## Petite Band Director Makes Big Impression

Saegert Middle School band members can prove good things come in small packages!

Despite her petite four-foot nine-inch height, Diane Gorzycki is generating a lot of excitement with her new innovations and has gained the respect of the four middle school bands under her direction.

As the first female band director in the era of "big bands", she is the third woman to direct bands in the Seguin Independent School District. But being the first or only female to pioneer in music is quite natural to Gorzycki, who was the first and only girl to be named a brass section leader for the University of Texas Longhorn band and the first to be elected vice president of the marching Longhorns.

Times have changed since 1938 to 1946 when Mesdames George (Ruth) Kieffer and A.A. (Emilou) Aufderhaar were the high school band directors. In those "good old days" band met only one hour a week because the musical directors also had orchestra, a boys chorus, a girls chorus and a mixed chorus in the same time slot one day each week.

In the summer of 1938, Kieffer started with only eight band members, but as she recalls, "fortunately it was a balanced octet." She was the first to have high stepping drum majors and majorettes during her four-year stint as band director. Superintendent "Papa Joe" Saegert chided her by asking if she was trying to make chorus girls out of them. By football season the band had grown to some 36 musicians, and through sheer dedication, the band performed at halftime. Henry Lehnhoff was one of her first drum majors.

At a distinct disadvantage because her music major had been for choral music, Aufderhaar recalls that the band members had to learn to play their instruments privately because she could play none of them. In addition to the same music schedule followed by

Kieffer, she also taught all girls physical education.

Music has always been an important part of Gorzycki's life.

"When you grow up in Austin, you start the sixth grade public school band program, so that you can be in the Longhorn marching band," the vivacious band director explained. Her principal had encouraged her to play a string instrument, but you can't march with a violin. The French horn was her choice, and she did join the orchestra in the eighth grade. During junior high school (seventh through ninth

grades), she sat in the second chair in the French horn section; however, she won only first division medals in solo and ensemble competition and qualified for the region band.

That was only the beginning of an illustrious and honor-filled band career. At Austin High

School, she earned All State Band distinction in her sophomore and senior years and became first chair French horn in her junior year. Through additional individual competition, she saw and thrived on the competitive spirit of band participation, and while she was a straight "A" student (a grade she views as normal), she excelled in music generally and band specifically.

In her senior year she was honored at the final spring concert as the featured soloist and won the John Phillip Sousa Award (an honor also awarded to her in junior high school), Outstanding Orchestra Member and Memorial Spirit Award. When she was able to arrange her schedule to also join the choir in her senior year and won only first division medals in solo and ensemble contests, it frustrated her fellow bandsmen, because she wore all her medals, even choral ones, on her band uniform.

When the UT Longhorn Band was a division of the athletic department instead of the music department, it was considered improper for music majors to participate. For that reason, Gorzycki opted to watch football games as a spectator only for the first time in her freshman year. After suffering through the first Longhorn home game as an observer in the stands with the rest of the student body, she wasted no time in reporting to

Vincent R. DiNino; however, she had to wait until her sophomore year to join the marching Longhorns.

Striving avoid to stereotyping, the petite co-ed was president of the Fine Arts Council, president of Jester Dormitory, a Cactus Goodfellow and member of Orange Jackets, Mortar Board, Omicron Delta Kappa, Tau Beta Sigma (band honorary) and Sigma Alpha Iota (honor fraternity for music majors). Participation in the Longhorn Band expanded her horizons for she took her first airplane trips when the band traveled to

Lubbock and Florida, and during the Christmas holidays, she joined the Longhorn Ski Club at Crested Butte. A trip she is planning to repeat this yuletide. To the effervescent band director no job or responsibility is stereotyped as man's work. Her father succumbed when she was in the second grade, and she grew up with her mother and two sisters. In the all-female household, women filled every role.

As to her height, she notes that she is not the shortest in her family. Gorzycki towers over her mother by at least a half-inch.

Working in the Longhorn band office last summer when J.C. Neighbors, newly named Matador Band director, called Glen Richter, she had really planned to begin work on her master's degree this fall. However, Richter talked her into visiting Seguin and talking with Neighbors, and she affirms that she doesn't regret her decision to come to Seguin as the Saegert Middle School band director.

In preparation for the position she now holds, Gorzycki student taught at Crockett High School under Paula Crider and Bedichek Junior High School under Charlie Jones, who teaches private trumpet lessons locally. Since her sophomore year at UT, she has given private French horn lessons.

On her first day with the students, the new director was greeted by an uneasy silence as if they were afraid of what might be in store for them. But she treated them more like the adults they are becoming, and occasionally when the band hall grows quiet now, it is out of respect not out of fear.

Warmly received by the faculty and administration of Saegert, Gorzycki admits with only two new teachers it would

have been easy for the instructors to have "stuck to their own". But they didn't; instead, they have gone out of their way to include her.

There were a few awkward moments when she was with the three married male band directors, because she shared the same career with the men but somehow felt she was expected to spend more time with the wives. Time has erased the strain of these encounters, and she now spends some time with her fellow band directors and relaxes in female conversation with their wives.

