the Sentimental Journey Orchestra of Kerrville.

Avie was also an active member of Zion Lutheran Church where he served on the church council, board of education and sang in the church choir.

He and his wife, Judy, had four children: Deanna, Jim, John and Laura. Avie died July 10, 1997.

The Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame is sponsored by the international bandmasters fraternity Phi Beta Mu. One hundred and thirty-one band directors have been honored since Phi Beta Mu initiated the Hall of Fame in 1975.

To be eligible for consideration, a band director must have produced and maintained an outstanding and consistent band program in the Texas public schools.

The induction ceremony will be held during the Texas Band-masters annual convention in San Antonio on Monday at 3 p.m. in the Mezzanine Salons of the Marriot Riverwalk Hotel.

Avie Teltschik, former Tivy band director, dies

THS band hall recently renamed for teacher

Former Tivy High School band director Avie Teltschik, who taught band from 1957 to 1992, died of cancer Thursday morning at his home.

"He was almost like a secondary parent to a lot of people," said his son John Teltschik. "To me his biggest contribution to the community was just doing his job."

Teltschik served as a band director in Port Lavaca, Texas, for three years, Mercedes, Texas, for nine years, and taught at Tivy High School for 23 years.

Members of the community

remember Teltschik, who directed band at Tivy from 1969 to 1992, as dedicated to his career and to his students. Known to his students as "Mr. T" long before Mohawk haircuts and feather earrings, friends said Teltschik shared a mutual respect with his students.

"Things that were important to us were important to him," former band student Ce-Ce Klein said. "He just lived for us— he probably worked harder than anyone in that band."

As a band director, he led his bands to 29 consecutive University Interscholastic League sweepstakes awards, 22 of those with Tivy High.

Kerrville Independent School District trustees renamed Tivy's band hall after Teltschik on June 18.

"He's done so much for this community and all the kids," said Rick Burgess, who worked with Teltschik at Tivy High for 12 years.


"Back in those days he kind of helped put Kerrville on the map. Everybody in the state knew where Kerrville was and that they had a great band."

John Teltschik said his father and family have received much support from the community during the past months.

"I was here one Saturday and dad had visitors for 11 hours straight. It's unbelievable the time people take out of their days," John Teltschik said. "It really makes you stop and think and puts things in perspective."

He said the family has received countless letters and calls from friends, acquaintances and former students of his father.

"Everybody has been really wonderful for the last two and a half months. We're so thankful for the support we've had," John
