Tiger Band Director Jack Mahan who is in charge of arrangements for the contest, said the event will be open to the public. Spectators will sit in the north stands and the marching contests will begin at 4

p.m.

Mahan said each band will be judged on points. The percentage for scoring is as follows:

Required movements, 15 per cent; playing, 35 per cent; cadence, five per cent; alignment, five per cent; corresponding five per cent; presents corresponding five pe cent; carriage, five per cent; precision, five per cent; inspection, five per cent; discipline, five per cent; special maneuver, five per cent; general effect, 15 per cent. Each band will be inspected prior

to the marching contest and all units within a particular class will

be inspected by the same judge.
Each unit will be allowed seven
minutes on the field and any unit
exceeding the seven minute limit

will be penalized one rating.

Bandsmen will be seated in the southeast stands and the judges stand will be on the northwest side of the field.

Bands are classed according to the number of students in the school they represent. Marching in the contest will be Class AA-1, Class C, Class CC, Class B, Class A, and lass AA bands.

The only Class AA-1, band will be the Tyler high school band, representing a student body of more than 951.

New London junior high school and Avinger junior high school bands will march in Class C, representing student bodies of under

In Class CC (student bodies of over 500), three bands are entered. They are the Roberts junior high school band of Tyler, Hogg junior high school band of Tyler, and the Texas junior high school band of Texarkana.


Bands from student bodies of less than 200 will march in the Class B rating. They include: Timpson, Cooper high school, Hawkins high school, Bearcat band from Beckville, Carlisle high school from Price, Pine Tree, Spring Hill, East Mountain, Sabine high school, Union Grove from Gladewater, Gilmer high school, Talco high school, Jefferson high school, Daingerfield high school, and Hughes Springs high school.

Class A bands, from schools with between 200 and 499 students, in-clude: Center, Grand Saline, Com-merce, Mineola, Carthage, New London, Gaston, Leveretts Chapel, Winnsboro, Pittsburg, and Linden. Bands in Class AA, from schools with between 500 and 950 students, include the following high school

include the following high school bands: Palestine, Lufkin, Nacogdoches, Henderson, Kilgore, Gladewater, White Oak, Longview, Marshall and Texarkana.

Working with Dr. Steen on plans for the concert are Herbert O. Wilson, president of the Nacogdoches Historical Commission which is directing restoration of the old building, and Mrs. Stephen B. Tucker, chairman of the restoration committee.

Chartered by the Republic of Texas, the Nacogdoches University has been called the "Mother of Education" in Texas. The existing building, a red brick Greek revival structure, was completed in 1858. Twirling Camp At FA Opens June 24

Stephen F. Austin State College chers." will be home for a week for more than 200 junior high and high school students next week, with the opening of the tenth annual Twirling Camp. The camp opens June 24.

Camp director Jim Hudgins said enrollment for the week-long school will probably total more than 200. Entries already received include 24 East Texas and Gulf Coast area junior and senior high schools, while others have been received from Arkansas and Louisiana.

Hudgins said the staff of instructors for this year's camp will again be headed by Duke Miller, Phoenix, Arizona, and Mrs. Pat Hooker, San Antonio. The SFA Twirl-O-Jacks, originated here several years ago by Hudgins, also will serve as instructors.

"The instructors selected to teach twirling classes," Hudgins explained, "are well-known specialists in their own field. They are selected

Hudgins added that Miller is regarded as 'Mr. Drum Major, USA,' by many as he is an accomplished performer with the baton. Mrs. Hooker originated the "Dixie Darlings" at the University of Southern Mississippi several years ago. Both she and Miller have been head instructors at the Twirling Camp here the past three summers.

Hudgins, director of bands at SFA, also pointed out that participation in the twirling school is offered to junior high, senior high, and college band members. The only minimum requirement is that students must be in at least the seventh grade to register as a fulltime camp member. A juvenile division will be available again this year for students in grades 1-6.

A stunt night will be held during the school in which an "outstanding twirler" will be selected. A Drum Major Camp on July 1-5, not only on their ability to perform, and a Band Camp, July 15-19, will but upon their own success as tea-follow the Twirling School.



The History of the Lumberjack Band

The Lumberjack Band at Stephen F. Austin State College was born in 1926 when fifteen musicians came together under the direction of Mr. J. T. Cox. At that time the band's home was under the pines, for the band had to borrow space to rehearse. In 1932 a hall was built to house the band. The Lumberjack Band wore its first uniforms in 1928, overseas caps and sweaters. The first full dress uniforms consisted of capes, white trousers, and regular military caps. By the depression, the band had grown from fifteen members to seventy-two members. When Pearl Harbor was bombed and the men went to war, the coeds formed a fiftypiece "sweetheart band." In 1952 Robert Smith became director of the Lumberjack Band.

In 1954, Jim Hudgins came to SFA and with the new policies introduced under Mr. Hudgins, the band quickly grew to seventy-six members. The SFA stage band was born at this time. Now the Ambassadors are known throughout Texas and Louisiana for

music played in the modern idiom. In 1957 chapters of Kappa Kappa Psi and Tau Beta Sigma, national honorary band fraternity and sorority, were chartered at SFA.

The Lumberjack Band has always offered encouragement to the young musicians and performers of the state. In 1954 the first Lumberjack Summer Band Camp was held for high school musicians to get professional training unavailable in their schools. The first Lumberjack Twirling Camp was held the next summer. In 1961 three more important "special" clinics were added to the growing list, the Drum Major Camp, the Stage Band Clinic, and the Concert Band Clinic.

