

Striving to help the student with his music lessons, Mr. Streit began development of his machine several years ago. He had an idea for a machine that would contain lessons for each of the 20 different instruments in his band, ranging from begin-

Wanting a patent on his device, Mr. Streit drew up plans, hired a patent attorney to handle the legal work and a draftsman application.

The application was filed on July 17, 1972 by his attorney, and was approved last month, with a number issued covering his invention for the next 17 years.

No plans have been made for manufacture of the machine as yet, but Mr. Streit has already been contacted by one manufacturer.

The self-adjusting Sousaphone holder was designed by Mr. Streit because his fifth and sixth grade students in the junior high band had difficulty with the big forn when required to play it for long periods of time.

Mr. Streit is in his sixth year at Crowell. His band won the Sweepstakes award with Division I ratings in concert, sight reading and marching in 1971-72. His band has won



Just over a week before the UIL contest in Vernon, the CHS band participated in the Greater Southwest Music Festival in Amarillo, and there copped a Division I rating in concert and a Division II in sight reading, play."

"This is a fine band. The sounds are beautiful. You should be very proud to be a member of a group like this. I'm sure you are" was one of the comments of judges who last week awarded the Crowell High School Band Division I ratings in sight reading and concert playing at the UIL contest in Vernon Regional Junior College Wednesday of last week.

The Division I rating in sight reading and concert, together with the I rating received by the band in marching last fall, gives the Wildcat band a I rating in three divisions and for the second time in the history of the school a sweepstakes trophy. It was in 1972 that the band won its other sweepstakes award. and James Streit was director of the band both years.

There are many band trained criptions of classics by Bach. Brahms and Beethoven that they would otherwise never have been exposed to," Streif

As a member of TMEA, Streit is enthusiastic about opportunities to exchange ideas with colleagues; an exchange vital to maintaining high teaching standards, he says. The organization also helps correlate music with the total educational process, stressing that music is an important part of the whole person.

It is the students who reap most benefits from band participation, however. Streit believes membership develops a sense of responsibility, leaderthip and musical abilities, plus the psychological boost of being a member of a group.

"If used correctly, criticism sheets received at band contests can improve both the band and the director. Self-improvement for all the bandsmen is the chief purpose of most band contests.

The better a person plays his instrument, the more enjoyment from playing. Band contests are just one means of reaching this goal," Streit says.

The 93 band members are in grades seven through 12. During the past six years the band has produced three all-state band members and a number of outstanding performers in solo competition at various levels.

The band also has consistently made Division I and Sweepstakes ratings in University Interscholastic League competition. Last year, the band was named the outstanding Class A. band at the Greater Southwest Music Festival in Amarillo.

Streit has been at Crowell for seven years, and taught at Vernon and Lockett before moving to Crowell. He played violin in Wichita Falls Symphony Orchestra, cornet in Midwestern State University band and played both instruments while he was a member of the Fourth Army Show Band. He was graduated from MSU.

time of the year for any high school band.



CROWELL HIGH SCHOOL BAND



Crowell is located in Foard County, a sparsely populated area at the Northwest tip of North Central Texas. Agriculture provides the economy for the county. The county is composed mostly of large wheat farms and large cattle ranches. Total population of the county is 2,200.

Crowell Independent School District is the only school system in Foard County. The school is located at Crowell, the largest town in the county with a population of 1,399. All 515 students, kindergarten through grade twelve, come to one campus. Some students live thirty five miles from the school. Several outlying communities in the county have car pools to get band members to and from extra band rehearsals. The Truscott community is 17 miles from Crowell and each year gives 5 to 10 faithful band members. The Thalia community is 11 miles from Crowell and gives 10 to 15 faithful band members each year. A few students live on large ranches and have to drive 15 to 20 miles by themselves.

The band has one extra two hour rehearsal each Tuesday night during marching season. Approximately five weeks prior to UIL concert contest the band has one extra two hour rehearsal per week plus one sectional rehearsal per week for each section. During the middle part of the year much time is spent with individuals on district and regional tryout music and on solos and ensembles. One of the main objectives of the extra

work is to accomplish a level of achievement which will give each student the joy of playing their instrument well and the thrill to be a part of the excitement created by the sound of the music they are producing.

The Crowell Band is composed of grades seven through twelve. There are forty-four seventh and eighth graders and forty-nine high school students in this year's ninety-three member band. The students begin studying band in the fifth grade. They continue band in the sixth grade and move to the performing band in the seventh grade. Most of the band students are active in all phases of school activity. In the seventh and eighth grades, boys and girls may participate in band and all sports activities. In high school, the girls may do both sports and band but the boys have to make a choice between the two in high school.