Eventually she wants to direct a high school marching band. However, she readily admits there is something good about every phase of the band program. Beginners are rewarding as the director sees daily improvement.

"I've learned a lot from my professors and colleagues and now it's up to me," commented Gorzycki, who sees next spring's contest performance as a big test. "A musician is a lot like an athlete who trains and trains but until he meets the opponent head-on, he doesn't really know whether he has chosen the most suitable sport or career."

Following the popular Bob Pickett would have been a

problem had the two directors' approach to band not been so different. There is no way to compare the two and for that reason, Saegert band members can remain loyal to both.

Some new innovations introduced by Gorzycki include the election of band officers, appointment of section leaders and playing for all home eighth grade A-team football games.



But this overture contains melodies and themes from throughout the opera. Especially noteworthy is the contrapuntal treatment of the themes; at times there are four themes sounding simultaneously.

Benjamin Britten (1913-

Matinees Musicales carries this subtitle on the score: "Second Suite of Five Movements from Rossini." Britten wrote this piece to form, with Soirees Musicales, a ballet with choreography by Balanchine. The music, then, is dance music and the titles of the movements give an indication of their character: No. 1 March, No. 2 Nocturne, No. 3 Waltz, No. 4 Pantomime, No. 5 Moto Perpetuo.

Paul Fetler

Textually based on Psalm 68:32-34, Paul Fetler has written this fanfare-like hymn of praise to God. Full and rich harmonies, lively accents and syncopation, and changing meters, all add their varied qualities to the whole so as to produce a scintillating result.

Venite, Exsultemus Domino

Jan Pieterzoon Sweelinck (1562-1621)

Jan Pieterzoon Sweelinck (1562-1621) was one of the most famous organists as well as the last important composer of the Netherlands in the sixteenth century. His vocal compositions, of which this one is an excellent example, are generally written in contrapuntal style with occasional contrasting sections which tend toward homophony. This work comes from his Cantiones Sacrae collection.

Alleluia, Send Forth Your Spirit

Richard Felciano

This "Double Alleluia" is a contemporary liturgical composition intended for performance on Pentecost Sunday. Utilizing male choir, organ, and tape, the result derived will vary with succeeding performances. Due to the use of electronic music, the director must time the entrances of the organ and the male voices by means of a stopwatch. The outcome is a fascinating experience for both performer and listener.

Basket and Wood

Cecil Effinger (1914-

"Basket" is the third piece in a series entitled Four Pastorales. Each of these compositions is for four-part chorus of mixed voices and oboe. The texts used are poems by Thomas Hornsby Ferril. In "Basket" the graceful melodic lines of the oboe in their arpeggiated figures are woven beautifully into the simple triadic harmonies of the chorus to produce a mood of mysterious calm.

"Wood" is the last of the Four Pastorales. The choral writing is very sensitive to the poetic imagery, and the oboe provides its own cadenzalike solo material in alternation with the chorus. Oboe soloist is Keith Zook, McAllen High School, McAllen, Texas.


### The Corcoran Cadets March

The Bailey Middle School band program includes students in grades six through eighth. Currently, there are 175 sixth grade beginning band students and approximately 320 students in grades 7 and 8. At Bailey, the beginning band is divided into 5 homogeneously grouped classes. The seventh and eighth grade students are divided into four levels of performing concert bands: the Wind Ensemble, Symphony Band, Symphonic Band, and Concert Band. All band classes meet daily for forty-five minutes, and semester courses in Jazz Ensemble are additionally taken by many of the students. In addition to classes, students may elect to participate in a private lesson program once a week after school. The interest and expertise of these studio teachers have added greatly to the quality of the band program.

Since the school opened in the Fall of 1993, the Bailey Wind Ensemble has been a consistent sweep-stakes award winner in Texas' statewide University Interscholastic League competitions. The top three ensembles at Bailey have also earned top honors at invitational band contests, including Best In Class honors at the 1995 Schlitterbahn Band Festival, and consecutive "Superior" ratings at the Big "D" Band Festival in Dallas.



He is in his first year at Bailey Middle School where his responsibilities include conducting the Concert Band, assisting with the Symphony Band and teaching several sections of Beginning Band. He is affiliated with Texas Music Educators Association and Tubists Universal Brotherhood Association.

