
HONORED. Wayne Maxwell, director of bands for Tomball ISD, has been elected to membership in Phi Beta Mu, an International School Bandmaster Fraternity. Maxwell was inducted at the annual new member's breakfast recently in San Antonia, Texas. He was sponsored by Pete Rodriguez of Bryan, Don Hanna of Amarillo and Bill Dean of College Station.

In order to be considered for membership in Phi Beta Mu, a director must have at least eight years of successful teaching experience and must have produced and maintained an outstanding and consistent band program in the public schools. Maxwell came to Tomball High School after working in Brenham for 17 years. Since his arrival in 1988 the Tomball High School Band has grown from under 60 members to over 150, and has been a consistent UIL Sweepstakes Award winner, in addition to earning laurels from numerous band contests and festivals around the state. The TISD band program currently has a student membership which approaches 600. Bands under Maxwell's supervision have won awards at every level from 6th through 12 grade.

Maxwell holds the position of Band Chairman for Region 9, which encompasses all public schools in the North and West Houston area. He was elected to the office by acclaimation in 1989 and has since been reelected.

45 Years and Counting...

Wayne Maxwell was born in Wichita Falls, Texas near the end of the "Great Depression." His father, E.D. (Shorty) Maxwell, worked in the oil field all of his life and retired after maintaining the same oil leases in Archer County for more than thirty years. Wayne's mother, Beatrice Maxwell, was a hard working, people-loving woman who worked as a seamstress at the local Levi Strauss factory to help Wayne and his sister Patricia attend college.

Wayne's love of music was fostered by his mother singing "pop" tunes of the day — "Harbor Lights," "Lavender Blue," etc. and he often joined in on these and in singing Christmas carols or whatever the music of the day happened to be.

Wayne began school in Wichita Falls, then moved with the family to Valley View for his second year of school. It was in Valley View that he had his first opportunity to perform as a member of the "rhythm band," where he happily played triangle and tambourine and sang with the group. His music teacher, Mrs. Runyon, was a positive influence and encouraged him to continue his participation in music when he moved away to Archer City, Texas, in the middle of his third grade year.

Wayne began band class when he was in the sixth grade, in the summer, on a Pan American metal clarinet rented from Max Kruetz's House of Music. His first teacher was Mrs. Weeks, who retired the next year and was replaced by Fred Prentice, who was the band director and choir director at Archer City High School for three years. Fred was an outstanding teacher and served as a role model for the band students wherever he taught. One of Wayne's classmates, trombonist Morgan Powell, went on to play in the One O'Clock Lab Band at North Texas State and to teach at the Berklee School of Music. It was while Fred was the Archer City director that Wayne was introduced to "Dixieland jazz" and this developed into a love for and interest in jazz that resulted in his receiving a scholarship to attend East Texas State Teacher's College on a dance band scholarship.

From junior high through his high school days, Wayne was active in all sports — football, baseball, and basketball. Archer City was a small town and everyone had to participate so that they would have enough players. Wayne played baseball on the "town team," coached by a man who dedicated his life to helping young people — Sam Baker. Sam would load up the entire team

(all nine players) in his Dodge and take them to the baseball games- wherever they might be. One of these ball players was a good friend of Wayne's who went on to be quite successful in the literary world. His name was Larry McMurtry, a Pulitzer Prize winner, who has come back home to open a unique bookstore in Archer.

While in high school, Wayne was president of his senior class (all twenty nine students), student council president, co-captain of the football team and a "student conductor" in band at UIL band contest.

At East Texas State College his scholarship (\$62.50 per month) required him to play in the EastTexans Dance Band, which played a dance practically every Saturday night for the social clubs on campus. He also was to move pianos and do whatever needed "doing" around the music building. The faculty at ETSU consisted of some outstanding teachers - band directors Ray Luke and Neal Humfield, and woodwind instructors William H. Hill and Donald Black — all of whom were not only great teachers, but also truly interested in their students and their future.

Some of Wayne's ETSU classmates were Tommy Nuegent and Stanley Walker - both of whom went on to be outstanding high school band directors. Wayne's roommates during most of his college years included fellow "Cooper Street Gang" members Bill Haskett, Cecil Douglas, and Johnny Stewart, all of whom have had distinguished careers as teachers, administrators, and composers-arrangers. Wayne split a major on clarinet and bassoon (an instrument he had not seen "up close" until he got to Commerce).

