A SHORT BIOGRAPHY OF

JOHN H. PEARSON SR.

My experience with music began when I was quite young. My mother said I would listen to the radio and sing along with the performers learning the words to many songs. In the 5th grade I decided to play the cornet when the high school band director talked to us about playing in the band. I guess from then on my fate was sealed, playing my horn and singing my way through school and upon graduating joined the Army Air Force. I continued my music in the service for 7 years being stationed overseas, in Washington D.C. and the Air Force Band of the West at Lackland AFB in San Antonio. I was a member of the concert and marching band, the Singing Sergeants, the Tune Pilots Jazz Ensemble and the Symphony in Blue.

After being discharged, I attended St Mary's University on a full scholarship and upon graduation was appointed band director at D. MacArthur H.S. in San Antonio. I served as head band director for 17 years where our bands received consistant U.I.L sweep-stakes ratings and the MacArthur Jazz Ensemble gained national recognition by winning The All American High School Jazz Festival Invitational Finals and the International Jazz Festival held in Reno, Nevada. This group was also a perennial winner of the Brownwood Jazz Festival, the first original and largest high school jazz festival in the U.S. where the judges were nationally famous jazz musicians and educators. These were wonderful years at MAC where I was blessed with great students (several are prominent musicians and one won a grammy this year 2003) and parents and an outstanding faculty and administration. I had received my masters from UT Austin and my administrators certificate later from SWTSU when I was offered the position of Coordinator of Instrumental Music for the Austin ISD. At first I turned down the offer but after a few days of thought reconsidered because of the many possibilities and challenges presented

in building an outstanding music program that I envisioned as a possibility for a large city school system such as Austin. Before accepting the position, I requested a a meeting with Dr. Jack Davidson the superintendent. In the meeting I asked him "how good a music program do you want"? and he replied, "the best you can build". I immediately told him that the only way that this would be possible was if I had the authority and responsibility to hire the teachers. He agreed and a new chapter began in mine and my families lives. The second year after taking the position, the Austin Schools were ordered to desegregate and the challenge was really on. With the help of a dedicated staff we were able to forge ahead and build a program that the music students in Austin were proud to participate in. We initiated The All City Jr. and SR. H.S. Bands, Choirs and Orchestras and the All City H.S.Jazz Ensemble which I directed for 15 years. We developed the All City Festivals which contributed immensely to the improvement of each individual school music group. Also, for several years running, Austin had more band, choir and orchestra students than any other school district. The credit for this went to our outstanding students and faculty.

I had the opportunity to direct the Longhorn Band Jazz Ensemble (thanks to my AISD boss) which was a kick. Also, over the years we were able to weld a very cooperative relationship with UT's Music Department and Athletic Department. The Longhorn Band was a big part of our Marching Band Jamboree and the Athletic Department allowed us the use of Memorial Stadium for this annual event.

Over the years, I have had the opportunity to serve my profession and colleagues in various capacities: Past President National Assoc. of Jazz Educators, Texas Unit,

Southwest Coordinator National Assoc.of Jazz Educators, Past President Texas Music Administrators Conference, Past President Austin Area Retired Teachers Assoc., Texas Retired Teachers Assoc. Benefits Committee, Texas Music Adjudicators Association Committee on Standards of Adjudication and Performance Practices, Two terms UIL Region XII Chairman, Co-Authored TEA Stage Band Guide, Chair of Austin Middle School Research Committee.

My wife Blanche (an accomplished keyboardist and vocalist) and I had our own professional music groups for over 30 years one of which was "The Professors of Dixieland". This group performed for two Texas governors on several occasions, Austin's Mayor, The Austin city Council and several legislative bodies. I have been the director of the 18 piece jazz ensemble "Swingtime" for the past 7 years.

I am very fortunate to have a wonderful wife and family of 5 children, 12 grand-children and 3 great-grandchildren and to have had the opportunity to serve the young people of Texas in the profession I love-MUSIC.



They had been buried once in those places, then, brought out of the ground to be finally buried out of a final resting place in Haone numeral and line American men who died in World War II lay in their last military formation on Punchbowl Tuesday morning, and found a final resting place in Ha-

wali.

The dead lay in 109 caskets stretched in two long rows across the bowl of the extinct crater which is to be the new national memorial cemetery of the Pacific.