### **Guest Soloist**



**Vincent Frittelli**, a native of South Africa, is presently serving as Concertmaster of the Austin Symphony Orchestra and Associate Professor of Violin at The University of Texas. He began violin lessons at the age of six with his father, who continued to teach him until the age of fifteen when he moved to New York to study at Julliard under the renowned Ivan Galamian. Following his formal studies in 1961, Mr. Frittelli returned to South Africa and spent two years touring and performing recitals. In 1963, he accepted his first orchestral position as the Associate Concertmaster with the Pretoria Symphony. Since that time, Mr. Frittelli has served as Concertmaster of the Cape Town Symphony, Associate Concertmaster of the New Orleans Symphony, Concertmaster and Associate Conductor of the Akron Symphony, Concertmaster of the National Symphony of South Africa, Concertmaster of the Hong Kong Philharmonic, and Associate Concertmaster of the Atlanta Symphony. Mr. Frittelli has concertized extensively throughout Europe, Japan, and South Africa, including Zimbabwe and Mozambique, and given major performances in many North American cities. As member of the Chamber Soloists of Austin, he appeared at the Texas Festival of the Arts at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C. The group also toured South America in 1991 under the auspices of the United States Information Agency. In January, 1996, he was invited to serve on the jury of the International Transnet Violin Competition held in South Africa. He and his wife, Beverly, a professional flutist, have three young sons Stephen, Sean, and Ryan.

The Bailey Middle School wind ensemble is on the bill for this weekend's Music Educators National Conference in Kansas City, Mo., along with some big guns of American music like jazz trumpeter Wynton Marsalis, composer Stephen Sondheim and folk singer Pete Seeger.

Bailey won't be without its own big name. It's taking along internationally acclaimed violinist Vincent Frittelli, the concertmaster with the Austin Symphony Orchestra whose 14-year-old son, Stephen, is a percussionist in Bailey's band.

The 69-member band is one of the three middle school bands in the country to perform at the conference. Bailey was selected on the basis of recordings sent to event organizers.

"It's a pretty honorable thing that's happened to them," Nina Anmahian, executive secretary of the conference, said from Kansas City.

About 6,000 music professors

and teachers are gathering this weekend in Kansas City for the biennial meeting.

The band and 25 chaperones left Austin by bus Wednesday night and plan to take in the conference exhibits, a performance or two and a professional baseball game before taking the stage on Saturday. The band will perform four songs and accompany Frittelli on a fifth, "Carmen Fantasy."

"It's been a learning experience for us all," said band director Diane Gorzycki. "They are so well prepared that they are not nervous about it. They are going up there to enjoy what they are doing."

Each musician is paying \$210 to make the three-day trip. Most of the students have been able to raise the money with candy bar sales and other fund-raisers, she said.

Gorzycki has been refining the details of the trip, including a method she's developed over the years to make sure the children stay in their hotel rooms at night: duct tape on the doors.

### AISD board honors Bailey School Band

People at the Bailey School in southwest Austin knew their Middle School Band was good and now they have a prestigious cup to prove it.

Added to the achievement of winning the cup was receiving recognition from AISD school board members at Monday night's (Jan. 28) meeting. The trustees lauded the band and its director, Diane Gorzycki, for the accomplishment.

"This band has been recognized for outstanding success," said Trustee Olga Garza, of Oak Hill, who represents south and southwest Austin on the Austin Independent School District's board of education. "Winning the Sudler Cup is significant because it is the most prestigious international award for junior high and middle school bands."

"We're very proud of our band," said Bailey Principal Marsha Lyons-Gray," who attended the AISD board of education recognition. "It's quite an honor for any band to get such an award.

"It shows the dedication of the band directors, participating students and their parents," she explained. "They all contributed to this success."

The principal said the Bailey School has had an outstanding band program since the school opened in 1993.

"It's tremendous to finally get recognition for it now through this prestigious cup," she said. "This is the culmination of all the hard work so many people have put in on the band through the years."

Gorzycki has taught at

AISD for 25 years and has been at the Bailey Middle School since it first opened nine years ago.

Gorzycki, the band director, called the award a huge accomplishment for her band because it recognizes a band program that has been highly successful year after year, not just for a one-shot performance.

"The kids in the band felt good about being recognized by the school board," said Sharon Scheible, an assistant band director, who attended the board meeting. "It's an experience they won't forget."

Scheible said the cup honors the entire band program at the Bailey Middle School, which includes about 350 students. The top band has 75 participating students.

"This recognition by the school board is great for the kids in the band program," said Scheible.

To be eligible for nomination for this award, a band must have achieved and maintained extremely high standards of excellence in the concert area over a period of seven years. The band has to perform at regional, state, national and professional meetings.

The Sudler Cup is funded by an endowment by Louis and Virginia Sudler.

Louis Sudler, a Chicago businessman, was internationally known for his leadership as chairman emeritus of the Chicago Symphony Orchestral Association. He was founder and host of the "Artist Showcase," which ran for 14 years on television and won a Peabody award.



### Bailey Middle School Program

Concord is based on three traditional tunes from old New England; "The White Cockade", William Billings' "America", and Yankee Doodle".

The "White Cockade" is a fife and drum marching tune widely known during the days of the American Revolution. It also played a part in the British military tradition.

"America" was written by William Billings (1746-1800); an ardent patriot, amateur musician, and tanner by trade. He attempted to create a new kind of hymn for the New England church, which resulted in an outpouring of hymn tunes such as "America," which reflects the independent spirit of the young nation at its birth.