The first teaching position for Wayne was as band director and assistant coach for the Kemp, Texas, schools. As a coach at the high school football games, Wayne would call up the next tune for the band to play at time-outs, return to the bench, and "hustle back" to the band to kick-off the band during the time-out. He received a lot of help and encouragement as a first year teacher from a former classmate and nearby band director, Tommy Downing.

During Wayne's first year in Kemp, he met and married his wife of twenty-seven years, Sammie Smith. Sammie was a former twirler and percussionist in the Kemp band. The next year Wayne and Sammie moved to Springdale, Arkansas, where Wayne was the Junior High band director. There he assisted Harry Hinckley at the high school, and started a string program in the fourth grades at the elementary schools. Sammie was a freshman at the University of Arkansas.

Next came a move to West Texas — four years as junior high director and assistant to Cecil Douglas at the high school in Seminole, one year as the band director in Alpine, and five years as director at John B. Hood Junior High in Odessa. It was during this time that Wayne was positively influenced by wonderful experienced teachers like J.R. McEntyre, Bill Dean, Dan Gibbs, and G.T. Gilligan. He worked with Ike Nail, Jerry Finnell, Max Morley, and Don Hanna who were junior high directors who started "team teaching." This group started the Odessa All-City Jr. High Band and began using the breath impulse system. Saturdays in Odessa meant a trip to May and Duncan music store where the manager, Tommy Fry, would listen, along with other directors, to the most recent rehearsal tapes and make suggestions as to what to do next to make the band better. During these five years, junior high bands from Odessa ranked first, second, and first in honor band tape competition and Permian High was ranked first in 5A competition.

The Maxwell children, Missy and Shaun, were born in Odessa, and both were considerate enough to be born on the weekend so as not to interrupt their dad's teaching schedule.

McCollum High School in San Antonio was the next stop for Wayne and his family. During his time there the school was awarded the Francis Bellamy Award and the band program progressed to the point that it was one of the better bands in town. The band traveled to the Greater Southwest Music Festival in Amarillo and performed for judges William Revelli, Fred Ebbs and William Swohr and received top ratings and positive comments. Wayne served as band division chairman for the region - his first experience working in such a capacity.

The Maxwell family then moved to Brenham - where both children attended and graduated from high school - and began what proved to be a long stay. Brenham was in region 18 at the time and the band was in competition with outstanding programs like Westlake High with director Lee Boyd Montgomery and Georgetown High with director Rodney Klett. Wayne served as band division secretary for the region and learned a lot from them and other members of the region. The high standards set by them inspired the Brenham Bands to continue to work and raise standards and expectations of the members of the bands and the community. The bands placed 2nd, 5th and 7th in honor band competition and were selected as outstanding at Buccaneer Days in Corpus and ContraBand Days in Lake Charles .The band program received a great deal of help from Blinn College director Larry Campbell, who is an outstanding teacher and director. It was here that Sammie, after a courageous twelve-year battle with cancer, passed away.

Serving as director of bands in the Tomball schools was the last stop in Wayne's teaching career. He was ably assisted for nine years by John Pollard and worked with other outstanding teachers Tim Hutto and Frank Troyka during that time. High school band enrollment for the first year was about sixty-five members. But the band program received strong support from the administration including principal John Neubauer who promised and came through with a steak cookout for the band when it put 150 members on the field at a football game. The program continued to flourish and grow, being selected in the top six in honor band competition and at the state marching band contest in 4A. The band was selected as the outstanding band at all of the American Classic Music Festivals in Texas in 1997, his thirty-seventh and final year of teaching. Soon after moving to Tomball, Wayne met and married JoAnn, and she and her children, Shannon and Grant, joined the family. Wayne and JoAnn still reside in Tomball.

Wayne served as region band chairman for Region 9 for eight years and had the pleasure of working closely with outstanding teachers Bill Watson, Randy Vaughn, Philip Geiger and Paul Worosello in that capacity.

Wayne still travels to Brenham during the school year - teaching private lessons at all of the schools — and enjoys a wonderful working relationship with the music staff there. He also works as the Houston representative for Tote Unlimited.