Last year the Crowell Band placed fourteen seventh and eighth graders on the Jr. High All Region Band, and seven high school students on the high school All Region Band. Forty percent of the band members have at one time or another made an All Region or an All District Band. In the past six years the Crowell Band has produced three All State band members. The band has also produced outstanding performers in solo competition at the State level, Greater Southwest Music Festival at Amarillo, and at the Tri-State Music Festival in Enid, Oklahoma. In 1971 the band earned its first UIL Sweepstakes rating in the history of the school. The band is now working on its third sweepstakes award having earned a Division I rating in the Fall marching competition. The band has also made all Division I ratings at Tri-State Music Festival in Enid, Oklahoma and at the Greater Southwest Music Festival at Amarillo. Last year the band was selected as the Outstanding Class A band at the Greater Southwest Music Festival in Amarillo.

The band is directed by James Streit. He has a B.A. Degree from Midwestern University with a major in Violin and a minor in Music Theory. Mr. Streit played violin in the Wichita Falls Symphony Orchestra for seven years and cornet in the Midwestern University Band. He was a member of the fourth Army Show Band where he played violin and cornet during his army affiliation. He is currently a member of the Texas Bandmasters Association, Texas Music Educators Association, Texas State Teachers Association and the National Teachers Association. He taught at Vernon and Lockett, Texas before moving to Crowell. Mr. Streit is now in his seventh year at Crowell.

The chorale closes with a full rich ensemble. After a short bridge passage for percussion, the capriccio enters, establishing a rather satirical mood. This alternates with fanfare like brass figures; the whole movement draws to a triumphant conclusion.





Rehearsals:

Long hours of practice start Thursday in effort to again produce crack band

The first full week in August will launch band practice for the 1984-85 fall term, Band Director James Streit has announced. Rehearsals will start at 7 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 9, as the long hours of practice resume.

Streit, beginning his third year as head of the Vernon instrumental program, expects about 85 students in the high school band and 75 to 80 at Vernon Intermediate School.

He'll be working with a full staff for the first time in two years, with Intermediate band director Martin Ortega joined this year by the third local band director, Donna Shearmire of Henrietta.

Shearmire, a flags and drill specialist whom Streit expects to contribute greatly to the precision programs of the band, is a daughter of former Harrold superintendent of schools Don Shearmire, who now heads schools at Archer City.

Streit, a Midwestern University graduate, will bring a total of 21 years of music instructional experience with him as he returns to work Thursday.

He has served two years as a choral director at Vernon Intermediate School, and in instrumental programs, four years at Lockett, eight years at Crowell, five at Quanah and two in Vernon.

His bands won four sweepstakes awards at Crowell and one at Quanah.

Streit says a partition is being built in the Intermediate Band Hall, dividing it to provide two practice halls for the program there as an effort is made to build at that level toward outstanding band programs at the high school in later years.

All high school students expected to enroll in band, including those new to the community, are being asked to report for preschool rehearsals. The rehearsal schedule as announced by Streit:

—Thursday, Aug. 9: 7 p.m. to 9 p.m., get acquainted and playing rehearsal.

—Friday, Aug. 10: 7 p.m. to 8:30 p.m., playing rehearsal and flags.

—Monday, Aug. 13: 8 a.m. to 9:30 a.m., cornets and French horns; 7 p.m. to 9:30 p.m., full band marching, required attendance.



Coveted sweepstakes won by local high school band

The Vernon High School band Tuesday at Wilbarger Auditorium won unanimous Division I ratings in concert and sight reading which, combined with a Division I rating in marching last fall in Wichita Falls, earned the instrumental group a coveted sweepstakes award in Region II North Zone UIL band music contests.

It was the first sweepstakes for a Vernon band in four years and one of only two sweepstakes awards among 23 bands competing here Tuesday.

The other sweepstakes was won by Iowa Park, A total of eight bands had Division I awards in concert and sight reading, but six failed to produce Division I ratings in marching last fall to make a sweepstakes possible.

Sweepstakes awards for bands are considered comparable to a district championship in football or basketball, and the Vernon band accomplished the feat Tuesday with 61 performers. Twenty-three students were out because of new rules which bar competition in such events if one or more courses are failed by a student.