"Yankee Doodle" is the folk song most widely associated with the revolutionary war. Its origins are obscure and have been subject to a great variety of improbable theories. It spread throughout the colonies by the mid eighteenth century, and was very popular as a tune for jigs and county dances.

Hugh Stuart writes about his composition: "I have felt for some time that there was a need for a piece which in addition to any aesthetic value it may have, could be used as a tool to help develop a better band sound through the performance of a legato style, this *A Hymn for Band*."

Shoreline Meditations is inspired by thoughts and "daydreaming" episodes that someone might experience while observing or playing in bodies of water and their environs: rivers/deltas, lakes/piers, bays/marinas, beaches/dunes, etc. The composer, who grew up in Corpus Christi on the Texas Gulf Coast, feels a strong metaphysical connection to water. The music attempts to capture the diverse moods of these waterfront areas; from the peaceful calm of the bay by moonlight to the tumultuous chaos of an incoming hurricane to the hustle and bustle of a busy port complete with incoming oil tankers, outgoing shrimpers, and meandering sailboats.

The music is a single movement, through-composed work unified by the following: the opening four-note piano motive, the ensuing flute solos with accompanying chords, and the chorale. Virtually, all of the material is connected to one or more of these three elements. The ocean drum is also an important element as it begins, ends, and connects the two main bodies of contrasting tempi.

This work was commissioned by the Bailey Middle School Band of Austin, Texas in commemoration of its selection as the 2001 Sudler Cup winner.

The World's Greatest comes from the hit movie Ali and from repeated performances during the 2002 Olympic Games. This selection opens with flowing woodwinds followed by solo passages for trumpet and alto sax. The melody builds to a full tutti that captures the inspiring nature of the song.

This setting of the *Star Spangled Banner* offers a reflective quality for the concert band. Opening with solo snare drum and muted trumpets, a lush brass chorale and soft woodwind feature follow in hymn-like fashion. The full band soon joins with a resolute tone to bring the piece to a strong conclusion. This arrangement attempts to capture the emotion and drama Francis Scott Key so eloquently worded in his description of one of the most important events in American history.

A proud Hispanic influence is abundant in the culture of Texas. The Latin musical styles of "Samba" and "Salsa" are combined in this energized work for a young percussion ensemble.

American composer Robert Jager wrote the *Third Suite* for Mr. Leo Imperial, director of the Granby High School Band in Norfolk, Virginia. The first of the three movements is entitled *March*. It is an exciting piece to play particularly because of the alternating time meters. This opening movement is a rather metrically distorted march; one might imagine trying to walk on stilts. There is also an interesting percussion section feature in the middle of this movement.


Samson and Delilah is based upon the Biblical story of Samson, the great warrior-champion of Israel, and his ill-fated relationship with the seductive Delilah, queen of the Philistines. The orchestral Bacchanale, certainly the most famous excerpt from the opera, comes from a scene in Act III that takes place in the Temple of Dagon. Samson has been humiliated and is tied between two pillars of the temple. The Bacchanale is a festival in tribute to the god Bacchus, patron of all things sensual. In celebration, the Philistines begin a wild, pagan dance that is accompanied by this music. The party comes to life and quickly grows into a revelry, as the guests are drawn into a frenetic dance. As this excitement builds all around them, Samson and Delilah drift into a private world of their own. The music presents a serene interlude that turns into a sensuous episode, as a bond develops between the two star-crossed lovers. Its tender themes transform into passionate melodies, until they eventually give way to the original dance music. This sensuous, vaguely oriental music has taken on a life of its own as a concert piece, and it was a standard cue for the orchestras that accompanied silent movies of the 1920's.



**Diane Gorzycki** is a graduate of the University of Texas at Austin; she has taught in the Austin Independent School District for 28 years. She has been the director of bands at Bailey Middle School since it opened in 1993. Her bands have won honors each year in the Texas University Interscholastic League, major national music festivals, and the band has been selected as a finalist in the prestigious Texas Honor Band competition. She is an active adjudicator, clinician, and guest conductor throughout Texas; she conducts at various music camps each summer.

Ms. Gorzycki serves as a state board member in both the Alpha Chapter of Phi Beta Mu and the Texas Music Educators Conference. She served on the Texas Music Educators Association State Board for thirteen years. She is a member of the Texas Bandmasters Association, the Music Educators National Conference,

the National Band Association, Phi Delta Kappa, Women Band Directors International, and holds lifetime memberships in Sigma Alpha Iota and Tau Beta Sigma.



**Bill Haehnel** has been a music educator for 23 years, spending the past four years at Bailey Middle School. He is a graduate of the University of Texas at Austin and is a member of the Texas Music Educators Association, the Texas Bandmasters Association, the College Band Directors National Association, the Percussive Arts Society, Kappa Kappa Psi, and Phi Mu Alpha.

Mr. Haehnel has served as a faculty member at the University of Texas at Austin with the Longhorn Band and Symphony Band. He has also served as the percussion instructor at Texas Lutheran University, the music methods instructor at Huston Tillotson College, and the chairman of the fine arts department and director of bands at Pflugerville High School. His bands have competed twice at the Texas State Marching Contest and marched in the Orange Bowl, Fiesta Bowl, and

Tournament of Roses Parade.



