

Joe Wassel was born on January 2, 1939 in Fort Sill, Oklahoma. He was the second son of Master Sgt. and Mrs. John Wassel. Joe began his education with his mother, Macel, as his teacher in a one room school house. He continued on to the Lawton public school district, graduating from LHS in 1956. Joe graduated having won numerous outstanding musician awards and honors under the direction of James Matthews and George Walters. He followed Mr. Matthews to the University of Houston, earning a Bachelors Degree in Music in 1960. In later years, Joe continued his education, earning a Master's Degree in School Administration from Texas A&I University at Kingsville.

Joe began his teaching career at Crain Middle School in Victoria, Texas in 1960. In 1967, he became the assistant band director to Fred Junkin at Victoria High School. Joe served as the director of the marching band and conductor of the Symphonic Band. Joe and Fred enjoyed a successful ten years together serving the students of Victoria High School. In 1978, Joe accepted the position of head band director at Calhoun High School in Port Lavaca, Texas. He enjoyed over ten years as director at Calhoun High School. During that time, both his sons, Jody Wassel and Frank Hinds, were honored to be his students. Frank continued his musical pursuits with the Corps of Cadets Band at Texas ASM University. His daughter, Amy, though never a student in his band, also was an accomplished musician, serving as drum major in high school and playing in the University of Texas Basketball and Concert bands in college. Joe's teaching career came full circle when, in 1990, he returned to Victoria High School as head band director for three years, before retiring in 1993. During his careers in Victoria and Calhoun, he and his students enjoyed over 22 years of University Interscholastic League Sweepstakes awards.

After his retirement in 1993, Joe continued to serve students and fellow educators throughout Texas as a clinician, adjudicator, and Executive Secretary of UIL Music Region XIII. After retirement, he returned to teaching for one year at Industrial High School when the program was in need of a director. Afterwards, Joe went on to assist band programs in both Victoria and Port Lavaca, ensuring a continuous growth for two quality music education programs.

Throughout his 40+ year career, Joe was known for his warmth, engaging personality, quick wit, optimism, energy, keen organizational skills, and a consistently mean game of golf. The disciplined approach to music he required extended into his and his students' lives. Joe constantly encouraged his family, students and colleagues to achieve more than they imagined possible. His dedication was generously acknowledged by former students and their parents for years to come.

Joe was a long-standing member of Texas Bandmasters Association and felt privileged to hold membership in Phi Beta Mu for 34 years. He also held membership in Texas Music Educators Association and was made an honorary member of the VFW Post 4403 of Port Lavaca. For many years, he or one of his associates played TAPS at funeral services of local veterans, a personal decision he made to honor his father who served in both World Wars. His appreciation and respect for the armed services was also evident in his love for John Phillip Sousa marches. From his first year at Calhoun High School, he concluded every final concert with "The Stars and Stripes Forever," as an honor to the band sponsor president, Earl Colley. Earl and Joe had quickly become close friends and shared a love for Sousa marches. Joe surprised Earl by ending the final concert with "The Stars and Stripes Forever," announcing to the crowd that "this one's for you, Earl." This tradition continued throughout the rest of Joe's teaching career.

Joe Wassel passed away on January 29, 2004 in St. Louis, MO at the age of 65. He died surrounded by his family after complications following surgery. He instilled in his family a real love of life, passion for music, respect for people and the importance of education. The Joe Wassel Memorial Scholarship was created after his death to continue his legacy of music education.

# Joe Wassel plans life, work in city

Joe Wassel is a newcomer to Port Lavaca and the local school district; however, he has very much made this his home, his school and his town.

Pleased with his position as band coordinator for the Calhoun County Independent School District, he compared his years in Victoria to his few months at Calhoun High School and noted advantages and disadvantages in both. "There was more ease at Victoria, perhaps because of my years there, but in time things will fit into place here."

Wassel continued, "I feel the coordination is better here, but I would like to have more of an advance look at the younger students that will be coming into high school band. I would like to know their capabilities and have them know me before they actually enter as a student."

In the 1979-80 school year, the ninthgrade students will move to the high school, giving him a full four years with the students. He feels that this is certainly a change for the better and long overdue.

When the transition occurs, Wassel expects to form three, or even four bands at the high school. There are two at present-the symphonic and concert bands. "I'll have over 250 students in high school band, and that's speaking conservatively," said Wassel with anticipation.

When asked his preference of marching season versus concert season, he replied, "Each part presents its own challenge. It's really hard to choose. Marching is a total challenge. When you work with an individual student, you get to know them better and the raport is present."

As far as contests are concerned, he is 100 percent for them. "Personally, I like

contests. It forces a student to reach a point that they do their best. They strive to achieve their best. Each time they compete, it becomes easier for them and it also allows them more confidence in themselves and their ability."

Wassel emphasized that he pushes competition, even for the top group, the symphonic band. "Whether they make it or not is not nearly as important as the fact that they try and strive to do just that much better," he added.

As a student himself, Wassel belonged to the National Honor Society, the band, several clubs and played basketball, football and ran track. His influence from all "was good." "I feel that band made me more self-disciplined, taught me to work together for the group. It also gave me individual outlets. I think it makes for a better thinker, because you have to think fast to read music. It increases physical coordination and manual dexterity. And most importantly, I learned to enjoy music of all kinds. I enjoyed band as much as anything I ever did," stressed the new director.

Wassel feels that belonging to an organization is essential. He noted that importance of a child to feel he belongs. "The kids that get in trouble are usually the ones that are not involved. When they belong to an organization, the parents know where their children are. The kids also feel that somebody cares how they behave and how they feel."

He has decided to plant his roots in Port Lavaca after his 18 years in Victoria. Asked whether he still drives to Victoria to shop, he answered no. "I can usually find what I want here in Port Lavaca. Besides, a lot of the sales tax revenue in Victoria comes out of Port Lavaca. I think it's important to keep the money in your own home town."

becoming an active part of the community and community affairs, he emphasizes that his job comes first and he needs time to establish himself in the school.

The Oklahoma born man received his Bachelor of Music Education at the University of Houston in 1960 and later achieved his Master of Science at Texas A&I University in 1973. He attributes his success and good fortune to his stepfather, who not only raised one son, and four stepsons, but also saw to it that they each had a college aducation even though he himself did not.

"My stepfather always said anything you want to do, you can do as long as you are responsible for it and you can pay for it," says Wassel, adding, "He never stopped us from doing anything, but always encouraged us in whatever we did"

His mother never lacked in giving him encouragement. She even taught him first grade. "When I was in first grade, I went to a one-room country schoolhouse. You know the kind. The wood-burning stove, the outhouse in back, no running water—and, yes, we rode horses to school and walked five miles through the snow to get there. It was located five miles out of town," reminises Wassel.

Amy is the six-year-old daughter of Wassel and she is now enrolled in first grade. He and his wife, Polly, also have a son, Jody Jr., who is a junior in Calhoun High School.

He was also in NHS, Thespians, Key Club, Spanish club, and Science club. His hobbies are music and gradering. He is married and has 2 children, Amy and Jody. He likes Calhoun and says the school has alot of pride and the band has alot of potential. He further commented that the students and teachers are nice, friendly, and cooperative.

Stage Band, directed by Mr. Henderson, did a good job playing for the Student Council convention last Monday. The Stage Band will perform this year for schools and other activities.



























# CHS band rates a 1; to compete in state
