



Former HHS band director inducted into Hall of Fame

Former Hays band director Gerald "Jerry" Babbitt was honored during halftime ceremonies at a Texas A&M University - Kingsville football game by being inducted into the Texas A&M University - Kingsville Javelina Band Hall of Fame.

He is only the third TAMUK (formally Texas A&I University) alumni to have been chosen for the alumni hall of fame. He earned his bachelor of music degree in 1964 and his master's degree in 1966, both from "A&I".

Babbitt's career in music education has spanned a period of more than 40 years. He served in the public schools of Central and South Texas as a band director and fine arts administrator from 1964 through 2004. He continues to be active in music education as executive secretary of University Interscholastic League (UIL) Music Region 18, a position he and his wife, Chery, have held since 1975.

Babbitt served the Hays Consolidated Independent School District (Hays CISD) as director of bands from 1985 to 2002, and as full time director of music and of the Performing Arts Center from 2002 until his retirement in 2004. During the 1985-1986 school year, his first year as Hays band director, the Jack C. Hays High School band their first UIL Sweepstakes Award in the 17year history of the school. They continued to win Sweepstakes during each of the 17-years Babbitt directed the Hays High School band. The Hays CISD band program grew from 300 to more than 1,200 students, and the Hays High School Band increased from 102 to 320 members during his tenure as band director. They also won numerous awards and honors in both the marching and concert band arenas. The Hays High School band was a finalist at the **UIL State Marching Contest** and in the TMEA Honor Band

Competition seven times, and won the UIL Class 4A State Wind Ensemble Championship three times. In 1996, the Hays High School Band performed at the National Concert Band Festival in Chicago; one of only 16 bands selected nationally. In 1998, the Hays band was selected as one of only two bands throughout the United States, Canada, and Japan to receive the the John Philip Sousa Foundation's prestigious Sudler Flag of Honor. During the 17 years the award had been in existence, only 39 bands inter-nationally had been selected to receive this honor. In 2000, The Grammy Foundation selected Hays as one of the "Top 100" high school music programs from throughout the entire United States.

In 2001, the Hays band traveled to Ireland to march in the world famous Saint Patrick's Day parade in Dublin. They returned as the overall Grand Champion of the Dublin Bandfest. They also won major band festivals in Colorado, Florida, Illinois, Louisiana, Tennessee, and throughout Texas.

In 1996, Jerry was the recipient of the Denius-UIL Sponsor Excellence Award. This prestigious honor is awarded to only 10 Texas educators each year. Only two of the 10 were music educators, and only nine Texas band directors had been so honored. Jerry has been awarded the National Band Association Citation of Excellence, the TMEA Leadership and Achievement Award, and has on three separate occasions received commendations from the governor of Texas, the Texas and U.S. Legislatures, and the mayor of Austin. During his 38 years as a band director, his bands won the Sweepstakes Award for 35 years. His bands were finalists at the UIL State Marching Contest and in the TMEA Honor Band Competition 13 times. They won TMEA and UIL State Championships seven times.

He has been honored as an "Outstanding Music Graduate" by Texas A&I University, and has twice been named to "Who's Who Among America's Teachers." He has presented numerous clinics TBA, TMEA, UIL and TMAA; served on many state committees; has served on the TMEA State Board, on UIL/TMEA Music Advisory Committee, and is a charter member and past-president of the Texas Music Adjudicators Association. He currently serves as the UIL executive secretary liaison to the TMAA State Board of Directors. He serves on the band selection committee for the John Philip Sousa Foundation's Sudler Flag of Honor award. In 1980 he organized the Great Hills Baptist Church orchestra in Austin, and continues to serve as their conductor.

Babbitt and his family reside in Mountain City Oaks. He is active as a music consultant, clinician, and adjudicator throughout the state and nation.

Gerald (Jerry) Babbitt is the founding conductor of the Great Hills Baptist Church Orchestra, a position in which the Lord has allowed him to serve since the inception of the orchestra in 1980.