**Scott Solkofske** is a Columbia, South Carolina, native in his third year at Bailey Middle School. Prior to his appointment in Austin, he served as the saxophone instructor at the Flint School of Performing Arts and teaching assistant for the saxophone studio at Michigan State University.

Mr. Solkofske holds a master's degree in saxophone performance from Michigan State University where he studied with Ron Blake, Joe Lulloff, and Andrew Speight. He graduated *cum laude* from Furman University with a Bachelor's of Music in Music Education where he studied saxophone with Clifford Leaman.

Mr. Solkofske is a member of the North American Saxophone Alliance, Kappa Delta Pi, Phi Eta Sigma, the Texas Music Educators Association, the Texas Band-

masters Association, the International Association of Jazz Educators, and the Music Educators National Conference.



The AISD Department of Instrumental Music...

The AISD Department of Instrumental Music consists of band and orchestra programs at every secondary campus and twelve elementary schools, with beginning classes starting in the sixth grade. There is a total staff of 53 band directors and 20 orchestra directors, all of whom practice team-teaching concepts throughout their respective vertical feeder system. AISD produced both 1996 TMEA High School Honor Orchestras, the Sudler Cup Award to the Bailey and Murchison Middle School Bands, and two UIL Class AAAAA State Marching Championships by the Crockett High School Band. Bailey Middle School is located in the southwest corner of the Austin Independent School District. The school has a total enrollment of 1073 students in grades six, seven, and eight. In addition to a strong instrumental music department with a combined band and orchestra enrollment representing over forty percent of the student body, Bailey has achieved statewide recognition in many academic areas. The school is justifiably proud of its successful mixture of the disciplines of the arts, academics, and athletics into a well-rounded curriculum led by a caring faculty, an active student body, and a supportive administration.

The Bailey Middle School Band Program...

The Bailey Middle School band program includes 412 students in grades six through eight. The beginning band is divided into six homogeneously grouped classes. The seventh and eighth grade students are divided into three levels of performing concert bands: the Wind Ensemble, Wind Symphony, and Symphony Band. All band classes meet daily for fifty minutes; semester courses in Jazz Ensemble and Steel Drum Band are also taken by many of the students. In addition to classes, students may choose to participate in a private lesson program once a week before, during, or after school. The interest and expertise of these studio teachers have added greatly to the quality of the band program.

Since the school opened in the fall of 1993 the Bailey Wind Ensemble has received eleven consecutive sweepstakes awards in Texas' statewide University Interscholastic League competitions. The Wind Ensemble has earned top honors at invitational band contests each year including "Best in Class" and "Best in Contest" honors at band festivals in Atlanta, Georgia, Colorado Springs, Colorado, Branson, Missouri, New Orleans, Louisiana, and Dallas, Texas. The Bailey Wind Ensemble was featured at the 1996 Music Educators National Conference in Kansas City, Missouri, the 2001 J.P. # Tribute to a Gifted Music Educator Diane E. Gorzycki 1953-2008

On September 30, 2008, the music world fell silent for a moment. One of our most gifted music educators, Diane Elaine Gorzycki, passed away after spending what seemed to amount to only a brief moment on this earth. During Diane's short time here, she touched the

lives of many, including former music students, music educator colleagues, and her countless friends and loved ones. Diane's contribution to the music world was so substantial because of one of the many special gifts she possessed: The gift to express and share music in such a beautiful and inspiring way.

I attended the memorial service for Diane Gorzycki on that beautiful afternoon of October 4th and I couldn't help but be in awe of the number of people who arrived to pay their respects. Several hundred people visited The Episcopal Church of the Good Shepherd that afternoon with one shared

objective: To bid their final farewell to a woman who was so influential in their lives. Attendees included homemakers, retirees, college students, college professors, band directors, applied lesson teachers, public school educators, administrators, neighbors, salespersons, band parents, etc. Regardless of each person's profession and personal background, they all had one thing in common: a love and respect for the gifted musician and music educator who had left this world too soon. The ceremony honoring Diane's life really was one befitting a dignitary with the grandness of the church, the beautiful music, and the heartfelt words spoken by each of the eulogists. The eulogists spoke of her professional accomplishments, the value she placed on laughter and friendship, and her effervescent personality and smile.