PERMIAN HIGH SCHOOL BAND FOOTBALL GAME PROCEDURE

The appearance (at ALL TIMES - not just on the field) that the band makes at football games is very important. Make the Band's part of the game an outstanding one. Many people from outside of Odesta will see one Band at every game, and the impression they receive has a great deal to do with the building of the spirit and reputation of the Band. The Band, the Student Body, and the Cheerleaders reflect the image of Permian High School. Let's make our image a favorable one. At the Half, Lift your FEET, PLAY YOUR PART, AND DRIVE, DRIVE,

- 1. EACH PERSON is responsible for HIS OR HER EQUIPMENT AT ALL TIMES.
- 2. STAY SEATED when the bus is moving. All rowdiness is to be reported by sponsor or student officer.
- 3. File off buses in an orderly manner. Do not crowd or push. Do not leave buses until the Band Director instructs you to do so.
- 4. Go directly from the bus to your position on the track to march into the stands.
- 5. BE PROPERLY UNIFORMED AT ALL TIMES.
- 6. Get into your place in the stands as quickly as possible.
- 7. Sit in assigned seats and DO NOT MOVE ABOUT DURING THE GAMES.
- 8. Do not take any unauthorized refreshments during the game. After the halftime show, refreshments may (or may not) be authorized. No eating whatsoever is allowed in the stands.
- 9. No 'noodling' (Blowing or instrument or drumming) at any time the band is not playing. Drums are to play ONLY with the full band or with the yells.
- 10. No one but BAND PERSONNEL allowed in the band section. Ex-Band students or special visitors are sometimes exceptions, but only by SPECIAL PERMISSION from the director.
- 11. Watch the director at all times when he is standing in front of the Band. Get Music up rapidly when it is called. Watch closely for cut-offs in the music as the band will stop playing when play resumes on the field.
- 12. File orderly from the stands to the formation before the half-time show.

 Do not play instruments; if it is cold, blow air through instruments to warm up. GET QUICKLY INIO FORMATION SO THE ENTRANCE ONTO THE FIELD CAN BE MADE AS SOON AS HALF-TIME BEGINS. DO NOT LOITER around out of formation in the end zone or on the sidelines.
- 13. Cheer with the cheerleaders, but avoid 'clique cheering'; treat visitors, other directors, and guests politely at all times. (Do not enter the stands during the break.) No student will be permitted to run on the field after the game to greet players, etc.
- 14. USE COMMON SENSE!!



WELCOME TO THE McCOLLUM BAND

As a member of the McCollum High School Band you will be expected to do the following things:

1. Practice regularly - practice slowly and carefully and work on assigned exercises and music. You should ALLAYS practice duily and include work on all major scales, chromatic scale (for the gractical range of your instrument) and on exercises out of a good technique book for your instrument. A list of some

good technique is included at the bottom of this sheet.

2. Work to increase your knowledge about fundamentals of music such as the meaning of musical terms, music history and the history of your own in-strument. You will be given a list of musical terms to study.

- 4. If possible-study privately. Private lessons are the best way to guarantee steady constant progress. Conscientious work with a good teacher will aid your improvement more than any other single thing. The Band Booster's Club sponsors (or shares) the expenses with students unable to bear thefull cost of lessons. You are eligible to take part in the private lesson program.
 - 5. If possible-attend a summer band camp
- 6. Develop an even better, more positive attitude toward band-be prepared to take constructive criticism and learn from it. Forget that the word CAN'T exists and never use the phrase IT'S TOO HARD. At McCollum they are not accepted. Hard and careful work, repeated time and time again will result in success. That is our goal - SUCCESS. Always remember that band is a "team effort" and that each person must do his share to make the band successful.
- 7. Select, prepare and perform a solo and participate in an ensemble at U.I.L. contest held in February. The material must be chosen from a list of prescribed music (list available in band office). If interested or if you're encouraged - prepare the All District material and try out for All District Band in December. We need more all District players and we need some All Staters

8. Encourage your parents to become members and active in the work of the Band Boosters Club which has as its only goal to aid the band program in our school district.

Anything you can think of to contribute to the continuing and growing success of our bands. The people in the bands make them what they are - good or bad. The responsibility of having an outstanding band belongs to every one of you - fulfill that responsibility and be proud of your contribution.