Jerry served in Central and South Texas schools as a band director and fine arts administrator from 1964 - 2004. In addition to serving as conductor of the GHBC Worship Orchestra, Jerry continues to be active in music education as the Executive Secretary of the University Interscholastic League Music Region 18 and UIL Area D, a position he and his wife Cheryl have held since 1975. He is very active as a music consultant, clinician, and music adjudicator throughout the state and nation.

Jerry served as band director in Kingsville, Pearsall, Round Rock, Westlake, and Hays High Schools. During his 38 years as a band director, his bands won the UIL Sweepstakes Award for 35 years, and won numerous concert and marching festivals throughout the world. His bands have been finalists at the UIL State Marching Contest and in the TMEA Honor


Band Competition thirteen times.

They won TMEA and UIL State Championships seven times. In 1998, the Hays HS Band was selected as one of only two bands throughout the United States, Canada, and Japan, to receive the John Philip Sousa Foundation's prestigious Sudler Flag of Honor. The Grammy Foundation selected Hays as one of the "Top 100" high school music programs in the United States. Jerry has been recipient of the Denius – UIL Sponsor Excellence Award. This prestigious honor is only awarded to ten Texas school educators each year. He has been awarded the National Band Association Citation of Excellence, the TMEA Leadership and Achievement Award, and has on three separate occasions received commendations from the Governor of Texas, the Texas and U.S. Legislatures, and the Mayor of Austin.

Jerry holds Bachelors and Masters degrees from Texas A&I University (now Texas A&M University at Kingsville), where he has been honored as an "Outstanding Music Graduate" and has been inducted into the Javelina Band Hall of Fame. He has twice been named to "Who's Who Among America's Teachers." He has presented numerous clinics for TBA, TMEA, UIL, and TMAA; served on many state committees; has served on the TMEA State Board, on the UIL/TMEA Music Advisory Committee, and is a charter member and Past-President of the Texas Music Adjudicators Association. In addition, he serves on the band selection committee for the John Philip Sousa Foundation's Sudler Flag of Honor award.

Jerry considers conducting the GHBC Worship Orchestra one of the most coveted blessings of his entire life. Above all, Jerry gives thanks to his Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, for giving him his musical talents. None of his honors and awards would have ever been possible without the Lord providing every opportunity. He also thanks his father and mother, Allen and Mimi Babbitt, for instilling his deep love for music and for the Lord. He would also like to thank Cheryl, his loving and dedicated wife of 32 years, and his entire family, including his children Ryan and Karen, for their constant support and prayers throughout his career in music.

The Jack C. Hays Rebel Bands have just finished their final concert season under the directorship of Gerald Babbitt, On April 22-24, 2002, the Hays bands competed in the UIL Region 18 Band Concert and Sightreading Contest. Symphonic III Band, under the leadership of Chris Gordon, received all Division II, "excellent" ratings. Symphonic Band II, directed by Tony Leflet, brought home Division I, "superior" ratings in Concert performance. Symphonic Band I, led by Joey Lucita, received a trophy for their Division I's "superior" in both Concert and Sightreading performance. And Gerald Babbitt's Wind Ensemble brought home the 17th consecutive Sweepstakes trophy in the history of Jack C. Hays High School, earning unanimous Division I, "superior" ratings from all six of the judges, after having earned the same at UIL marching contest last fall.

The UIL judges are selected from "successful" band directors from throughout the state of Texas. They all had glowing comments for the bands and for Mr. Babbitt. Val Rose, of Lamar University, wrote: "Great job today! This is a fine group of outstanding young musicians,

led by a master teacher!" Joe Castellano, of San Antonio, stated "Great job! Band came to play one final performance for its outstanding director." "You are fortunate to be the recipient of wonderful instruction." commented Kevin Arnott, of Boerne High School. Charles Munsell of Smithson Valley wrote of the sightreading portion, "Above all else, you are so musical when you play, and quite obviously have spirit, pride and leadership. Take time to thank your great teachers." Anthony Gibson remarked, "Thank Mr. B for his great contribution to bands in Texas!" Ross Grant, director at TCU, complimented all by writing, "Fine band - Fine director - Fine tradition. Congrats on all your hard work and talents!"