They were the first of 16,000 men who will be buried in Punchbowl. Over them were read the services of the Protestant, the Catholic and the Jewish churches.

The ministers took their stands by the casket of an unknown victim of the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941.

The shrill sound of a compressed air whistle stopped construction activity in the crater.

Methodist Chaplain Albert F. Click of Greenville, Tex., began

As the chaplain spoke a flag fluttered at half mast at the end of the line of caskets. The men gathered for the service stood at stiff attention.

The Jewish minister, Rabbi Emanuel Kumin, of Cleveland, O., and of the Jewish Welfare board in Honolulu, said the Hebrew service after reading the 23rd psalm. "The Lord is my Shepherd, I shall not want. . . Yea, though I walk in the valley of the shadow of death. . ."

"May their repose be peaceful," Rabbi Kumin asked.

As Catholic Chaplain Eugene L. A. Fisher of Ft. Shafter and Pittsburgh, Pa., began the Latin prayer for the repose of the dead, birds could be heard in the green copse at the edge of the cemetery overlooking Honolulu.

"Their battles are all fought," Chaplain Click said. "They lie down to rest awhile under the arching sky."

Three members of the Hickam air force band were missing early today and a fourth was safe after their small sailing boat swamped and sank several miles off Keehi lagoon last night.

The missing men became the objects of a night-long intensive airsea rescue search after their com-panion, Crl. William R. Russell-s wa m four and a half hours through rolling seas before he was picked up and sounded the alarm.

ACCORDING to Russell, the four men left Keehi beach in the boat at 4 p.m. yesterday. At about 6 p.m., Russell said he was washed overboard and his companions threw him a cushion.

When they attempted to bring

the boat about to pick him up, Russell said, a wave swamped the craft and it sank almost im-

mediately.

He said that after the boat disappeared he saw only one other member of the party some distance away. He said that before he could do not the man distance away in the man distance away.

Russell then said he turned toward shore and as it was still light, could see the airport control tower very clearly. He said he thought he was about nine miles off-shore

at that time.



Rescued after spending hours in the water beside their swamped boat Tuesday night, three airmen from Hickam air force base were reported "resting comfortably" Wednesday at Tripler general hospital.

A companion who swam four hours and then was pulled from the water by fishermen be-

fore he reached shore was released from the hospital and re-

turned to duty.

The swimmer was Cpl_William R. Russell of Lansing, Mich., who was swept over the side of the 15-foot boat several miles off Keehi lagoon after dark.

WHEN HIS FRIENDS attempted to come about to rescue him, their little craft capsized, plunging them into the water. The other airmen were Sgt. John H. Pearson, 21, of Conneaut, O., owner of the boat; Sgt. Forrest A. Ray, 18, of Huntington, W. Va., and Cpl. Marvin N. Miller, 19, of Newport News, Va.

All are attached to the 501st band at Hickam base.

John served his country in the United States Air Force on active duty for seven years. Upon his discharge in San Antonio, he decided to live in Texas(Blanche helped him to make that decision). John and Blanche are very proud of their six children and ten grandchildren.

He enrolled in St. Mary's University where he earned a Bachelor's degree in Music Education. His musical talent led him through a long, productive and distinguished career as an educator. A quick discription of the events is:


- 1. Three clinicians will listen to the band perform. Each clinician will give taped and written comments about the bands performance.

Dear John,

Once again, thanks for agreeing to be the clinician for our Jazz Festival next month. As we had discussed, I realize that you don't feel completely comfortable doing it again this year. It was not my intention to have you back so soon, but with our first choice backing out due to some school commitments, we were in a bit of an awkward spot. Fortunately, your reputation is such that it is not a problem either with the groups participating in the Festival or with us at the University.

So, here is a sketch of what is planned for that weekend...

- 1) You will listen to and critique (via cassette recorder) a maximum of twelve jazz bands (one every 40 minutes, including set-up and tear-down). In addition, each group has been instructed that there are no specific literature requirements (they may play what they like) nor is there any minimul amount of time involved. They have 40 minutes in which they can do anything they like. I have notified them that you will provide a tape critique on the cassette for their performed music, but that they may have you come down to the stage to provide a verbal critique, or possibly even work with the band --- I have given you (forgive me!) to them for that 40 minute session. We want the Festival to be more than just an opportunity for groups to play for a comment sheet and a rating. We want them to be able to receive a good, sound, positive criticism of what they are doing and how that can improve upon it. All this in just 40 minutes? Wait....
- 2) in addition, we'd like you to select individuals from the bands to form the All-Star Band (just as last year), and...