Streit said the asbsence of the 23 players probably was not a significant factor in the competition Tuesday, however. It was possibly a plus, with less chance for error

by individual peformers.

"In concert, it is usually a help to have a smaller group," he said. "It helped us. In marching season, that would be quite the opposite."

Both Streit and his students were elated.

The sweepstakes was the first for Streit in his three years since coming to Vernon, with the last sweepstakes won by a band directed by Larry Kingsley in his final year in Vernon. Streit had won his last sweepstakes the same year in his last year at Quanah.

Streit had directed bands at Crowell that won four

moving to Vernon. A Wilbarger County native and graudate of Midwestern State Universty, Streit began his career as an intermediate school choral music director in Vernon, then directed the band at Lockett before moving to Crowell.

Both Streit and his students were pleased that the Division I ratings were unanimous.

"We received six ones, three from the concert judges, and three from the sight-reading judges," he said. "You feel like you really deserve it after receiving that many Divison One's. "It's a real feeling of reward for hard work and cooperation. It takes all of us to get it done."

Of his students, he said, "They did play very well."

But Streit was pleased with more than their performances in the contests.

He noted that Vernon students assisted with staging the contests.

"All the judges were complimentary about the attitude of our students, the courtesy extended to visiting bands. It was a real good experience for all of our students."

Dream builder

Retired band director constructs Christmas wonderland at home

Give James Streit some plastic ope, plywood, paint, scrap netal, a cotton stripper belt, chains and sprockets, and he'll that a rotating, sparkling christmas tree that will delight old and young alike.

While most people know

Streit for his musical abilities, nany may not be aware he also cossesses other talents as well. Streit has combined his skills a carpenter, inventor and arist to create a mini-wonderland of Christmas scenes on the front awn of his home near Lockett.

The former director of the Jernon High School Band—
dreit retired in 1985 following a areer as bind director for Locktt. Crowell, Vernon and Quanah chools—comes from a pioner musical family who for numerous years provided enterainment for local and area resients and even organized their own band, the Streit Family
Band. Even though he is retired,

Streit has continued as a teacher of violin, one of several instruments he plays.

But Streit has also turned his hand to another interest in the past few years, which is now bringing pleasure to local and area residents of all ages during the Christmas season.

Striet has constructed in his front yard six separate Christmas scenes.

"I have always liked to tinker and do things with my hands," says Streit. "Some years ago, I invented a self-adjusting tuba stand, got a patent and sold it to a company. I just like doing things like that, making different things."

Since he retired, Streit says he has more time to indulge in this interest, but he really shines when the holidays roll around. "We have four grandchildren, and I really do this for them," he explains.

The first of his outdoor Christmas displays was constructed in 1992. A large lighted rotating tree of white and red

topped by a bright red star, it is constructed from pipe, scrap metal, plywood, cotton stripper belt, chains and spockets, and any other bits and pieces Streit could put together.

The next year, Streit made his Santa train which features a red engine pulling several green cars. A colorful cutout Santa Claus waves from the engine's cab.

In 1994, Streit designed a Santa Claus house with a Santa figure on top which crosses the roof and disappears down the chimney.

One of the most complex scenes in Streit's setting is the Nativity. It was made in 1996 and features Mary and Joseph in the first scene with Mary riding a donkey with legs that actually move. The scene shifts as the three wise men slide across the box containing the scene of the couple, and at the same time at the right appear Mary and Joseph again, this time with the

newborn Baby Jesus in the manager. To the far right outside the box are the shepherds and the sheep. A timer controls the shifting of the scenes which are on tracks.

"It took some two months working off and on to create the scene, draw and paint all the figures," Streit says.

For this year's Christmas offering, Streit has created a Santa Claus in his sleigh of toys being pulled by Rudolph, resplendent with his bright red nose. Again, timers activate the figures as Rudolph pulls Santa around the Santa house on a track.

Completing the entire outdoor wonderland is a 10-foot tall blinking "Ho." The word blinks rapidly three times in succession to create Santa's traditional Christmas greeting: "Ho Ho Ho."

Originally, Streit had planned to put the huge sign on the roof of the house, and in fact, one year, it was mounted on the side of the barn, but he eventually decided it looked better placed in the yard with the other decorations.

Streit says he enjoys having folks drive by to see his handiwork. Recently, he and his wife Pat, hosted an open house for his Sunday School class with some 80 in attendance to view the decorations.

And he is already thinking ahead to what can be added to his Christmas scene next year.