Gerald Babbitt will be conducting at his final concert with Hays High School (after 38 years as a band director), this Thursday, May 16, at 7:00 p.m. in the Hays Band Hall. Babbitt is not leaving the Hays school district, but rather moving across the highway to the Hays Administration Building to continue in his position as Director of Music, but expanding the program to grades K-12. He is extremely excited about the opportunity to help design the new Hays Performing Arts Center, and see it through completion.

To show their appreciation to Gerald Babbitt for his dedication and talents rendered to Hays High School, the Hays Band Boosters are giving a reception in his honor on Saturday, June 1, from 2-5 p.m., in the Hays High School Band Hall. All current and "ex" band students and band parents are encouraged to attend.

Band director Babbitt will lead district's music program

Gerald Babbitt, Hays CISD Band Director, has been named Director of Music for the district, effective December 1. As part of his responsibilities, Babbitt will coordinate the activities and performances of the district-wide Performing Arts Center, scheduled to open in 2003.

Babbitt has been the band director for the district since 1985. During those 17 years, the band program grew from 300 students to more than 1,150 students, and has won numerous state and national awards and honors in both the marching and concert band arenas.

Babbitt has been awarded the Denius-UIL Sponsor Excellence Award, the National Band Association Citation of Excellence, the TMEA Leadership and Achievement Award and commendations from the governor of Texas and the Texas Legislature.



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10 educators receive UIL, Denius Excellence Awards

Two are band directors. One coaches girls track and cross country at a small, Central Texas school. Another coaches football at an inner city school. Six coach one or more—and in most cases, many more—UIL academic contests.

These 10 outstanding educators have been selected as winners of the 1996 Denius-UIL Sponsor Excellence Award. A panel of judges representing athletics, fine arts and academics selected the 10 from nominees submitted by school principals and superintendents statewide. Each recipient will received a \$1,000 cash award and a symbolic momento.

The Denius-UIL Excellence Award recipients for 1996 include:

• Gerald A. Babbitt, the director of bands and music for the Hays CISD since 1985. Over these 12 years, the band program has grown from 300 to almost 1000 students, and has won numerous state and national awards and honors in both the marching and concert band areas.

 Jane Burleson, UIL coordinator and speech/ debate coach at Rocksprings High School who with limited resources has built the UIL academic program into one of the state's finest.

 Mona Gloff, boys and girls head track and cross country coach whose girls teams have won the past five state 2A championships. She was named Texas Girls Coaches Association "1996 Track Coach of the Year."

Recognizing excellence

In its sixth year, the Denius-UIL Sponsor Excellence Award seeks identify and recognize those who assist students in developing and refining their extracurricular talents to the highest degree possible within the educational system while helping them to keep their personal worth separate from their success or failure in competition.

 Craig Hertel, academic coordinato for Lindsey High School, which won Conference A state championships in 1992, '93, '94 and '95, and finished as runner up in '96. Craig also coaches several speech and other academic events.

 Marsella Jennings, who has coached the UIL business contests, advised the yearbook and prepared students for solo-ensemble competition at Lazbuddie HS. She has coached four consecutive state accounting team champions.

• Penny McLeaish, who has coached UIL academic events for 40 years. Her students at Mission Sharyland HS have won six state championships in debate and four in extemp. She has been part of a UIL teamof sponsors and students that have won the academic district title 34 years in a row.

• Gloria McLuckie, who directs the New Diana HS one-act play the 1996 state championship and the 2A state runner-up in '93, '94 and '95. She also coaches speech and debate and is her school's UIL coordinator. She also UIL academic participation to help special education students succeed.

• Larry Rayes, who coaches football, basketball and baseball and teaches mathematics at Ross Sterling HS in Houston. In addition to his successful athletic programs, he has developed programs to emphasis high moral character and citizenship. Exxon named him an outstanding math teacher as well.

• Don Theode, the band and jazz ensemble director at Clifton HS. During the past eight years, his bands have never received any rating at a UIL contest lower than a 1st Division by any judge, and his bands have earned nine consecutive UIL Sweepstakes trophies.