3) Select individuals that you feel merit recognition as

a. <u>Outstanding Soloist</u> b. <u>Outstanding Horn Section</u> c. Outstanding <u>Rhythm Section</u>

4) And if that is not enough, select 3 (or 2, or 4) of the participating groups to return on Saturday to perform as part of the Festival Concert.

Now, let me make it a little easier than it appears. I will assign one of our more capable, dependable jazz players to help you throughout the day by keeping track of the possible players for the All-Star Band, and keeping tabs on the possible award winners. I will take all the "heat," should there be any, with regards to who returns to play on the Saturday concert. If we invite three and two decline, we'll invite two more.

We will furnish the cassette recorders and the tapes, and anything else you might need to help you through the critique sessions. Last year you brought your own music to use for the All-Star Band. If you would like us to supply the music this year, please let me know as soon as possible.

The fee for your efforts will be \$500.00. My wife and I would be more than happy to have you stay with us for the time your here. If you would prefer to stay in a motel, I will be happy to make the arrangements. Whatever you decide, just let me know and I'll take care of it for you.

Attached you will find copies of all the materials I have sent to the participating bands. At present (since no one will make a commitment until after New Years), nine bands have committed and I still have three slots. I have been trying to fill these three for the past few days with little to no success, and we are toying with the possibility of inviting some of the fine middle school band programs.

In any event, I will be in contact with you early next week to double check things. And we'll probably bump shoulders in Fort Worth as well. If you have any questions, John, call me at home (512-699-1785) or at the University (512-691-4357). I'm looking forward to having you here again.

Our visit to McCallum last Thursday to observe the band and orchestra programs was very informative and useful to me.

Mr. Brent's band classes were certainly well disciplined and hard working while at the same time the students seemed to be really enjoying their work.

Ms. Hilda Reese and Bill Brent came across as compatible co-workers who are dedicated to having an outstanding band program at McCallum. While I amranging a bit beyond the topic of our visit to McCallum, let me say how really wonderful I think it is that we have the large number of students from our district being selected to All State Band and Orchestra, with these students coming from 8 of our 9 high schools.

The musical and performing accomplishments of these students speak well for them and the work they have put into achieving their goals; but it also speaks very highly of the dedication, leadership, talent and hard work which you and the directors give to the program and the students in it. Board praises musicians, OKs textbooks

Recognition of students who have received musical honors and the adoption of various textbooks were the main items on Monday night's Austin school board agenda.

The students were introduced by John Pearson, instructional coordinator of instrumental music in the Austin Independent School District. They were greeted individually by board members as they filed onto the board dais.

Those recognized included members of the LBJ High School Band, and Anderson High School Band, All State Band and Orchestra members from Anderson, Austin, Crockett, LBJ, Lanier, McCallum, Reagan and Travis high schools, and All State Choir members from Anderson, Austin, Crockett and Reagan high schools.

Pearson noted that Crockett High School had 18 all-state students, which he said may be the most of any high school in the state.

AISD School Superintendent Jack L. Davidson credited Pearson and Richard Sutch, the district's instructional coordinator of choral music education, for the success of the AISD music program.

The program has been a "hallmark" of the Austin district, Davidson said, and is "probably the outstanding music program in the state of Texas."

The textbooks adopted by the board for various secondary-level classes and elementary handwriting were recommended by the district's Official Textbook Committee, composed of the superintendent and 14 teachers.

The recommendations were made after considering the suggestions of textbook advisory committees and a 16-member Lay Citizens Textbook Davidson said the greatest weight was given to the views of the 14 advisory committees composed primarily of teachers of the particular subject areas. Many of the committees also included a parent and a student.

Board member Nan Clayton asked if the committee members were satisfied with the quality of the textbooks they had to choose from. Two committee members representing history and industrial arts replied that in their areas the texts were excellent.

A cautionary note was sounded by board member M.K. Hage, who said some teachers are relying too heavily on commercially prepared ditto masters as homework material.