Diane Gorzycki was, as we all know, a highly successful music educator. She taught in central Texas for over 30 years, serving as a band director and fine arts administrator. Her career began in the 1970s in the small town of Seguin, Texas. After teaching at

Saegert Middle School for one year, Diane accepted the head director position at Porter Middle School in the Austin Independent School District. It was during her time at Porter Middle School that I learned of Diane Gorzycki and her gift for teaching. I will never forget the first time I saw "Ms. G," as so many people called her. The Bedichek Middle School band, within which I was a flute player, was about to enter the stage and the Porter MS band was on their way to the sightreading room at the

annual UIL Concert and Sightreading Contest. As the two band programs crossed paths, several of the Bedichek Middle School eighth graders noticed this person of short stature leading the Porter band. Of course everyone assumed this individual was a student, but we were quickly informed that she was actually the director. "Ms. G" was so petite, yet so confident. I remember being in complete awe of her during that moment and leaving that particular UIL experience with a different perspective on who could actually become a band director. Even on that day in 1983, Diane was teaching life lessons to students she didn't even know. The first lesson I ever learned from Ms. G.: Never judge a book by its cover and always aspire to become the best at anything and everything, regardless of your stature or gender.

In 1993, Diane left Porter and accepted the position as the band director at the new Bailey MS in Austin ISD. That was a very coveted teaching position and it was given to the most deserving individual. Diane's bands had received numerous awards and she deserved to be recognized for her efforts and accomplishments with the privilege of opening this new school and establishing a new band program. During this time, I was a band director at Fulmore Middle School, which is in the same school district, and I was provided with multiple opportunities to get to know Diane professionally and personally. As the primary host of many of AISD's All-District and All-Region auditions, Diane did an exquisite job of running a smooth audition and keeping everyone organized and on schedule. She always maintained a high level of professionalism regardless of the intensity of the experience. Another lesson I learned from Diane:Regardless of the circumstances, never sacrifice your professionalism.

Diane's programs continued to achieve high levels of success over the years and received numerous invitations to perform at national music conferences. Her students performed at the 1996 MENC convention in Kansas City, the 2001 J.P. Sousa Middle School Honor Band Clinic in Charleston, South Carolina, the 2002 Western International Band Clinic in Seattle, Washington, and the 2004 CBDNA/NBA Southern Division Conference in Atlanta Georgia. The Bailey Middle School band also received the 2001 Sudler Silver Cup International Award. Diane clearly had an ability to inspire and teach students the art and skill of music-making. Her incredible skills as a musician and educator were effectively conveyed to the students with every gesture and verbalization that came from the podium. With the use of clear language, precise feedback, logical sequencing, and thoughtful programming, Diane's students learned to play a variety of repertoire beautifully. This was yet another lesson I felt privileged to have learned from Diane: To have a successful ensemble, one must be able to clearly convey the beauty of the music and effectively communicate the steps that should be taken to achieve a quality performance.

Whenever intense moments presented themselves, Diane knew that to handle these times most effectively she had to greet them with a big smile. This smile really was her trademark, one of many features that enabled her to stand out from the rest. Her smile truly said a thousand words. Working alongside Diane at the Longhorn Music Camp for several summers in the 1990s, I became rather fluent in the language of

Diane Gorzycki's smiles. Observing her rehearsals of these large camp ensembles, I was given many opportunities to witness the timing, execution, and effectiveness of her smiles. Diane would smile if the students played a passage well, if they played a passage poorly, if they behaved appropriately, and if they were talking with their neighbors about what happened in Jester Dorm yesterday evening. Her smiles were as varied and colorful as her wardrobe, but they were effective in eliciting desired student responses. This was another important lesson I learned from Diane that I constantly share with undergraduate students enrolled in our teacher preparation courses at The University of Texas at Austin: Whatever you do, whatever you must say, deliver it with a smile.

Diane is also fondly remembered for her kindness to young teachers. She shared her classroom and expertise with many student teachers and observers from The University of Texas at Austin and went out of her way to mentor young band directors. Many of her former student teachers have become successful educators in the state of Texas. In fact, during her final year as the band director at Bailey, she contacted our program to inquire about supervising another student teacher. Of course, we were enthusiastic about the prospect of placing one of our students under her supervision. She and the young teacher were able to forge a very positive relationship based on the quality of teaching and observation experiences provided that semester.

Over the next several years, the professional relationship Diane and I had evolved into a very special friendship. As gifted as Diane was on the podium, she was equally gifted on the stage of life. She was quite skilled at developing and maintaining friendships with a diverse group of people. I believe this is one reason so many were in attendance at her memorial service on that beautiful Saturday afternoon. Diane Gorzycki, who is survived by her son, Scott Harbour, and her two sisters, Linda Gorzycki and Donna Livingston, was a friend to all because of her positive and courageous outlook on life. Although she was taken from this world much too soon, we are all the better for having known her. There is no way I will ever be able to thank Diane for all the wonderful lessons I learned from her over the years. I will, however, constantly apply those lessons learned to different aspects of my professional and personal lives. I hope you are able to do the same with the gifts and lessons Diane shared with you during her highly productive, influential, and musically inspirational life.

Family, friends and colleagues dedicate middle school

OAK HILL - Dedicated, professional, integrity, meticulous, and humble. These words were repeated often during Sunday's Dedication ceremony describing Gorzycki Middle School's namesake, Diane Gorzycki.

"She changed the world through music and leadership, touching thousands of students and their

families' lives," said Paula Cride tired University of Texas Long Band Director.

to AISD for making this gorgeous school such an amazing tribute to Diane. How could a building be more stunning than this?" said Linda Gorzycki, Diane's sister.