• Hugh Bob Wylie, who in his 34-year career at Longview HS has coached numerous state math champions, including the final state slide rule champ. He has coached at least one participant in at least one UIL math events to the State Meet in 23 of the past 27 years.


The U.l.L. judges are selected from "successful" band directors from throughout the state of Texas. They all had glowing comments for the bands and for Mr. Babbitt.

THE GRAMMY FOUNDATION NAMES JACK C. HAYS HIGH SCHOOL AS A GRAMMY SIGNATURE SCHOOL

National Program Recognizes Outstanding Commitment to Music Education

The GRAMMY Foundation has announced that Jack C. Hays High School has been named as a GRAMMY Signature School in a letter received by Gerald Babbitt, Director of Music. Determined on the basis of a scoring system applied by a panel of top music educators and professionals, Jack C. Hays is one of 100 high schools from across the country to receive this recognition based on their high level of commitment to music education.

"We are thrilled to give national recognition to these schools for an outstanding job of fostering their arts programs in a difficult cultural funding environment," said Michael Green, President/CEO of the Recording Academy. "We applaud them for implementing music education programs that make a positive difference in the lives of young adults."

Responding to the notification that Hays High School is one of 100 schools to receive this high recognition, Mr. Babbitt stated "We are very honored to be named as one of the nation's 'top 100' high school music programs. We are proud to be recognized for our program which uses the arts to help children be problem solvers, creative thinkers, and mentally disciplined individuals, which are invaluable skills for future endeavors. Our band and choral music staff members have worked extremely hard helping our students reach high levels of achievement. Our students, parents, and administration are to be commended for their hard work & dedication."

To begin the selection process, last September, the GRAMMY Foundation mailed applications to more than 18,000 public high schools from districts large and small, urban and rural, performing arts magnets and those with limited music budgets, requesting information about the school's music programs which were submitted to an independent data compilation firm for processing. Upon initial screening, some schools were asked to submit additional documentation such as recordings of their musical performing groups, sample concert programs, music curriculum and repertoire, which was reviewed by an independent screening committee to determine the school's meriting Signature School status. One hundred schools were chosen to receive "Signature School" recognition, of which only 8 are Texas high schools. Two of the eight are Performing Arts Academies in Dallas and Houston, and all the others are large Class 5A schools: Klein HS, Klein Forest HS, Denton HS, Turner HS - Carrollton, Coronado HS - El Paso. Jack C. Hays High School is the only Texas Class 4A school to receive this honor.

The GRAMMY Foundation, a non-profit arm of the Recording Academy, is dedicated to advancing music and arts-based education across the country. Through cultural, professional, and educational initiatives, the Foundation aims to strengthen our educational system and our culture at large.





THE HAYS REBEL WIND ENSEMBLE IS ONCE AGAIN HEADING TO STATE

After all the spring competitions are over and school is out for the summer, does the Hays Rebel Band take time off until August? No, not when it comes to competition! They are, by audio CD recording, continuing to amaze and please their peers and community. After winning the prestigious John Philip Sousa Foundation's international "Sudler Flag of Honor", the Hays High School Wind Ensemble is well on its way toward earning the Texas Class 4A Honor Band Title, sponsored by the Texas Music Educators Association. This process is not new to Hays; the Wind Ensemble advanced to the state finals both of the previous two sessions, earning a place as the 3rd runner-up statewide each time. This year's elimination process began on May 30, 1999, for the bands in Music Region 18.

All Class 4A Bands (almost 200 state-wide) who earned a Division 1 rating at UIL Concert & Sightreading Contest are eligible to enter their band in this first phase of competition for TMEA Region Honor Band. There are 23 music regions in the state of Texas, from which two bands are chosen (for a total of 46), to continue to the Area competition, by a panel of five judges (all from very successful music programs). There are seven areas in the state, from which two bands are selectively chosen to continue to the State level, at which time there are 14 bands remaining in the competition with aspirations of becoming the State of Texas Class 4A Honor Band. This process is the same format that is used to determine the Texas Marching Band Champion, except by audio recordings of the concert bands.