"A lot of these materials given to children isn't even evaluated," Hage said. "Teachers who rely on these for practice are ill-advised. There must be something wrong with some of our text materials if teachers are relying on these heavily."

The subjects of the texts adopted included reading, mathematics, history, literature, art, music, French, Mexican-American studies, industrial arts, and data processing.

The adoption periods varied from five to six years.

In other action, the board reaffirmed its policy of having a 4½-month probationary period during which classified employees do not receive paid sick leave. Classified employees include teachers' aides, secretaries, custodians, bus drivers and other non-professional positions.

Ron Wilcox, president of the Austin Federation of Teachers, told the board that staff estimates of the cost of changing the policy (about \$17,000) had misconstrued the federation's proposal.

Wilcox said his group favored retaining the probationary period, but reimbursing those employees who stay on beyond that period for any



The Douglas MacArthur High School Jazz Ensemble of San Antonio, Texas has won national honors in jazz competition. The 27 member band won first place at the "All-American High School Stage Band Festival" this past June in Mobile, Alabama in what first was a tape competition with 250 other bands from across the nation.

The MacArthur group, led by director John H. Pearson, was one of the 10 finalists who were selected in this tape competition from the ten regional areas in the United States. They were then invited to Mobile for the final competition. Expenses for the 10 finalist bands were paid by the All-American Festival Committee.

Eight members of the MacArthur Band were named to the All-American Honor Band; Raye Bellinger, Brian Roop, Hank Lindberg, Leon Martinez, Steve Lucke, Joe Lamm, Danny Dreeben and Craig Barton. Craig who plays lead alto sax and flute, was named the outstanding musician of the festival. He was awarded an all-expense paid week at the Stan Kenton Summer Jazz Clinics.

During the three day length of the festival, students from all 10 bands attended clinics and workshops in improvisation, arranging, section work and lessons on their individual instruments plus jazz convocations and individual band rehearsals. Students and directors alike, had the opportunity to rap with their fellow counterparts from all over the U.S.A. and it was just great.

All competition between the 10 bands was held at night, thursday and friday, with three bands being chosen from this group as finalists. These three bands performed a completely different program saturday night and the end result was: 1st-MacArthur, 2nd-East Jefferson of New Orleans, 3rd-John F. Kennedy of Philadelphia. The festival ended after the awards with an outstanding concert by the USAF"s "Airmen of Note" from

"Our win this year at Brownwood marks the third year the group has taken first place and the sixth consecutive year we have been among the top three bands at that event," Pearson commented.



"This particular arrangement, with five colos, has a bit of everything," Pearson connued.


Their other award-winning pieces include

"straight-ahead" jazz number "Hot," which as three solos and a version of the Latin umber "Cibola," with added percussion.

Pearson, who began the group 15 years go, said they have maintained a tradition of xcellence because "excellence means work, and that is so mae this group knows woll".

The band of 23 boys and four girls pracice nine to 10 hours in a five-day week, but I can tell they do a lot on their own," he added.

Although the band has been invited to the Reno contest, it is required to furnish its own transportation and expenses. Travel expenses including transportation to the national competitions will be furnished by an airlines, a co-sponsor of the festival.

"We have raised enough money to go (to Reno) by bus," he said. "But we would like to go by plane since it would mean the students would miss fewer classes and be more

relaxed when they arrive."

In hopes of obtaining the additional funds (\$2,000), Pearson said the group will perform

concerts at Central Park Mall from 1 to 4 p.m. Saturday.

Also they will receive all the receipts of a local hamburger franchise from 5 to 11 p.m. on Tuesday and March 20. The manager of the franchise will serve an "appropriate" order on those two days—"The Reno Special."

"We will be competing with 305 bands from throughout the United States and Canada." he said. "So we want to be at our best."

Even though jazz in high schools is not as prominent in Texas as in other parts of the country. Pearson, president-elect of the Tex-

as Unit of the National Association of Jazz Educators, commented that it is growing in popularity here.

"As an example, we have banded together with several other San Antonio high school jazz groups to sponsor concerts and clinics with such jazz greats as Louis Belson and Bill Chase." he added.

He said both musicians agreed to come here when the newly-formed San Antonio Association of Stage Band Directors and School Music Directors demonstrated the growing interest in high school jazz in San Antonio.