Gorzycki, who was an Austin native, taught with the Austin Independent School District for 30 years, beginning her career at Porter Junior High in 1977, which is now the Ann Richards School, working at Bailey Middle School as the Band Director from 1993 until 2006 and as the AISD Supervisor of Fine Arts, before retiring in 2007. She died September 29, 2008, after battling cancer for two years. She was 54.

After the Pledge of Allegiance, which was lead by Scott Harbour, son of Diane Gorzycki, and his father, Jack Harbour. AISD Board of Trustees member Robert Schneider offered his thoughts on the school naming: "I did not know her very well, but heard often dur-

ing the naming process was how much Diane Gorzycki meant to the students, which was very powerful. We are proud that the naming process resulted in honoring her," Schneider said.

A contingent from the UT Longhorn Alumni Band was on hand, acknowledging her time spent at UT, both as a band member and later as one of the Alumni Band

presidents. "I was outside drying off from the rain, and when I heard the 'Eyes of Texas' playing inside, I rushed in," said Dr. Paul Cruz, who is the Chief of Schools Officer for AISD. "We are here to celebrate the life of Diane Gorzycki and what she stood for in Southwest Austin. She inspired people with the gift of music, and she inspired her students. These students have to know that, despite our large size school district, we are a family, and Diane helped her students come together. We are grate.

ful to the community of Southwest Austin for supporting AISD and for your hard work in making this much-needed school happen.

Gorzycki was able to see the school site before she died, but had no idea that it would eventually be named after her. Close friend Susie Klein, who is now the Gorzycki PTA president shared this story: "In late May 2008 I picked up Diane. She was ill at the time, but I had no idea just how ill until later. We drove to this location and parked at the bottom of the hill. We walked up the hill to the most amazing view. We came to attend the Ground Breaking ceremony for the then un-named middle school and while we waited, we listened to the Bowie steel drums, and talked about what a wonderful place this school would be. She shared with me how she thought it was going to be a great place for our kids. She never got to see the school built or

lives on in the naming of this school," added Hayes, who has been with the district for 35 years.

Haynes and another close friend, Cathy Humphrey, convinced Gorzycki to take the Director of Fine Arts for AISD position, when Gorzycki was in doubt. "We begged her to take the Fine Arts position, even though she loved teaching. We needed her leadership as a district. However, shortly after she took that job, she was diagnosed with uterine cancer, so much of the time she had that position, she was in treatment, although she never missed meetings," said Humphrey who is the band director at Covington Middle School.

"She didn't want people to dwell on her illness. She just kept going on with her life, with her strong spirit. We thought that her spirit would carry her through this time, like it did the last time she had cancer," said Haynes, referring to Gorzycki's first battle with breast cancer 11 years ago. After that first diagnosis, Humphrey said Gorzycki hardly missed work. "We were supposed to have our first band meeting together, with Bailey and Covington, but she had surgery and was unable to come. She only missed six weeks of work after having a double mastectomy and she jumped right back in," said Humphrey.

Humphrey, who has been the Band Director at Covington the last 11 years, explained how she first met Gorzycki. "I met Diane 17 years ago when I was a freshman in college and she hired me to be her private lesson teacher at Bailey. I played French horn, which was also Diane's instrument. I had just started teaching at a local music company and I guess that is how she got my number. I remember walking into

the band room at Bailey. She was going through all the instruments that had been ordered and of course, she received only half of what she needed. She has been my mentor ever since that first meeting. I worked with her for four years in that capacity. When I got my first job at McCallum, she was the person I would call for classroom management, hosting contests and when I needed music guidance. It became a friendship through that. We had lots of walks together, she was a really dear friend," said Humphrey.


"She was always professional and classy. She had charisma, and knew how to speak to people, how to reach out. There was no job too small for her," said Humphrey, who was instrumental in getting the school named after Gorzycki. "Three days before Diane died, I was at her bedside and I came up with this idea. I said to her, 'Don't you think Gorzycki Middle School sounds awesome?' and she gave a smile. She was unable to open her eyes and I told her family and friends that were present that we were going to make this happen. I got into Diane's computer and put together her biography with a letter and sent it out to all of my colleagues and it just spread. The community really supported the idea and she won the votes," said Humphrey. "It was a no-brainer. A band teacher has students for three years and you really have a chance to get to know the students and their families very well. She really made such an impact," she explained.

Haynes added: "She was very meticulous, every chair and stand had to be arranged a certain way, so the students knew to be ready when they walked in that door. The way she approached her classes, you always

saw order and organization. She had close to 600 students in band one year at Bailey between all the different grades, which is the most we have every had in AISD, plus the parents that come with that. It is very rare to have a school named after a band director."