At the Region level on May 30, the Jack C. Hays Wind Ensemble was unanimously chosen by the 5-judge panel as the 1st place band to continue in competition, along with the Connally High School Band, which was selected as the 2nd representative. On June 11, when the Area competition was finalized, the Hays Wind Ensemble was once again unanimously chosen as the 1st place representative from Area D, and the Connally High School Band was selected as the 2nd band to continue to the State level. This final step for Texas Class 4A Honor Band will take place at the annual Texas Bandmasters Association Clinic/ Convention, held in San Antonio, on July 25, 1999.













JOHN PHILIP SOUSA FOUNDATION SELECTS HAYS BAND FOR INTERNATIONAL AWARD

The Jack C. Hays Rebel Band recently received its greatest honor ever! In December, during the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic/Convention in Chicago, The John Philip Sousa Foundation selected the Jack C. Hays High School Wind Ensemble to receive the Sudler Flag of Honor award for 1998.

The Sudler Flag of Honor award is presented only to high schools bands and wind ensembles which have maintained a level of the very highest quality of musical performance and organizational distinction at the international level over a period of several years. The Sudler Flag of Honor is the highest international recognition of excellence that can come to a high school band program and director, and its purpose is to identify, recognize, and honor these great bands. Only two high school bands from the entire United States, Canada, and Japan were selected for the Flag of Honor award this year.

Only bands with a national reputation for excellence may be nominated. The Hays High School Wind Ensemble was nominated for this award in 1997. After the band has been nominated by a musical conductor of international prominence, the organization is required to put together a very extensive portfolio. This includes a concert performance tape recording; a history of the band's and director's accomplishments; letters of recommendation from nationally known conductors; a scrapbook detailing group honors and recognitions, as well as individual student awards; community involvement and partnerships; and numerous other documentation materials. All of this information is then evaluated by a committee of distinguished high school and university conductors (many of whom are previous "Flag" winners), as well as the Trustees for the Foundation. The Hays Wind Ensemble was not selected for "The Flag" at that time. However, the committee was very impressed, and encouraged Gerald Babbitt, Band Director, to resubmit Hays' updated application and recordings in 1998. This time the Hays Wind Ensemble was selected as the first place band to receive this honor.

The award is endowed through the generosity of Virginia and Louis Sudler. Louis was a successful Chicago businessman, a nationally known patron of the arts and a professional vocalist. He became very interested in the musical youth of America. Thus, the Sudler Flag of Honor was conceived, and is still presented today through the direction of the John Philip Sousa Foundation. The award was implemented in 1983, and since that time, only seventeen high school bands from Texas, and 41 internationally, have been selected for this honor. What is unusual is the high number of bands from Texas that have been selected. This shows that Texas is truly the "Hot Bed" for great high school bands! The Hays Wind Ensemble is only the second Class 4A band to have ever been chosen.

The actual presentation of the award and flag is to take place at a major musical event of this group. The Jack C. Hays Wind Ensemble will present a concert at the SWTSU Evans Auditorium on May 14, 1999. At that time, representatives from the John Philip Sousa Foundation will be in attendance, conduct the Wind Ensemble in a John Philip Sousa March, and make the presentations to the school administration, the band, and director. Look for future notices of the specifics of this very prestigious event. The entire community is invited to attend.















Hays wind ensemble blows through 13th straight superior competition

On April 8, the Hays High School Wind Ensemble, directed by Gerald Babbitt, successfully

Rebel Band Marches to Victory

This has been another banner year for the Jack C. Hays High School Rebel Band. In the Finals, The Rebel Band soundly defeated the current defending UIL Class 4A State Marching Champion, Mesquite Poteet. They finished as the First Runner Up in Class 4A, only 1 point behind the TMEA State Class 4A Concert Band Champion, Coppell High School. Hays is the current UIL State Wind Ensemble Champion, making the Duncanville Contest the "Texas Contest of Champions". When

the finals competition was finished, the Jack C. Hays Rebel Band ranked 9th in the State, among the finest State of Texas bands, all classes included.