No football game at SFA is complete without the grey and purple west point style uniforms and the spirited music of the Lumberjack Band. In addition, each year the band makes a spring tour and gives numerous concerts for the students of SFA and the people of East Texas.





Hudgins Honored As ET Band Alumni

Jimmy Hudgins will raise his baton and the alumni bandsmen who have returned for the 1976 homecoming football game Oct. 30 (Saturday) at East Texas State University will swing into their own version of "Corinne."

And just as they have done the tune since the 1930s, they'll be faking it all

the way.

Hudgins, a Commerce native who received the B.M.Ed. degree in 1949, is coming home, this time to again be on the ETSU side of the field as the nonor alumni band member. He also will be guest conductor of the massed bands at halftime.

For years, Hudgins was on the side of the enemy as director of the Stephen F. Austin State University band.

In pre-game activities to being at 1:30 p.m., Hudgins will direct the 50-plus band alumni as they play the traditional ETSU fight song and march across the field. The alumni also will join the massed bands for the halftime concert that will include the ETSU band and at least 12 high school bands

If a story that annually makes the rounds is true, then ETSU head football coach Ernest Hawkins will be glad that Hudgins is on the home team's side. It seems that Hudgins and the ETSU band director (probably Ray Luke, now at Oklahoma City University) kept quite a rivalry going. When the football teams would meet, the bands held a contest of their own. One year, the ETSU band had the last shot at the halftime performance. It held forth so long trying to outdo Hudgins' band that ETSU drew a five-yard penalty for delay of the game.

The band got started playing "Corinne" in the days when Carl Deonier was director, and through the years the tune has evolved into the ETSU fight song.

James Clark, a Commerce merchant who started playing with the college band when he was still a student in the university's demonstration school, made the first arrangement of the popular tune for Deonier. Clark said the band members didn't think much of his efforts, so they threw the music away and each played it as he pleased.

At last, the ETSU band has a bona fide arrangement of "Corinne" that was done last year by Robert Longfield, a Michigan friend of band director Jim Keene.

Now, when you hear the band swing into the old favorite, you definitely will hear a different sound.

Hudgins built the SFASU band into one of the state's best while he was director from 1954-1963. One year when he brought the group to ETSU's homecoming, the homefolks stopped the band in downtown Commerce to play some extra numbers, and the whole parade had to halt while Hudgins' band entertained.

Now a representative for a national music firm, Hudgins lives at Colmsneil, near Beaumont.

Trent Stockton began "playing" musical instruments at age six. His father, being a band director, brought home many instruments for Trent to try. At age nine, Mr. Stockton gave Trent a trombone and taught him to play a Bb scale. Trent said, "Daddy, this is fun! Now show me the in-between notes." He learned well. Trent was 1st chair Tenor Trombone in the T.M.E.A. Region X Junior High Band in both 7th and 8th grades. In the 8th grade he also tried out on Tuba. Trent has made 1st divisions on class I solos in U.I.L. competition on Tenor Trombone, Bass Trombone and Tuba. He has earned two 1st divisions at the State U.I.L. Solo contest. Trent is planning a career as a professional performer on Bass Trombone and is currently a student of Joe Dixon of Houston.

Jimmie M. Hudgins has been involved with public school music for more than forty years. He has had outstanding public school and University bands in Texas. He was the Director of Bands at Stephen F. Austin University from 1954 to 1963. He has been the national Sales Representative for both the Conn and Selmer music instrument manufacturers. He has also been the Field Sales Manager for C.G. Conn Ltd.

"Jimmie is my best teacher, best co-worker, best critic, and best friend. Twenty years ago when I was struggling as a band director, Jimmie befriended me and guided my music career. Although he was then working for Selmer, he found time to come to my band room and advise me. For this I shall forever be thankful. In my early years at Warren, I was fortunate to be able to bring Jimmie to the Junior High for four years. During that time I learned a lifetime of knowledge. It is only fitting that Jimmie Hudgins be able to share this Honor Band experience with us."

Army of the Nile

Kenneth J. Alford

This heroic-sounding march, with its quotes from "The Last Post" and "Lights Out," was composed early in 1941, after one of the first major Allied victories of the World War II. The British were outnumbered in North Africa 30,000 to 80,000 troops by Italy. In December, 1940, two of Lieut. Gen. Richard Nugent O'Connor's Western Desert Divisions (the 4th Indian and the 7th Armored "Army of the Nile") completely routed Marshall Rodolfo Graziani's Italian troops. The victory was so complete that one of the British Battalion commanders estimated his Italian prisoners at "five acres of officers and 200 acres of other ranks."

Gordon Septimus Jacob was born in Upper Norwood (South London) in 1895, a tenth child and seventh son. He was educated at Dulwich College, which was an unusually musical school, and he wrote his first orchestral pieces there.

During the Great War he was captured by the Germans near Arras, and in his prison-camp organized a small orchestra whose entire repertoire he arranged or composed. This early practical approach to music was to remain a hallmark, and his music is always eminently 'playable'.

Davide Delle Cese was born in the Italian town of Pontecorvo (between Roma and Napoli) in 1856. At age 31 he became bandmaster of Pontecorvo. His bands were famous throughout Italy. This march was published in 1897 and was rated no. 10 in an international survey in 1986.




