Dear Mrs. Cardwell:

In a memorandum which has come to my desk this morning, I note that your boy has been classified for Pilot training and that he is being appointed an Aviation Cadet in the Army Air Forces.

In order to win this war, it is vital to have the best qualified young men at the controls of our military aircraft. Upon their precision, daring and coolness will depend in large measure the success of our entire war effort.

The duties of an Army Pilot call for a high degree of mental and physical alertness, sound judgment, and an inherent aptitude for flying. Men who will make good material for training as Pilots are rare. The Classification Board believes your boy is one of them and that he will in all probability win his wings as a military pilot.

You must realize, however, that all of our study of the problem has produced no infallible method of determining in advance whether a young man has that inherent something which will make him a natural and safe pilot. As a result, some pilot candidates are later transferred to other types of military training.

Comprehensive tests indicate that your boy stands a very good chance of successfully completing the rigid training for an army pilot and you have every reason to be proud of him. I congratulate you and him.

Dear Mrs. Cardwell:

Your son, 2nd Lt Berne A. Glover, having won his wings as a pilot in the United States Army Air Forces, has been assigned to the First Fighter Command for intensive training in the operation of the P-47 Thunderbolt which is one of the principal weapons flown in combat theaters throughout the world. We are happy to have him with us and we have every reason to believe that he will demonstrate in this Command the same sterling qualities which led to his selection in Flying School as a Fighter Pilot.

During his stay with this Command, he will be instructed in the use of the one-man life raft; he will be given a thorough review in meteorology and he will receive advanced training in gunnery. This will include both ground and aerial firing in order that he may become thoroughly familiar with and efficient in the use of the guns with which his aircraft is equipped. Other instruction will include further training in instrument, or blind flying, as well as training in caring for himself in Arctic, torrid or temperate climes.

In addition he will become thoroughly familiar with the airplane he has been assigned to fly. He will receive practice in flying at high and low altitudes and in formation flying and in him will be imbued the spirit of teamwork without which the Air Forces could not succeed. All of his training will aim toward one objective -- flying and fighting the sturdy, speedy Thunderbolt, and when he leaves us he will be able to fly the ship as easily as you drive the family car.

Realizing that your pride in his accomplishments is as great as ours, we want you to know something of what he will gain from his work. We know you join with us in the hope that his career will be one of continuing success and service.

Jefferson!" and the Jeff band members let out a big roar that shook the stadium rafter.

There were many favorable comments directed to Jeff band members after the emnouncement. Some of them were: "As soon as you got on the field emd played a few notes, we knew you were the winnners," "When we saw you march, we said to ourselves, "There's the winning band," and these words came from the parents of an Austin band member: "Though we are supposed to be prejudiced toward Austin, your band truly put on the best performance,"

On the score sheet of one of the judges was this statement: "Best band Jefferson has ever had." Mr. Ray Tross, director of the New Mexico State University Band, said this to Mr. Glover, if my band ever has to march in competition against your and I don't think I'll let mine march."

Perhaps the biggest thrill for the Jefferson band members came when the crowd gave them the standing ovation and began yelling, "Encore!" As Javier Navarro said it, "It put a lump the size of an apple inside my throat."

And while the bend members were receiving all the credit, they in turn were placing the credit for their success on one man... Mr. Berne Glover. On the way back they constantly sang "For He's A Jolly Good Fellow" to their band director. Band President Agustin Ramirez summed up their opnions on him. "I can't possibly (Continued on Page 4)



Shannon House, Coronado High drum major, was chosen outstanding drum major in the competition. Her selection was a high honor for Coronado which was competing for the first time.







quality of music is very fine. I was especially impressed with Burges and Andress," he said. Patterson, a graduate of U.T. El Paso in the early 1940's, is with the Sweetwater, Tex. Public Schools. He judges bands and other music groups statewide.

Ross Capshaw, coordinator of instrumental music at El Paso Public Schools and director of the contest, said this year's performances were among the best.

"The bands seem to improve from year to year," he said.

Capshaw added that El Paso Public Schools were happy to see New Mexico represented in the contest for the first time.

He was referring to the Alamogordo, N.M. band which received a superior rating.

THE 76-MEMBER T-Bird band was ranked one of the top five bands participating in the contest and the only one in Western Texas to receive the "superior" (Division I) rating, according to Band director Richard Lambrecht.

Ross Capshaw, director of music education in the El Paso Public Schools said, "Our bands competed against bands from various parts of the nation and the ratings are a good indication of the music talent we have in our school system and the type of music instruction our personnel offers."

Five of the nine competing high school bands received first division ratings, the first time this many have received the high rating in the 13 years of the annual Mari ing Band Contest of the El Paso Public Schools.

Rated "superior" were Andress, Austin, Burges, Clint, and Coronado bands. Bowie, Jefferson, and Irvin "excel-lent" and El Paso High received a "good" rating. No bands were judged in the lower two categories, below average and poor.

The first division rating was the fifth for Berne Glover, director of the Mustang band in as many years as director at Burges. He also received many top ratings in his 14 years at Jefferson and presently his band is considered in the upper ranks statewide and nationally.

Nobody The Best: Six Bands Rate Superior

Some persons who go to band concerts need a primer. Because they're witnessing a contest that's not exactly a contest in the competitive sense of the word, even if the spectacle is tak-ing place at the Sun Bowl where athletic winners and losers are decided.

Take Saturday, for instance. It was the big day of the year for the hundreds of members of high school bands among the El Paso district's eight high schools who gathered to show their stuff.

At stake were ratings, the prestige of which sends the winners of a "superior" designation into ebullience, while those who fall short may be, for awhile, inconsolable.

But they are not head-to-head competition. Nobody becomes "best." And so it was with some consternation that members of El Paso bands win-ning "superior" Saturday — Burges, Coronado, El Paso, Austin, Jefferson and Irvin — read a Sunday headline in The Times which proclaimed that "Burges Band Blares Best."
Said Mrs. Betsy Johnson, mother of

a member of another band, who phoned the newspaper to point out the misconception: "My goodness, everyone has been calling, and it just is so unfair to all those other kids who got

the same high rating."
She pointed out that in band competition the idea is for a band to achieve

on its own merits without putting another band in a bad light.

The competition, therefore, is to

neasure overall ability.
"The judging is more subjective than objective," said Austin High School band director Al Anderson. School band director Al Anderson.
"The fans will give its approval of a band on qualities that are studied a lot closer by the judges. That is why the final outcome is often disappointing to people who felt the band had per-formed better."


Three judges rate the band on playing, uniformity, special maneuvers, cadence and general effects. The composite average of the three ratings determines the bands final rat-

ing.
"What we try to do is combine showmanship with a fine musical product," said Anderson, who was band director at Bowie before going to Austin five years ago. "The kids work really hard for their ratings and they are very disappointed when they don't get what they are aiming for."