INSPECTION GUIDELINES

Adopted by Region XII Directors

- A. STATIONARY COMMANDS: Stationary commands shall be selected from the following: Left face, right face, about face, parade rest, attention. Inspection should be done from a block band formation.
- B. INSTRUMENT INSPECTION: The following factors should be used for determining condition of instruments:
 - BRASSES: 1. The bore of all wind instruments should be clean, but moisture should not be considered as being dirt.
 - 2. ALL slides should function properly and be clean; however they may be greased. It is not necessary that the slides be buffed to a shine. It is permissible to inspect the tuning slide with care. The tuning slide may be marked by the student for intonation purposes.
 - 3. Brasswind, mouthpieces must be clean. Lack of plating on a mouthpiece should not be considered as a dirty mouthpiece. Shanks should be round and not split.
 - 4. Water key corks should not leak, nor be split.
 - 5. To sum up, age of the instrument, condition of lacquer or plating, and dents that do not affect tone production, should not be considered. Just make sure that instruments are clean, and working properly.
 - WOODWINDS: 1. Woodwind instruments should have a clean mouthpiece, and a reasonably clean reed, unchipped, and with no lipstick marks.
 - 2. Judge may remove reed for inspection of mouthpiece.
 - 3. Ligature should be complete, and in good condition.
 - 4. Woodwind joint corks should be free of excessive and old grease. The corks do not have to be new, but should be reasonably tight, with no pieces missing.
 - 5. All keys should function properly, and no rubber bands should be used in place of springs. Keys do not need to be shiny, but they should be clean.
 - 6. Body of the instrument, including tone holes, should be reasonably clean. Lack of plating on keys should not be considered.
 - 7. Minor split in the wood should not be considered.
 - 8. Pads do not have to be new, but must be in good condition. Pads with "cotton" showing are not acceptable
 - 9. Neckstraps may be worn during inspection, and may be included as an inspection item.

ADJUDICATION INSTRUCTIONS

I. MARCHING COMPETENCIES

L. Uniformity.

All movements executed by a band during its performance should be done by each individual band member in exactly the same style. Each band member should be trained to execute this maneuver in exactly the same way-every student should look alike in their executions.

2. Stride.

- a. Each band member should be trained to take exactly the same length step downfield and during and following all turns.
- b. Each band member should put the same portion of his foot on the yard line each time he crosses it or halts on it.
- c. All feet should hit the ground on the beat.

3. Carriage.

- Heads should be carried level.
- b. Bodies should be carried level.
- c. All like instruments should be carried in a uniform manner.

4. Spacing.

Regardless of where you are on the field what type of drill the band is executing or what type of formation the band is in individual band students interval should remain constant.

5. Turns.

All turns pivots and facings should be uniform within the individual band. The pivot point on all turns should remain constant.

6. Precision.

Precision in marching is the science of doing things together. The feet should strike the ground together; turns where applicable should be made together; any movements of other parts of the body-arms legs etc.-should always be made together in a uniform manner.

7. Sharpness.

All movements should be executed in a spirited precise manner.

8. Clarity.

Figurations and formations should be readily discernable.

II. GENERAL APPEARANCE.

All headgear must be worn at the same angle on the head. Attention must be given to the uniform so that trouser and sleeve lengths are constant throughout the band. Socks should all be the same color within the band. Shoes should be the same color and present a neat appearance.

V. GENERAL DISCIPLINE.

A band should project an intense desire to excel.

Patriotic halftime salutes America's warriors







School band named grand champion

For the first time in its history, the Tomball High School Honors Band was named grand champion among 5A schools invited to a special contest.

The band performed at the American Classic Festival in San Antonio in April. Tomball High School clarinet soloist Eric Bean earned an "outstanding soloist" award for his performance at the festival. San Antonio was one of four sites for the festival.

Other festival sites were Dallas, Houston and Corpus Christi.

"This is an unusual group of students," said Wayne Maxwell. director of bands at Tomball High. "They have musical talent, they cooperate (with each other)

and they work hard.

"The kids stepped up their motivation," said John Pollard, assistant band director.

Maxwell said going to San Antonio was a reward to the students for "all their hard work. We did other things while we were there, not just perform," he said.

Since this was Maxwell's last year at the high school, he was pleased that the band earned the state grand champion award.

He retires after 37 years of teaching. The last nine years have been at Tomball High School.

He is not leaving altogether. Maxwell will serve as a consultant for the district next year.

"This has been a great place to play, (with) great venues," Maxwell said. "I've enjoyed my time here, the kids, the parents and community support."

Maxwell said the band booster club has been a tremendous help.

Pollard, who started at Tomball High School the same year as Maxwell, said everything he's learned was "pretty much due to his tutelage."

Pollard said the program has grown and improved over the years. It's strong now, he asserts, because the students have taken ownership. Pollard says he believes there will be a smooth and professional transition from Maxwell to Jeff Downey, the new director of bands. Downey moved to Tomball from Mustang, Oklahoma where he was director of bands for Mustang High School.

Downey says he started inquiring about schools in the Houston

area and learned that Tomball was looking for a director. He says that Richard Crain, music supervisor for the Spring school district, told him Tomball was the top spot.


"I am a strong believer in programs not being single-facet oriented," Downey said. Tomball is such a program, he says, with field, concert and jazz bands.

"It seemed like it was the


right time to retire," Maxwell said. "This has been a really great year, our kids have done well."


