"It's our first organized campaign," said Charles Kuentz, new director of the



Legacy of excellence left behind by Marshall band director Kuentz

High school band directors come and go, kind of like football coaches, and their burned out bodies don't even line the sides of our roadways the way used autos do.

But over at Marshall High the story is a little bit different. Charlie Kuentz, Big Daddy Kuentz as his students know him, stepped down after seven years at the helm of one of the nation's outstanding band programs and people couldn't help but notice.

"We were devastated that he left," Rosie Benavides, a Leon Valley resident who sent three children through Kuentz-led band programs at Marshall, said, "but it would have been worse if he had left earlier. We're thankful we had him for the length of time we had him.

That time was seven years.

In the fall of 1974 Kuentz left his alma mater, Jefferson High, to come to Marshall.

And an average, undistinguished career blossomed.


The Ram band went to the Rose

Bowl parade in California New Year's Day 1977 — one of only seven non-California schools selected — they took UIL sweepstakes honors all seven years and they even set a record for consecutive hours played by a concert band with 52 hours of playing in the summer of 1976.

Up to 200 students have participated in marching band at Marshall and membership in the band has become one of the most-sought extracurricular activities in the high

school.