Paula Crider knew from the beginning of Diane's career that great
things would come. "Diane was my
student teacher back at Crockett.
When she first stepped up to the
podium, I knew that she was destined to be an exceptional teacher. It
was with great pride that I followed
Diane's career. The fact of having a
school named in a teacher's honor
is a tremendous honor in and of
itself; it is a wonderful endorsement
of teachers and teaching. Her influence extended to music educators all
across the country.

"Diane kept raising the bar for herself and her students. She showed the world her dedication at different national and international competitions. She was President of the Longhorn Alumni Association and a leader in the Longhorn Band. It means so much that they are here today. Diane organized many events. She once hosted the International Women Band Directors Association Convention. She put it on, organized it and hosted it all by herself," added Crider.

"Had she remained in good health, and in the position of Fine Arts Director for AISD, I have no doubt she would have continued to put that same stamp of excellence on all of AISD. I know Diane would love it if this were viewed as a celebration of teachers everywhere. I doubt there is a person in this room that hasn't been positively influenced by a teacher that sparked something within them. In her final days, she received many letters from students about her impact on their lives. It is so important to let people know the impact a teacher made in your life. Those letters meant the world to her. Diane Gorzycki made a significant impact in her students' lives.

"Aside from her family and her son, Scott, her entire life was dedicated to teaching. Why name a school after her? As Abraham Lincoln once said, 'It was altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.' She truly made a difference," added Crider.



Covington Middle School Band Director Cathy Humphrey set the wheels in motion to get the school named after Gorzycki. Don Haynes, Director of Bands at LBJ High School for the last 35 years, became acquainted with Diane in the late 1970's. Haynes is a former Longhorn Band member, as was Diane Gorzycki.

Michelle Huerta, who is the Theater Arts teacher and Fine Arts chair at Gorzycki, was in the audience, sitting with the Gorzycki Faculty during the dedication ceremony: "I met Diane seven or eight years ago. We were working on curriculum for the fine arts program, together. When you met Diane she never forgot a face and always greeted me so warmly. I really admired her when we were working on the curriculum writing, and coming up with vision for the district.

"When you talk to people in the community, it is amazing how many people knew her and I have never heard a negative thing about her. When that many parents, students and educators have such positive comments, then that individual deserves to be recognized. She was always so supportive of everyone in education, not just music. She wouldn't let kids skimp on their academics in favor of band. She neverlowered her expectations to be competitive," added Huerta, who has been with AISD for 20 years.

Amid loud applause, Gorzycki's son Scott performed the ceremonial ribbon cutting in honor of his mother, which was followed by



"Thank you to the community. We just can't be grateful enough. It is amazing to see the name Gorzycki on everything—it is like a generic term, which is wonderful, and of course, with a name like ours, so unusual. It is so cool to have the school colors honoring her time at UT as well," said Gorzycki.

### Diane Elaine Gorzycki

### A Lifelong Commitment to Music and Music Education November 9, 1953 – September 30, 2008

Diane Gorzycki was an Austin native, the middle of three daughters of George and Pat Gorzycki. She was an artistic and musical child, learning the piano and French horn and deciding in seventh grade to be a band director. A 1971 graduate of Austin High School, she received her Bachelor of Music Education degree from The University of Texas in 1975. Her 31 years as a band director included Saegert Middle School in Seguin (1976 77) and Porter Middle School (1977-93) and Bailey Middle School (1993-2006) in Austin. In 2006, she was appointed Austin ISD Administrative Supervisor of Fine Arts. She retired in 2007 after being diagnosed with a rare uterine cancer.

Bands under Ms. Gorzycki's direction received numerous invitations to perform at music conferences of national significance. Her bands received honors each year in the Texas University Interscholastic League, accumulated 28 Best in Class honors in major national music festivals, and were selected as finalists in the Texas Honor Band competition. In 2001



a band under her direction was the recipient of the prestigious Sudler Silver Cup International Award. Ms. Gorzycki was an adjudicator, clinician, lecturer and director throughout Texas and the United States. She was presented the National Band Association Citation of Excellence on three separate occasions, and her bands were the recipient of three Proclamations from the Texas State Senate.

Ms. Gorzycki served as a member of the John Philip Sousa Foundation Sudler Cup Selection Committee, was on the National Band Association Board of Directors as a Middle School Representative, and was an appointed member of the Texas University Interscholastic League Prescribed Music List Selection Committee. She was a past state board member of the Alpha Chapter of Phi Beta Mu International Bandmaster Fraternity, Texas Music Educators Association and Texas Music Educators Conference. She also served as past president, as well as a member of the Board of Directors, of The University of Texas Longhorn Alumni Band. Additionally, she was the scholarship chairman for Women Band Directors International, a member of Texas Bandmasters Association, Texas Music Adjudicators Association, and Music Educators National Conference.



Ms. Gorzycki loved music and found it to be a route to relationships—with middle school students, with parents, with the world, and she gave others her love of music through those relationships. And yet her life was not just music. She loved her family and friends. She created stained glass pieces and fused glass art, sang at weddings and was a Cub Scout Leader. Most of all she was a loving mother to her son Scott Harbour, who meant even more to her than music and teaching.






